# Correspondence With Vatican City

Readers of Jane Scrivener's precious book will appreciate why it still takes so long for a letter to come from there and so long for a reply to get there; and the same holds good for Vatican City. The wonder is that any communication whatever is possible.

The German occupants of the eternal city might have acted much worse than they did. They were evidently awed by the influence which the Vatican exercised even on behalf of territory and institutions which were not Vatican but distinctly Roman. Still their occupancy was injurious enough, depriving as it did the citizens and even prominent ecclesiastics of food, transportation, heat, privacy and freedom.

Jane Scrivener is a pen name. The writer, strange to say, is a nun, who on account of her relations with the Vatican Library had advantages of which others were deprived. Would that among our army of war correspondents there had been even a few others who could write with the clarity and accuracy of this woman religious! The book is precious as a record of all the Holy Father succeeded in doing to check the rapacity of the occupants, to feed the multitude, to succor the wounded and distressed, to maintain order, to keep up hope during the long visitation. # Tekakwitha in Belgium

The Courier Journal of Rochester published this brief account of a Tekakwitha Chapel in Belgium. Before she is canonized it is not permitted to erect a chapel in her honor; but it is not expected that Catholic officers and enlisted men should know this point of Canon Law. Officials of the Archdiocese of Malines know it and they will accept the structure as a cabin or hall or other edifice erected in Kateri's honor. Meantime the piety of our men in service will no doubt be rewarded by blessings obtained through the intercession of the Venerable Servant of God. The account is as follows:

"In a battle-scarred village in Belgium stands a chapel dedicated to an American Indian maid, the Venerable Catherine Tekakwitha, known as the 'Lily of the Mohawks.'

"It was built by the Catholic officers and enlisted men of the 253d Ordnance Battalion under the direction of Lt. Col. Owen T. Mc-Closkey of St. John the Evangelist parish here (Columbus, N. C.) and was blessed by Cardinal Joseph Van Roey, Archbishop of Malines.

"The cannon were hardly stilled outside the little Belgian village when the men gathered for the dedication of what is believed to be the first statue in Europe of the 'Lily of the Mohawks.'

"The chapel will be turned over to the Malines Archdiocese when the U. S. Army relinquishes its camp nearby."

She loved to revere a rude Cross in the forest against background of Indian village, palisade, wigwam, cornfield, trail, lake and river, war-dance, sorcery, riotous feast and tortured captive, all part of the romance. What a new thing it will be in the annals of holiness when she is declared Saint!

The leaflet that captivates many is the one that tells of the TEKAKWITHA LEAGUE, founded soon after her death:

To cherish her memory, to venerate her and imitate her virtues, to invoke her for all manner of blessings, to pray she may become Blessed, and Saint.

Members are daily recommended in Holy Mass and in the Divine Office, the Universal Prayer of the Church (recited by priests daily), by the V. Postulator for her Canonization. They receive also the Monthly Message, The Lily of the Mohawks.

Then there is this monthly message, THE LILY OF THE MOHAWKS, which keeps its readers informed about the progress of the Cause for Kateri's canonization, the steady increase of devotion to her, and the story of remarkable favors attributed to her intercession.
