PRECIOUS DOCUMENTS

Life and Legend was the title of a page im the October LILY OF THE MOHAWKS telling that what was written about Tekakwitha soon after her death was a story of the facts of her life, and not merely a collection of opinions or memories of those who had lived with her. This story might be amplified by recording how marvelous it was that her Life should have been written at all, and still more marvelous that the writings should have been preserved.

Even in our time the priests in charge of Imdian Reservations live in conditions not too favorable for writing books and they have little incentive for such a task. One may imagine how difficult it was well night three hundred years ago, when the Indians were less civilized, housing accommodations less private, and raids by hostile tribes all too frequent.

Missionary life would seem to inspire its agents with extraordinary zeal and a capacity for doing things beyond their ordinary powers. The Missioners of Tekakwitha's people were gifted and cultivated men. They fairly revelled in any sign of progress in Christian life on the part of their Indian charges. Witness how almost ecstatic they were in recording in the Jesuit Relations every evidence of response to their ministry by their still bemighted charges.

This was their incentive, and when Tekakwitha exceeded even their fondest expectations they felt in duty bound to make known what they considered the fruit of divine grace in the untutored Indian Maiden. De Lamberville was her discoverer as if by a sacred divination. Chauchetière, hesitamt at first, and seemingly scrupulous, as if he could not believe it possible that a child of the forest should become such a child of grace, wrote like one who wanted to start a movement for her canonization. Then came the enthusiastic Cholenec. As one reads his several accounts of her, one feels that every line he wrote was an act of worship.

Visit Caughnawaga today and come away with the impression that it was the home of great and saintly men, of the founder of the Science of Ethnology, Lafitau, of the historian, Charlevoix, of the philologist Cuoq, the Indian linguist Forbes, who died as Archbishop of Ottawa. All were devoted to their Venerable Tekakwitha. They go back to 1712, but how account for the preservation of documents which were written two centuries and a half ago? There was the British taking over of Canada in 1763; them the suppression of the Society of Jesus and seizure of the possessions of the missionaries in Canada in 1765: and after that the lesuits did not return to Canada until 1842.

By a special providence the documents were still extant, but scattered here and there until the historian, Father Martin, collected them and stored them among the precious archives of St. Mary's College, Montreal.

It was in this way the documents concern-

ing Tekakwitha were preserved and have come down to us so well authenticated and available for the Process of having her declared Venerable and, soon we hope, Blessed and Saint. When presented to the Congregation of Rites, just as the vacation was beginning in 1932, the Portitor, Monsignor Pace, of the Catholic University, was told nothing could be done with the documents before October. In two days he was called back to say that they would be examined at once, and the Osservatore Romano announced that few Causes for canonization were ever better documented.

A WELL-FAVORED DIOCESE
