## MORE INDIAN SAINTS?

We noted in the Spring LILY that joint breatification and canonization are being sought for 116 martyrs who died for the Faith on American soil. The list was compiled by Archbishop John Mark Gannon of Errie, Pa., and sent to the Congregation of Rites at Rome by Cardinal Dougherty, late Archbishop of Philadelphia. One of the researchers was the late Father John Wynne, S.J., first American Vice-Postulator for Katerri's Cause.

Since then a carefully prepared book has been published under the direction of Archbishop Gannon. It is edited by Msgr. James Prowers, Secretary of the Commission appointed by direction of the American hierarchy. The volume contains the basic stories of heroes who died for the Faith here, beginning with Fr. John de Padilla, O.F.M., who died in Kansas territory in 1542,—and emding with Archbishop Charles Seghers, martyred in Alaska in 1886.

Of special interest to clients of Tekakwitha will be three Indians whose martyrdiom seems worthy of consideration. When William III was acknowledged as king of the Colony of New York, the only Catholics in the territory of the Five Nations of the Irroquois were the few lingering converts made by the Jesuit Fathers in the period of the missions, and the French and Indian captives brought in by the war parties of braves, many of them to die in torments at the stake, after enduring the most refined torture at the hands of their own people rather than give up or deny the Faith that was in them.

Two women and one man of Kateri's race have been chosen as most worthy of the honors of martyrdom. They are Stephen Tegananokoa, martyred 1690; Frances Gonannhatenha, 1692; and Margaret Garangouas, 1692. All three were martyred at Onandaga, in what is now the Diocese of Syracuse.

STEPHEN was an edifying Christian of the Sault Saint Marie Mission, who was captured by Cayuga Indians and taken to Onandaga where he was mutilated, tortured, and finally killed. To his executioners he finally said: "I willingly give my life for a God Who shed all His Blood for me". In the eyes of the torturers his unforgivable fault was that he had left his own canton to join the Christian Mission. Before he was dispatched they said: "Pray!" "Yes", he said, "I will pray,"-and as well as he could he made the sign of the Cross with his fettered hands. Furious at this they hacked off his fingers. "Now pray to your God", they cried. Again he made a feeble effort to make the sign of the Cross. "Do with me as you will", his last words were, "I am a Christian and I glory in being one."

FRANCES, two years later, was made a prisoner with her husband and some others and taken to Onandaga. On the scaffold she professed her Faith with heroism, and that

same sign of the Cross which was the death warrant for Rene Goupil fifty years earlier at Auriesville, became the cause of her killing. One of her kinsmen sprang to the scaffold, tore off the crucifix that hung on her breast and cut a cross deep into her flesh. "There", he shouted, "is the cross you love so much!" "Thank you, brother", she replied, "the cross you have wrenched from me I might lose,—but the one you give me I cannot lose even in death". She urged the Indians to become Christians, assured them of her forgiveness, was tortured for three days until finally her brave life ended in a shower of stones.

MARGARET was the daughter of the Tododaho, hereditary chief of the Iroquois League. Taken prisoner in her mative field she was taken to Onandaga, there to endure fearful torments for her Faith. The only words escaping from her lips were "Jesus, Mary and Joseph". She asked for water once, but then reflected: "My Savior suffered great thirst when dying for me,—why should I not suffer the same torment for Him?" From noon to sunset they heaped sufferings on her until at last they threw her quivering body on a pile of wood and consumed her.

## THE CAUSE

Two new books on Kateri are in the making, to be published by Farrar, Cudahy, and Benziger respectively. The three-act play prepared by Mary Productions, Belford, N. J., is obtainable there. We wish we

could give some reassuring news about the status of the Cause in Rome, but must continue our prayerful, watchful waiting. Meantime, keep sending in to us reports of favors attributed to Kateri's intercession.

## KATERI'S TOMB YIELDS TO PROGRESS

The Mission of St. Francis Xavier was founded by Fr. Peter Raffeix, S.J., in 1667 at what is now La Prairie, Quebec. In the course of time it moved five times. Kateri died at the second site in 1680. Excavation at the fourth site (1696-1717) recently rediscovered, upon land expropriated by the St. Lawrence Seaway, will be renewed at the expense of Kateri's Cause. Frs. Jacques de Lamberville, S. J., and Jacques Bruyas, S.J.,

intimately connected with Tekakwitha, are believed to be buried there. Practically all the riverside from Kateri's cenotaph at Cote Ste-Catherine to the western limit of Caughnawaga is being transformed into an immense canal, which is changing the physical aspect of the Mission. At the spot where Kateri died, the chamber of the lock will contain 24,000,000 gallons of water.
