NEW BIOGRAPHY

Maria Goretti, has just published (Bruce, \$3.00) a very readable biography of Tekakwitha under the title, Kateri of the Mohawks. The Rev. Henri Béchard, S.J., and the Rev. Thomas J. Coffey, S.J., Vice-Postulators for Canada and the United States respectively, both have forewords, and there is an introduction by the late Edmund J. Rhodebeck, M.D., Fellow of the New York Academy of Medicine. Miss Buehrle adheres closely to the facts about Kateri's life

as submitted to Rome in the Positio of the Historical Section of the Sacred Congregation of Rites. She has animated the marration with her own simple and colorful style. This book should do much to increase imterest in the Lily, and move us to storm heaven for the required miracles, so that the time will be hastened when, we hope and pray, she will be, at long last, Blessed and Saint. MORE ON THE MADONNA OF THE MOHAWKS

It was in 1669 that the statue of Ou! Lady of Foy was carried to New France. This we are told in the 1670 Relation: "Last wear there was sent to our Reverend Father Superior a statue of the Blessed Virgin, made of the wood of the oak in which was found several years ago a miraculous statue of Our Lady of Foy. Those who sent the statue manifested their wish that it should be set in a chapel where the savages commonly meet for their exercises of piety. There it is hoped they will honor the Mother of God and ask from her graces necessary for the conversion of all the nations of New France. This was sent to the little church which had just been completed in a settlement of the Hurons a short distance from Quebec."

On the removal of the Hurons from Que-

bec in 1675, the image was carried into what is now the Mohawk Valley, by Father James de Lamberville, where it was borne from village to village (Auriesville, etc.) and wenerated until the destruction of the missions by the English in 1684.

This is the statue which disappeared. It may have been destroyed in the fire, or it may have been, like its old-world model, concealed in the trunk of some tree. Most likely it is that the Christian Iroquois carried it with them in their flight to the safety of Canada. But thus far no trace of it has been found, though it has been eagerly sought. Several ancient wooden statues have been found in various places, but mone that answers exactly to the description of Our Lady of Foy.

Two hundred years after the destruction of the Mission of the Martyrs, devotion to Our Lady was revived at Auriesville, site of the martyrdoms of Jogues, Lalande and Goupil, and birthplace of Tekakwitha—under the title of Our Lady of Martyrs. There is a special fitness in this title. It is the idea which prevailed at Foy: not Our Lady of Faith, but Our Lady of Constancy. She stood by the Cross. She thus became Queen of Martyrs.

Popular conception of our Virgo Fidelis was confirmed by the action of the Church. The Mass of Our Lady of Martyrs was granted to the Church of Our Lady of Foy at Duay and at Tournay. And for ten years Our Lady was venerated under her old title at the Mohawk Mission, inaugurated at Au-

riesville in the blood of martyrs, blossoming at Fonda in the Baptism of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha by Father Lamberville, who had first carried the statue to this region.

Some years ago, through the generosity of the Mead family of Buffalo, a marble representation of Our Lady of Foy was made for the Shrine, and it is this image which is venerated in the Chapel of the Martyrs at Auriesville. In this there was no attempt to do other than idealize the original.

It is with joy that we add to our objects of devotion at the Shrine this actual replica of the image before which the Mohawk converts prayed. There is another copy enshrined at Tekakwitha Shrine on the north bank of the Mohawk, near Fonda, New York.
