OUR FIFTH YEAR

The monthly Message with this October number begins its fifth year. It is the only periodical that follows every step in a Cause for the beatification and canonization of a Servant of God. This it has done for the purpose of developing a proper veneration for Kateri Tekakwitha, 'Lily of the Mohawks.'

Veneration for Servants of God consists not merely in invoking them to imtercede for favors, whether temporal or spiritual: that is only one way of manifesting veneration, and not the most perfect way. The most perfect way is by paying them the tribute of knowing and imitating their virtues, making them known to, and inducing, others to do the same. This will be ome of the themes of this Message during the coming year.

Another theme will be treated under the title: Glimpses of Heaven. Comparatively little is ever said or written about Heaven; still we cannot properly venerate those whom we piously believe to be there without trying at least to know something about their state.

In this way "The Lily of the Mohawks" will help its readers to act more

imtelligently on the article of Faith, known as Communion of Saints.

Since in November the Congregation of Rites will examine the Virtues of Tekakwitha to consider whether they should be declared heroic from a theological view-point, all should pray that their decision may be favorable. Already the Historical Section of the Congregation has expressed the opinion that the documents concerning Catherine justify such a decision, but this further step is necessary to make certain there can be no possible doubt about it.

Pray also that the Vice-Postulator may be fortunate in presenting proofs

of the apparent miracles attributed to the saintly Indian Maiden.

In the November Message our readers will be informed about the sessions on the Virtues and what these virtues are.

Communion of Saints

The Apostles Creed we repeat so frequently and so familiarly that when we say 'Communion of Saints' one fears it is too often said with only a vague notion of its meaning —communion between those who are with God, His saints in Heaven, and those who are His children still here on earth, but striving to live a saintly life.

Tekakwitha knew about the Blessed Virgin, Saint Joseph, Saint Aloysius and other saints whom the missionaries made known to their Indian wards, and she communed with

them, tried to imitate their virtues, found inspiration in their example, invoked them, and urged others to do likewise.

'The Saints' was the name which St. Paul addressed to the first Christians, as cleansed from original sin, as fortified by holy sacraments all through life, as constant attendants at sacred ceremonies and instructions, as suffering for their faith, many of them ready to suffer even unto death.

If the Apostle were living today, he would, I have no doubt, use the same name for all who are living according to the will, the law of God and the precepts of the Church. We speak with rapture of The Little Flower. Are there not millions of Little Flowers? They may not have had the same early training, the extraordinary divine favors, the blessing of life in the seclusion of a convent; but out they are in the world, pure, brave, self-sacrificing, long-suffering, charitable, devoted to family and friends, facing temptation, even scandal, and still innocent.

Countless men and women, young and old, breathe the air of moral contagion and still walk in the way of God as if they were of another world, heart and soul immune from contamination here.

No doubt a proper humility restrains us from adopting St. Paul's title, but there is also a false humility which makes some feel that it is impossible to deserve it. All too common is: "I shall be happy if I get to Purgatory." Well and good, but heaven is our proper goal, and it should be our aim.

In Holy Mass we pray, after the Consecration, for "some part and fellowship with Thy holy Apostles and Martyrs (naming several) and with all Thy Saints, into whose company we beseech Thee to admit us, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses." Thus we look forward to communion with saints as if it were to be after our pilgrimage here, while we profess our faith in such communion whilst we are still here.

Now to hold communion with any group of persons is to know them well, their good qualities, merits, habits, virtues, and their good repute among their fellows. For communion with the saints, many helpful books have been written.

Fortunately what has been written about Tekakwitha is plentiful and considered by the Congregation of Rites as historically correct. It is this we hope to present in this LILY OF THE MOHA. s the coming year.

And now, talking about heaven and communion of saints, September 10, Feast of St. Nicholas of Tolentine, in whom she took rightful pride, in the parish under his patronage, a true child of God departed this life after a lingering illness during which she never complained, but kept acting bravely, pleasantly, even wittily up to the last. Her uppermost concern was the comfort and pleasure of others.

For twenty-five years Helen Zimmerman had been associated with me in various capacities, for The Catholic Encyclopedia, and in many ways for the Cause of the Jesuit Martyrs of North America, now Saints Isaac Jogues and Companions, and also for the Cause of Tekakwitha. Witnessing her last hours all one could think of is: "Suffer little children to come unto Me, for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." Those who stood by were entranced by her appearance as the end drew near and consoled by it.

Her life and death were beautiful, and her Requiem a triumph. "To her, O Lord, and to all who are resting in Christ, allot the realm of refreshment, light and peace!" (Canon of the Mass.)
