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DEVOTION, IMITATION, INVOCATION

Devotion—Veneration for Kateri Tekakwitha is not the ordinary esteem or fondnesss we have for famous persons or places, but the honor and affection—devotion—we should feel for heroine in God's service.

Compay her, and this is easy, since her virtues were manifested principally in love of the Cross, the Chapel, the Sacrifice of the Mass, Haily Communion, and the Rosary.

Invocation—The fact that Kateri has been officially proclaimed Venerable should confirm our belief that she has power to obtain blessings from God. This belief began with her death, and has never ceased. Our mail builges with reports of favors that come daily from priests, sisters, the laity, often from non-Catholics. TEKAKWITHA THE VIRGIN

The reopening of the Shrine at Auriesville for its annual pilgrimage season recalls the airways beacon maintained at Tekakwitha's birthplace by the U. S. Government, and the well-known poem about it from the pen of Father Alfred Barrett, S.J.

By courtesy of The Messenger of the Sacred Heart, here is the story of the poem: This story begins with a coincidence. Or did God plan it that way? Strange how Uncle Sam can sometimes serve the cause of piety—and poetry! But that is the point of the story.

He had been asked to write a poem, this Jesuit Father, who, in company with fellow priests of the Society of Jesus, was stationed on the very spot where Jesuits had died for Christ, three hundred years before, and where Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha, the Indian Maiden was born. He wanted to write that poem about the Jesuit Martyrs and the Lily of the Mohawks, but wanting was not enough, until Uncle Sam helped out.

The place was Auriesville, in the beautiful Mohawk valley of New York State. Government officials charged with the safeguarding of airways had chosen the summit of the hill where St. Isaac Jogues, St. Rene Goupil and St. John de Lalande were martyred, and where Kateri was later born, as an ideal spot for one of those airline beacons that dot the land. But,-the thought came one night long after bedtime,-how many flashes had the government assigned to the Aurieswille beacon? One glance from the window and the symbol for a poem was supplied: pulsing in the darkness were three red flashes, followed by a beam of white light, -modermity unwittingly honoring the three Jesuit Martyrs and the Lily of the Mohawks.

Ossernenon was the Indian name of Auriesville, and Ossernenon is the title of this poem that attempts to memorialize the holiest spot in America. This is the way it goes.

OSSERNENON

Along the Mohawk River strangers mark
An airline beacon flashing in the dark,
Nor pause to wonder why,
Above the piney summit of a hill
At Auriesville,
Beauty should so touch this particular sky.
Look! White—
And now three flashes play
Rose-red, as the circling beam
Completes its bright bouquet!

Oh, how beautiful is the chaste generation with glory,
How beautiful with light
The chaste generation, the elect, the few,
Whose story
That beacon tells at night!
For this was Ossernenon
This was an Indian town,
The heart of the savage wood.

Here once Father Jogues wept, climbing, Gazing down
In pity upon his Jerusalem;
Here he stood
Braving the imminent tomahawk;
Here he died;
And with him the woodsman, Lalande,
And before them Rene, the surgeon—
