## TEKAKWITHA AND THE WAR

Tekakwitha knew what war was. Her mother had been a victim of it, taken captive when the Mohawks made a raid on her people, the Algonquins. When only ten years old she suffered its horrors in the destruction of her own Mohawk villages, and the winter following without food or cabin shelter. Often afterward she witnessed the braves of her settlement in the orgies of the war dance as they prepared to march on the Mohicans or other hostile tribes, and once at least she saw them bring home captives for torture and death at the fire stake. All this while she was still dwelling on the Mohawk.

Yes, Tekakwitha knew what war was, if

not in the mass destruction of our wars to-day, she knew it in still more savage form, in killing hand to hand, and killing for the delight to kill. Even the few years she spent on the banks of the St. Lawrence, her quiet home at Laprairie was not immune from bloodthirsty attacks, and quite soon after her death her people believed that through her intercession when altogether undefended they were unharmed in a surprise attack by the implacable Iroquois. This is why she is styled: "The Genevieve of New France"—as Saint Genevieve had protected Paris from the barbarians of her day, so Venerable Tekakwitha was the saviour of her people.

### THE POINT OF ALL THIS

His temperature rose to 106, and while the fever was at ints height, he developed an acute appendix attack. Due to the high fever, the doctors were in a quandary as to their procedure. I had blessed my brother with Kateri's relic at 10 a.m.-at 2 p.m. the doctors decided they could wait no longer for fear the appendix would burst. Preparations were rushed and im half an hour he was on the table. The doctors found an 'obstructed' appendix, which they said would have burst in another few hours. When they took him up to the operating room, they gave him about 'one chance in a hundred,' according to their words to me, but they had to take that one chance. My priest brother stayed that aftermoon. I saw my brother early the next mornimg, and his first words astounded me. I had expected to find him weak, gravely ill, and when I entered the room, to ask how he was, he answered: 'Outside of a bit of gas pains, I feel fine.' He had a good night's sleep, no mausea, and looked remarkably well for what he had gone through, and his fever was down almost to normal. His improvement was so rapid that on the tenth day after the operation he went home, all signs of the streptococcus infection having disappeared three days after the operation. The doctors were amnazed at his rapid recovery. My brother and I were not. Each day I had blessed him with the relic and had placed her picture in the room, and put the Auriesville Martyrs' cross on his hospital gown. We had put our turust in Kateri-asked her to live up to her mame-and 'set all things in order'-for this young father of a young family. She more than answered our prayers. I wish here to

publicly pay tribute to her power and her love."

She sent me your address and I wrote you for the prayers and pamphlets. I prayed fervently and secured employment with a defense plant of the General Motors here. I have been working since Labor Day, including two Sundays, doing clerical work and my check for payment of my services from September 15 to September 30, amounted to \$120.00. It is needless to say that I am thankful and very happy."
