All Concerned

Now that there is a fair prospect of renewed activity on the part of all concerned in the Cause of Tekakwitha we urge our readers to redouble their efforts to make known her virtues to others, and the blessings, spiritual and material, to be obtained by invoking her aid. Characteristic of this Cause is that it is the common concern of all who know the Venerable Tekakwitha. Usually a canonization is brought about by the efforts of the clergy of a diocese, or of the religious Order of which the Servant of God was a member; but in this case clergy and laity unite in supporting the Cause by their kind offerings and by their prayers for its happy consummation, and they feel homored when invited to have part in it.

Relics of Tekakwitha

The relics of Tekakwitha are sealed in a casket which is kept reverently in the sacristy of the church at Caughnawaga, Canada. Whilst a Cause for the canonization of a Servant of God is in process, it is customary to keep the relics thus sealed. Before the Cause of Tekakwitha was instituted a few pieces of her bone were made available and fragments of these have been distributed; but the war made it impossible to obtain metal to make proper relic cases, and the distribution ceased. The most the possessor of relics could do is lend one for a while. It is a mistake to lend a relic for any great length of time, and it is not necessary. All that is needed is to apply a relic with the proper prayer. Besides, it is possible to apply relics to certain articles, silk, for instance, and such articles have the virtue of relics known as second class.

HAD THE FIRST COMMUNION ANY PART?

"I am writing you to tell you how wonderfull Kateri Tekakwitha was to my daughter, Amne, age nine years. Anne was stricken with that dreadful disease, 'rheumatic fever.' It was the beginning of March when she was taken ill. For nine solid weeks she did not get up from bed. She was to make her First Holy Communion the second Sunday in May-that happiest moment in anyome's life. Well for six solid weeks her fever was high twenty-four hours a day. In all those weeks it never went below the 100 mark. Two or three days after six weeks had elapsed my older daughter, Theresa, came home from the parochial school where Theresa, Anne, and their brother, Johnny, attemd. She brought home with her a pamphlet bearing the prayers, and life of Kateri Tekakwitha. Also instructions from the nun that we all should say those prayers. very first night we all knelt at her bed, and

said the prayers out loud. Little Anne, too, said those prayers with us, although she was lying on her back. Well, Father, on the very next day her fever dropped and she steadily kept gaining and we kept on with our prayers. And that moment that little Anne so much desired, and we the parents, too, was fully realized. Little Anne had made her First Holy Communion in her lily-white dress and veil in church. She always spoke of that day, 'Oh, mama, how I wish I can get well so I can make my First Holy Communion in that white dress and veil you bought me.' Father, it was Kateri Tekakwitha that made this possible. I know it is so because after that first prayer her fever dropped. What else could that have been? Maybe some will say, it was a good doctor. Doctors don't perform miracles. Kateri Tekakwitha guided this doctor's hand so that she is on the road to recovery; her heart. thank God, according to the doctor's diagnosis is O.K. Father, I hope everyone will invoke the aid of Kateri Tekakwitha; I know they will not be turned down."
