## THE CRIB AND KATERI

It is inconceivable that the Order of St. Francis should cease to exist. Even if, by any dread possibility, the last Franciscan, man or woman, should go to the great reward, the spirit created by the gentle founder would live on, the spirit of simplicity and gentleness, of courage and self-sacrifice, of the foolishness of the Cross, taking Christ at His word, rebuking pride and challenging luxury in human life.

If the Franciscans had never done more than give us the Crib, the Christmas bambino, they would have made Christian revelation clear and appealing to us all. As we read in the Epistle of the Mass, the third offered by priests on Christmas morning, from St. Paul to the Hebrews, first chapter:

"In old days, God spoke to our fathers in many ways and by many means, through the prophets: now at last in these times He has spoken to us, with a Son to speak for Him; a Son, Whom He has appointed to inherit all things, just as it was through Him that He created this world of time; a Son, Who is the radiance of His Father's splendor, and the full expression of His being; all creation depends, for its support, on His en-

abling word. Now, making atonement for our sins, He has taken His place on high, at the right hand of God's majesty, superior to the angels in that measure in which the name He has inherited is more excellent than theirs."

What a sublime and, like everything sublime, a simple conception it was, so artistic of St. Francis to express this revelation in the form that all could comprehend, alike imfant and veteran, believer and unbeliever! Who can resist the appeal of infancy, even of its image?

Full well our early missionaries appreciated this appeal, and we are told how at Christmas time their chapel had its crib and that Mohawks of every type, even those who hated the Prayer, were drawn to see the Imfant amid such ornament as was possible, and came away awed by the devotion of the captive Christians among them. It was one of the first intimations for Kateri that the Supreme Being in Whom she had begun to believe had become Man to help us become like God. Franciscans are among the most ardent devotees of Venerable Tekakwitha.

## HIS HOLINESS AND AURIESVILLE

That was so apt and so like the Holy Father, when broadcasting to the Convention of the Archconfraternity of Christian Doctrine in Boston recently, to remind the bishops, clergy and laity in attendance that we have been celebrating the Tercentenary of the martyrdom of missionaries who first taught the Christian Doctrine on our soil, and that at Auriesville, where Tekakwitha was born and where no doubt, though unbaptized, she first, through her captive Christian mother, came to know and love the Prayer as our religion was known to her Indian people, pagan and Christian.

His Holiness has the extraordinary gift of keeping informed and interested in Catholic life all the world over, as we say beginning the Canon of the Mass, totius orbis terrarum. The Martyr Saints of three hundred years ago are for him, as for all of us, models as well as patrons in these days of trial and sacrifice.

## Strange Way Out
