BACK TO SCHEDULE

The February issue of THE LILY OF THE MOHAWKS had a paragraph on the equivalent between the words Roma and mora—Roma for the name of the world's capital and mora, with the same letters meaning delay. With no blame on Rome that was true during the war. Thank God, it is no longer true. Until very recently even air mail to Rome was very slow; but it is no longer slow. Once it took weeks for a letter to go to Rome by air mail; now it goes on schedule.

Thus it was a pleasant surprise to get a letter by air recently stating that money sent to Rome for Mass Intentions had been received without delay. The offerings for these intentions are very welcome over there just now, as there is very little else to live upon and they are distributed immediately among those who are working on Tekakwitha's Cause.

In spite of cold and hunger and little

promise of real relief, they keep working and they have much to do. Father Miccinelli, who is Postulator in Rome for the Cause of Tekakwitha, is Postulator for all the members of the Society of Jesus considered for canonization. He is also in demand for promoting many other Causes. When one considers that he celebrated his Golden Jubilee as a Jesuit for fifty years, one can imagine how overtaxed his zeal and skill have been as a Postulator, so much so that he has had to have an assistant appointed recently, Reverend Arnald Lanz, of Turin.

How the time-table worked, or, rather, did not work, here is an instance. A letter received recently from Father Miccinelli tells how the Apostolic Process on a reputed miracle in the diocese of Marquette, which was sent to Rome last February, is only now under the scrutiny of the Congregation of Rites—a year for what should take a month.

"You will note that I have been kicked out of Hooper Bay after eighteen years there. I guess I was beginning to gather moss. And a little over a year ago our Bishop (I guess about the first official act after the death of Bishop Crimont and his coming into his place) suspended our native community, and instructed me to send all the Sisters home.

It was a blow that struck all of us there something like the first atomic bomb that fell the same day on Japan. The reason given was to clear the convent for purposes of a parochial school. But then he finds out that he could find no other Sisters to accept the work. So the convent remained empty till about a month ago, when it was turned into a church, and living quarters for my successor.

"There is not so much to report from here just now. And anyhow, you are on the mailing list of our revived news sheet that has changed from Hooper Bay Gossip to The News-Letter. You must have the copy I mailed you recently.

"I want to take this opportunity to wish you a most peaceful and joyous Christmas, and a truly prosperous New Year. I keep you in my prayers and I hope that you will give me a share in yours, too, that the dear Lord may bless my work for His glory here, and that I may be able to help lots of souls to heaven. The natives around here are not so good as those down in my former district. There has been too much contact with whites here, and unfortunaetly natives never seem to learn much that is good from our white brethren, mostly I guess because the wrong kind of folks come to places like this.
