## THE TEKAKWITHA CABIN

The architect, Mr. James L. Delany, of New York, has submitted plans for the Cabim to be erected at Tekakwitha's birthplace, mow Auriesville on the Mohawk, New York. The Cabin is modelled on the style of dwelling used by her Mohawk people. Fortunately the missionaries of her time have left us mot only descriptions but sketches also of these cabins, in which they themselves lodged, and we have these sketches in Father Bressami's "BRIEF RELATION" printed at Macerata, Italy, in 1653, after his own expensionce as a prisoner in the Indian village Ossernenon, now Auriesville, three years before Tekakwitha was born there.

The Mohawk cabin was a framework of young trees arched like our garden arbor and covered with bark. Inside it was arranged like a railroad sleeping car, and often it was long enough to house several families like a one-story, or bungalow, apartment house. Tekakwitha was fortunate in growing up with her chieftain uncle's family, who could have a cabin all to themselves.

This Cabin will be 45 feet long, 20 feet wide and 15 feet high. On one side there will be an ante or reception room, 12x14x12, for use as an office or attendant's room, and on the other side there will be an alcove in which some day an altar may be placed. There will be provision for heating and lighting and other usual conveniences. As for

building material, that is at present a problem, but we shall use what is available to erect a fire-proof repository for the contents of the Cabin. The interior walls will be asbestos of such a quality as to serve for mural paintings of the chief scenes in Tekakwitha's life. As examples of some of the documents and other contents:

and many others, besides the handsome volumes issued by the Congregation of Rites telling the story of the Introduction of the Cause for the beatification and canonization

of Tekakwitha and the Decree pronouncing her Venerable. These are only some of the precious Kateri material which will be displayed in show and book-cases and in letterfiles. It will make a study, or studio, of the process of canonization.

The Cabin will stand on a plot about 180 feet square, which will be properly land-scaped.
