TEKAKWITHA'S EASTER

The Mohawks were ready for a pageant. So they set themselves with a will to make Easter Sunday, April 18, 1676 a gay occasion. Outside the bark prayer house of the Christians at Caughnawaga on the River Mohawk, the Iroquois chiefs and braves, mothers and maidens were buzzing and grunting in festiwe confusion. Beaver and lynx pelts bedecked the chapel walls, with loops, here and there, of colored beads and wampum. Up to the front door the braves had planted a double row of evergreens. All the excitement in the air was due to two events — the Great White Feast, and the Baptism Day of the niece of one of their own great chiefs.

The dusky twenty-year-old maiden Tekakwitha walked tremblingly up the wooded avenue and up to the font where Father de Lamberville, S.J., was waiting. "That day', he was to recall later on, 'was the most beautiful one of my apostolic career'. Eyes were riveted on this unusually humble and pious girl. There were the usual ritual prayers, the customary anointings and signs of the Cross, that same sign for which Rene Goupil had been tomahawked thirty-four years earlier by these same Indians just across the river and a few miles to the east. Then, amid flowing waters - 'Catherine, I baptize you'. Truly now she was a child of God, - Catherine, - and still so ummistakably an aboriginal - Tekakwitha.

AND HER FINAL HOLY WEEK

It was the beginning of Holy Week, 1680. Tekakwitha, now called the 'Saint' by her fellows because of her extraordinary piety and penances, — had been stricken a year before with an ailment which left her with chironic fever and stomach pains. And for the past two months her chest had been constructed and her strength ebbed slowly. But she kept up her night watches, fasting and round of works. And when she could do no more she took to her bed. The Indian sick were taken to the Church on a plank of wood. But not Kateri. The priest brought Our Lord to her. The men were out hunt-

ing. The women were in the fields or woods with their daily drudgery. Kateri was left alone with a plate of sagamite and a little water within her reach.

On Tuesday she began to sink and she received Holy Viaticum with conscious fervor. She called for her best friend, Mary Teresa Tegaioguenta, the recovered alcoholic. I am leaving you, Teresa', she said. I am going to die. Always remember what we have done together. If you change I shall accuse you before God. Keep up your courage. Don't mind the jibes of those who have no faith. Listen to the Fathers. If you

cannot serve God here, go to the Lorette Mission. Never give up your penances. I will love you in heaven. I will pray for you. I will help you".

She must have known the day and hour of her death. After Father Cholonec had given her Viaticum on Tuesday morning, he wanted to get the Holy Oils. 'There is no burry', she said, 'the time has not come yet. So he waited until Wednesday morning. Tuesday night two members of her Sodality were assigned, as was the custom, to stay with her by turn during the night. The younger of the two asked and received Father Cholonec's permission to go to the woods to do penance that Tekakwitha would have a happy death. Kateri sensed this and sent for the girl. She told her: 'You are very pleasing to God and I shall pray for you in Heaven. I know where you have been and what you have done. Keep up your courage. I know you are pleasing in the sight of God and I will help you when I am with Him.'

Wednesday morning she was anointed. The Fathers thought that she would die before noon. But she knew this was not so. Teresa and some of the sodalists who had formed a small devotional society with Kateri, which was continued after her death as 'Catherine's Sisters', said they wanted to be with her when she died. But they had to go out to get wood for the feast days, and they didn't know whether to go or to remain.

Father Cholonec asked her about it. 'Let them go to the woods', she told him, -'they will be back in time'. And that is how it happened. Until three o'clock her condition did not change. When they returned she waited until they all were in the lodge. Said Father Cholonec: 'I saw this marvel with my own eyes. As soon as the last one was accounted for she entered into her gentle agony. She had kept her promise. Speech left ber while she was pronouncing the words, Iesus, Mary. More than that. Hen face had been disfigured ever since she was four years old, and her infirmities and penances made it worse. Yet around quarter after three such a beautiful change came about that I cried out in astonishment. I had the Indians call the Father who was decorating the Repository for Holy Thursday. Everybody came on the run. To me it seemed that at that precise moment she must have entered into Heaven, reflecting on her chaste body a small ray of the glory of which her soul had taken possession!

Two Frenchmen chanced by her lodge on Holy Thursday morning. 'Well, there's a young woman who is having a nice peaceful sleep', they said. When told it was Tekakwitha in death, they knelt to pray, and then rushed out to make her a coffin. Other Indians were buried on a board with their faces covered. But not their Kateri. Nothing was too good for her. They all mound: 'We have lost our saint.'
