In Bemoriam

FATHER JOHN J. WYNNE, S.J.

On the night of Tuesday, November 30, 1948, God called to his eternal reward Father John J. Wynne, S.J., champion of the Cause of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha for the past twenty-five years. To the clients of Venerable Kateri and the readers of the Monthly Message this meant the passing of a dear friend, revered yet intimate, almost like one of the family, so endeared had he become to them through the bond of a common loyalty and a united effort for the achievement of a cherished goal. For a quarter of a century he worked incressantly to bring about the beatification of Kateri, the holy Indian Maid.

Father Wynne was born in New York City, September 30, 1859. He attended the College of St. Francis Xavier, receiving his A.B. degree before his seventeenth birthday. On August 24, 1890, he was ordained to the priesthood, and soon afterward began a career as writer and editor, a career in which he was to perform eminent service for the Church over a period of fifty-six years. In many respects his career has no parallel in the Church in the United States. He was truly a monumental figure in American ecclesiastical history.

In 1892 Father Wynne was appointed National Director of the Apostleship of Prayer and editor of the Messenger of the Sacred Heart. In 1900 he organized Holy Hour Devotions in the United States, starting at the Church of St. Francis Xavier, New York City. In 1905 he started laying the foundations for the Catholic Encyclopedia, described at his golden jubilee as the most important contribution in modern times to standard Catholic literature. Im 1909 he founded the Catholic review, America, which has continued since that time to be one of the most influential publications in the English-speaking world.

Some years ago America asserted that Father Wynne has been "more closely associated with the North American martyrs . . . than any other human being on earth today. For more than fifty years he has been writing about them, and more than anyone else, labored (as vice-postulator) to prepare the information and popular devotion which hastened the camonization of the Martyrs."

In 1915, Father Wynne was State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus of New York.

The organized the League of the Daily Mass. He was made a Knight of the Order of Leopold II for his defense of the Belgians in Africa. His presentation of the facts about the

Dominican, Augustinian and Franciscan friars in the Philippines after the United States took control of the islands so impressed President Theodore Roosevelt that he wished to have it published by the Republican National Committee; Father Wynne presented it in the Messenger of the Sacred Heart, and secured justice for the friars.

Since 1923 Father Wynne was Vice-Postulator of the Cause of Kateri Tekakwitha, "the crown of the Jesuit Martyrs' labors and sacrifices." It would have brought him untold consolation to witness, during his lifetime, the beatification of the Lily of the Mohawks, but this was not to be. By lecture, leaflet, pamphlet and thousands of personal letters he has made Kateri known and loved throughout a large section of the world. Largely because of his efforts she was officially declared by the Church to have practised virtue in an heroic degree and she received the title of "Venerable" in 1942.

We, who knew Father Wynne's zealous and untiring efforts in promoting Venerable Kateri's Cause, feel assured that in her he has a powerful intercessor before the throne of God. We shall earnestly recommend his soul to her intercession and by our prayers and our efforts strive to hasten the day that would have rejoiced Father Wynne's heart — the day when the little Indian Maid will be officially enrolled among the Blessed.

A TRIBUTE

The passing of Father Wynne was the occasion of many a public tribute from the press. Prominent among these was the following editorial which appeared in the Brooklyn Tablet:

"With the death of Father John J. Wynne, S.J., the Society of Jesus has lost a true Religious, a great priest and one of her most illustrious scholars. A man known among men for his literary achievements, Father Wynne stood before his God last Tuesday evening to render what must have been a noble record of loyalty to the precepts of Christ and to the rule of his spiritual father, St. Ignatius Loyola. For he had not only a famous name and reputation but a character that was disciplined, was kind, was deeply spiritual, was humble. Those who were familiar with his tall, snow-white crowned figure and with his gentle manner know this world has lost one whose ideals and influence it could ill afford to lose.

"According to human standards Father Wynne accomplished many and tremendous tasks in his four score and ten years. He inspired that great international undertaking, the Catholic Encyclopedia. He was the first editor and founder of the national Catholic weekly, America, . . . and edited the Messenger of the Sacred Heart, which has been probably the most widely read Catholic family magazine for generations. He originated the practice of the Holy Hour in America. He popularized among the laity the habit of following the words of the priest at Mass by his translation of the Roman Missal into English.

But to Father Wynne himself the most satisfying labor of his life was the part he played in obtaining the recognition by the Universal Church of the sanctity of the North-American Martyrs. He worked and prayed, too, for the Beatification by the Church of the Indian maiden, Kateri Tekakwitha, but God did not grant him this consolation in his lifetime—

perhaps the prayers of the living faithful may bring it about.

"More than two years ago, on the occasion of his 70th anniversary as a Jesuit, Father Wynne wrote: 'Reviewing the past, what I like most to dwell upon is how God enables certain chosen servants to do wonders without material resources and to reap good from evil.' He was speaking of others, yet he, too, assuredly, was such a chosen servant. May he rest in peace."

MESSAGE OF SYMPATHY

"It was with deep, sincere grief I read in America of the death of our dear and revered Father Wynne, and so I hasten to beg you who have succeeded him in his arduous but glorious task to offer for his soul the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass as my gift to him. It is my thank offering for his care in the matter of my numerous needs. The answers and the help resulting from his prayers for us to the Venerable Tekakwitha, while I could not call them miraculous, were indeed very encouraging and comforting. And so I want to give thanks, and to beg the continuance of his benign intercession and that of her whose Cause he so zealously promoted. So I enclose my offering, and beg to continue as one of Tekakwitha's mendicant disciples."
