OUR HAPPY NEW YEAR

Happy New Year and happiness all the year round is the wish of the Vice Postulator for the Cause of the Venerable Tekakwitha for all who are devoted to her; and this wish is repeated in prayer every morning at Holy Mass "for all who are helping me in this Cause by their prayers, works and offerings and for all belonging to them who may be in special need; for the members of TEKA-KWITHA LEAGUE living and departed."

The Indians of Kateri's day had no New Years' customs suc' as we have. Their missionaries kept reminding them of the feast days of the Christian year and their meaning, but just at this time of the year the mind of the Indians was centered on the Crib and the Child Saviour. Even pagan Indians were attracted to that and had some faint glimpse of its meaning. Images and pictures appealed to them more than lessons in their own lamguage.

It is not likely that even the Christian Indians took New Year's resolutions, and they certainly had no vain thoughts like do many debaded persons among us today of creating a new world and new human order of things. For those who dwelt happily with Tekakwitha at Caughnawaga the new order was the peace, purity, sobriety in which they passed their days, trusting and helping one another, observing in the chapel and in their cabins

the religious practices taught them by the missionaries.

There is only One Who can say: "Behold, I make all things new"—the One Who made all things in the beginning and Who controls the order in which they exist and move. He it is Who enables His ministers to revitalize what is decadent and reform what has lost its original integrity.

Tekakwitha was handmaid to the ministers of God by her example, her chastity, her industry, patience in suffering, continuous prayer, and outshining devotion at Mass and when she was receiving Holy Communion. By God's special grace she had become a new creature, and by aid of this grace she helped the missionaries to make new the benighted human beings who had come under their care and keep them in their new condition.

Kateri's influence on this new order did not cease with her death. As narrated by her director, her death had a remarkable effect on the mission: "Devotion became general; the Indians all spoke of penances, selfdenial, of renouncing all in order to give all to God in imitation of Catherine. From every side the people came to inform me of the beautiful resolutions, and, what is more, they succeeded in them . . . and persevered in them in spite of their youth and other strong reasons."
