IN MEMORIAM

On Tuesday, November 30, an Anniversary Mass was celebrated by Father Coffey at Our Lady's Altar, Church of St. Francis Xavier, New York City, for the soul of the late great Father John J. Wynne, S.J., in his

lifetime Postulator for the Causes of the North American Martyrs and Kateri Teka-kwitha. The Mass was attended by the staff of the League and that of the Catholic Encyclopedia.

AN OLD FRIEND RETIRES

The Most Reverend Edmund F. Gibbons, who recently relinquished his office as Bishop of Albany to the Most Reverend William Scully, has been the great and good friend of Kateri's Cause from the very beginning.

The Diocese of Albany to which Bishop Gibbons gave his complete devotion for the past more than thirty-six years, has the distinction of being the only diocese in the United States mentioned in the Divine Office of the Church. That is because Albany is the diocese which has to its credit canonized Saints—Isaac Jogues, Rene Goupil and John de Lalande.

Long before His Excellency was consecrated Bishop of Albany, the Process for the canonization of the Jesuit Martyrs of North America had been instituted in Quebec; but soon after his consecration he was authorized by Cardinal Begin, of Quebec, to receive testimony to the history of the holiness and martyrdom of these heroes and their companions who died for the faith.

Bishop Gibbons' devotion to the Martyrs did not begin with his advent to Albany. In the Diocese of Buffalo, where he had labored as a priest, the Martyrs had always been honored with special veneration. To bring the devotion home to him, one of the Sisters teaching at his parish school, St. Theresa's, attributed her remarkable cure, miraculous as many considered it, to prayers during a nine day visit to the Shrine at Auriesville. Sister Mercedes is still living.

The Bishop's devotion is not confined to the Martyrs of Auriesville. He venerates all the Christians, Indian and French, who suffered for the Faith on or near that sacred place, and particularly Kateri Tekakwitha, Lily of the Mohawks, who was born there and who is regarded as the fruit of the Martyrs' blood. To him and the tribunal of priests of his diocese, whom he selected to conduct the initial Process for the beatification of Kateri, is due special credit for the care with which they observed the canons regulating such work.

When the late Father Wynne remarked to the one who would have to guide this Cause in Rome that very likely the Process would be instituted in the Diocese of Albany, the hearty rejoinder was: "Fine! The Bishop there has a reputation for doing all things properly." When the Report of the Process reached Rome, the comment of many was: "Seldom has a Process of Beatification been better prepared and documented."

That is why the Cause has advanced so favorably, and why Tekakwitha is already Venerable. Bishop Gibbons purchased the site of her Baptism, above Fonda, now in possession of the Conventual Franciscans, with the zealous Father Thomas Grassmann making remarkable progress in identifying the old Caughnawaga site.

The thanks and prayers of Tekakwitha League go with Bishop Gibbons as he begins his "second spring" amid the serene environs of Mater Christi Seminary where he will make his home.

We know, too, that Bishop Scully is equally interested in the advancement of Tekakwitha's Cause. It remains for us, her friends and clients, to storm Heaven for her early glorification.
