CARDINAL SPELLMAN AND VOCATIONS

The plea of His Eminence, or one like it, with young people to consider entering the priesthood or the religious life in monastery or convent, should be read and commented upon

in every pulpit in the land.

It was always true that "the harvest is great but the laborers are few," but today it is more plainly true than ever. Human needs seem to increase despite the progress made in many fields. A priest nowadays has not only to build and upkeep his church, he must keep a school, a nursery, very often a club-house for his several organizations, and in some cases a playground. Sisters have not only to teach but to qualify for higher education, staff hospitals, and become adept in many forms of social welfare. Young people worship the priesthood and convent life, but to seek either they must overcome difficulties with which prayer only can cope with. Often their chief difficulty is their own modesty, a feeling that they are umfit for such a high calling. The Holy Spirit prompts vocation, but He employs priests and sisters who have knowledge of the calling to foster it.

ALTHOUGH I AM NOT A CATHOLIC

When a man reports a cure of his child in answer to prayer for Tekakwitha's aid, alluhough, as he writes: "I am not a Catholic," it reminds one that Tekakwitha herself was most baptized, nor an instructed believer, until her twentieth year. And that leads ome to consider that many who are not Catholics are in good faith, believing in God, in prayer, in right living, but in these days of confusion and perplexity about religion know not where to turn. They do what they think best, and there is an old saying of theologians, that for those who do what they think best, God does not deny His grace. Why not invoke Tekakwitha for those who, as she was so long in darkness, need the light of faith to become real Christians. (See page 22.)
