THE TEKAKWITHA CABIN

Thanks to her devotees, the response to our appeal for erecting a Cabin as a memorial of Venerable Tekakwitha at her birthplace, Auriesville, the response has been prompt and generorus and it promises to enable us to make the memorial somewhat worthy of her.

It is too soon as yet to present the design for it, or to describe, but the architect is doing his best to complete plan and we hope to start erecting it soon. The co-operation we are receiving is proof of widespread devotion to her, and the Cabin and its contents will spread devotion among the thousands of pilgrims who visit Auriesville every year, and a reverence for her among the many non-Catholics who frequent the place because of its historic interest, and always with genuine reverence.

TERCENTENARY AT AURIESVILLE

This year more than ever people of various beliefs will visit Auriesville because of the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the martyrdoms that occurred there in 1642 and 1646, notably of the missionary, Saint Isaac Jogues and his companions, the Saints Rene Goupil and John de Lalande, and also of their Indian neophytes who persevered in the Faith in spite of gruesome torture and death.

Members of historical societies, which are numerous in the Mohawk Valley and vicinity, school principals and teachers and their pupils, tourists, and groups of various organizations will be attracted to the sacred spot, since the celebration will be well advertised by newpsapers and broadcasts, by announcement in churches near and far, and by pilgrims, some of whom can boast that they have been at the Martyrs' Shrine every year since the pilgrimages started in 1885.

The Tekakwitha Cabin may not be finished, but we hope to have it well under way. It will spread volumes for the devotion of the Martyr missionaries who were never satisfied merely to make converts, but who always aimed at making even the rude Indians saints. In their minds the Church was not only Catholic but Holy; and their labors were well rewarded not only in Tekakwitha but in many distinguished instances of Indian men and women.

SEVENTY YEARS ONLY

On the last day of this month, the Feast of Saint Ignatius Loyola, Founder of the Society of Jesus, the writer will, if God spares

him, have finished seventy years as a member of this Society. A good part of these years was spent in helping to bring about the canonization of the Auriesville Martyrs and their Companions, and a good part of it also in helping to procure for Tekakwitha the honors of our altars. Thank God, there is every reason to believe that will occur.

There will be no public celebration, but the Jesuit septuagenarian hopes to celebrate Mass that day in the University Church at Fordham where he has been resident some years, and that Mass will be offered for the many good friends of the clergy and laity who have kindly assisted him in the various good works Almighty God has enabled him to do for His glory.

QUICK WORK

"Started this parish Pentecost Sunday, 1941, with seven. Now have forty-four names on the books with thirty-two resident. They do move about. Up to the first of the year had but five adult converts. January 26 to February 3, inclusive, Father Howard, S.V.D., colored, gave a mission, then things changed.

"Baptized a girl aged twenty. Witnessed her marriage to Catholic boy.

"A lady, aged forty-six, who had been a Baptist over thirty years, here every morning for Communion. Her husband, aged fifty-six, had never been baptized and now he is a happy man.

"A man, aged sixty-three, never baptized, and now a happy person.

"A boy, aged seventeen, who waited two and one-half years for his father to say yes, and the father was present for the Baptism.

"A girl, aged seventeen, on May 9, the day I baptized—her mother was present for her Baptism.

"Last week baptized two girls, both aged nineteen, and this week a boy, aged nineteen—that is the best age as they are more sincere and of greater influence among the young people.

"So I ask that the Lily pray for means to buy two lots, the money to build a school, and converts." —El Dorado, Ark.

THAT SAME DAY

"On the anniversary of her death, Holy Wednesday, April 17, we organized a special Mass for our Mohawk Indians, her 'kins'; we prayed fervently for her speedy Beatification and asked with special entreaties for the cure of one Mrs. Annie Lahache, a worthy member of the church choir who is unable to walk since a serious accident that occurred almost three years ago. Complications had set in and her case was quite worse on April 16. The next day, to our great joy, we heard that she was doing very, very well. We even look forward to the day when she will be able to walk again without the help of crutches or cane. At the close of the Mass, on that same celebrated day, over three hundred Indian parishioners came to the sacristy and venerated the sacred remains of Katteri, their sister. On Easter Sunday, anniversary of her Baptism, we sang a special hynm composed as a prayer for her speedy Beatification.
