GOOD NEWS FROM FONDA

We are sure our good friend, Barnett Fowler, Times-Union, Albany, N. Y., staff writer will not mind if we quote largely from his full-page article of August 31, about what is being done so scientifically and successsfully, to find the actual site at Caughnawaga (Fonda, N. Y.) where Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha was baptized. We are sure, tom, that our readers distinguish between Ossemnenon, now the Shrine at Auriesville, N. Y., where Kateri was born; Caughnawaga at Fonda, where she was baptized; and Caughnatwaga, Canada, where she died, and where her major relics are now preserved.

At New York Caughnawaga, on the hill known as "Sand Flats," the complete outline off an Iroquois village or "castle" is being unearthed. When, and if, a special outline is uncovered, it may be that we have found the Chapel of St. Peter where the Lily of the Miohawks was baptized by Father James de Lamberville, S.J., on Easter Sunday, April 18, 1676.

NEW EXCAVATIONS

The labor at Fonda is not easy. Under diffection of the Very Rev. Thomas Grassmann, O.F.M.Conv., of the Mohawk-Caughnatwaga Museum, and Curator of the Tekakowitha Shrine, the initial step was taken May 30, 1950, when the village site was stocked out. A search for fragile remains hold by the earth for centuries, subject to the ravages of destruction that earthly acids

and time can impose, poses tremendous difficulties. It is not a question of a shovelful of dirt, a quick look, and then selecting old relics.

SLOW WORK

The Mohawk area is 1.46 acres. First the outline of the double stockade had to be determined. Scientists from Fordham University now working on the site of the protected village of Ossernenon, now Auriesville Shrine, and the Canadian scientists currently working in and around Midland, Ontario, to reconstruct the outlines of other Indian castles where Iesuit missioners worked, know how difficult it is. First a narrow shallow trench has to be dug. Then the first post-molds are found. Constant warfare was am accepted thing in the life of the Mohawks. They protected themselves by erecting palisades of logs, which they drove into the ground some thirty inches. Above ground these logs stood 15 feet or more.

THE CAUGHNAWAGA STORY

In 1693, the French in Canada came southward with vengeance and burned Caughnawaga. So, even in that year, the only part of the village intact was the underground part. Passing years rotted the wood, but in its rotting it left a blackened area in the yellow sands. These blackened areas, sometimes containing an organic core of a log, are the post molds.

More about this archeological work at Fonda, Auriesville, and Midland, Ontario, will be described in our next, and in later issues. Father Grassmann is to be congratulated for his successful search. He is one of Tekakwitha's most devoted apostles, and a visit to Fonda is a *must* for any devotee of the *Lily*.

TEKAKWITHA AT SHRUB OAK

Members of Tekakwitha League responded generously to the invitation of the late, great Father Wynne several years ago—so generously that the vision of Father Wynne of a Kateri Cabin, a Museum Memorial to Tekakwitha, has been an actuality since 1949, and is being constantly embellished at Auriesville.

We told you last year about the new glory received by the Lily in being importalized in bronze on the main door of St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City, and about how thrilled we were to see her right on Fifth Avenue.

We have another thought now which we would like to pass along to members of the League, friends of Kateri Tekakwitha—especially those who have experienced her power before God, and who are grateful to her for favors received.

The Jesuit Fathers are building, out of immediate necessity, a new seminary at Shrub Oak, near Peekskill, N. Y. This is territory in the state where Tekakwitha was born and baptized and suffered somewhat for her Faith. The men who will be trained in this new seminary are successors of Jogues and his companions, and of Father Lamberville who discovered the beauty of Tekakwitha's soul.

Surely Tekakwitha of all people, should be memorialized somehow at Shrub Oak. No chapel can as yet be dedicated to her, but we can at least have a seminarian's room or some other little spot there in her memory. Will you, who are friends of her, and thankful of her for past favors, help us here at League Headquarters to arrange for some such memorial? It will depend on what response you make, what type memorial we can have at Shrub Oak. A seminarian's room will cost \$3,000. We thought it best to aim at that amount first of all. If we can do better, fine.
