Impatient?

The late Pope Pius XII said to a Bishop who was curious (as aren't we all?) about the time it takes to beatify someone: "The answer is prayer. Prayer brings miracles. Miracles bring the Church's approval!"

It's as simple (but as hard) as all that! We can't help feeling that the earnest, confident prayers of Kateri's clients in the U. S., Canada, and everywhere throughout the patient years will lead shortly to her glorification. This journal, which has been delayed this time because we were awaiting something definite to tell, has tried to keep you posted all along. You, our readers, will be the first to know when the Lily has jumped all the canonical hurdles (15 out of 20 so far!) in the way of her beatification.

Your prayers are still, as always needed; your reports of what seems to be clear proof of her intercessory power; and, as the Cause comes to a climax, an occasional offering towards our increasing office expenses.

New Tekakwitha Center

A little more than a year ago we returned to the Mohawk Valley to be closer to the scene of Kateri's birth, Baptism, and holy life. Tekakwitha League is now established at Auriesville, N. Y., site of the martyrdoms (1642-46) of St. Isaac Jogues, S.J., priest, Rene Goupil, S.J., Brother, and John Lalande, lay apostle, - all three canonized in June, 1930. There are memorial altars and exquisite statues in honor of these three saints in the palisaded sanctuary of the Coliseum at the Martyrs' Shrine there. There is an unnamed altar and an empty pedestal, too. It awaits the blessed day when Kateri, "lady-too-longin-waiting" comes into her own and takes her place alongside her brothers in Christ.



Dramatic Moment at the Vatican:

Camillo Corsanego, Dean of the Consistorial Advocates, petitions His Holiness, Pope John XXIII, at St. Peter's to hasten the Beatification of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha, Venerable Bishop Neumann, C.SS.R., fourth Bishop of Philadelphia, the Canonization of Blessed Martin

de Porres, and of Pere Sharbel, a Lebanese monk of the Maronite Rite. In the Public Consistory which Pope John called on January 19, 1961, in the Basilica of St. Peter, on the occasion of the conferring of "red hats" on four new Cardinals, our *Tekakwitha* was honored by having an important Roman official implore the Holy Father in pure and sonorous Latin, to hasten the day when this white flower of the Mohawks, first of the sorely-tried North American Indian family to be presented as candidate for the honors of the altar, might be elevated to

the title of "Blessed." Since the memorable day depicted above, Martin de Porres has been canonized. Bishop Neumann's cause, according to authentic news dispatches, has accelerated considerably. It is up to devotees of *Kateri* everywhere to keep storming heaven that the Mohawk-Algonquin girl, marvelous maid of Auriesville, who "dared to be different," whose life, Pope Pius XI said "is a miracle," may soon be offered to America and the world, and to long-suffering peoples everywhere, as a model as well as a marvel.

KATERI AND YOU

Her Life

In 1656, the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha was born of a Christian Algonquin mother Kahenta (Flower of the Prairie) and of a pagan Iroquois father Chief Kenhoronkwa in the little village, Ossernenon, now Auriesville, New York on the south side of the Mohawk River where St. Isaac Jogues, Jesuit priest, St. Rene Goupil, Jesuit brother, St. John LaLande, lay apostle had shed their blood for the Faith ten years (1642-46) before: "The blood of Christians is the seed!"

In 1660 disaster engulfed Tekakwitha: Kahenta, her loving mother, Kenheronkwa, her proud father, Otsikehta (Honey) her baby brother Fell to the foul fury of smallpox. It left her an orphan, pockmarked, dim of vision, shy. Onsegongo, a pagan uncle took her in.

Baptized in 1676 on the other side of the river at Caughnawaga, now Fonda she ran the gauntlet of sneers and hatred against the Prayer!

Next year she bravely ran away from corruption to fervor to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier at Sault St. Louis, Lachine Rapids, Quebec. "We are sending you a treasure" Her blackrobe sponsors said: "guard it well!"

There she rose to holiness, there she made her first Communion Christmas Day, 1677;
There she pronounced her vow of perpetual virginity Annunciation Day, 1679; there she died April 17, 1680 with Mary's and Jesus' names on her lips. She was 24.

Meaning of Her Life

Today, and since 1943
She is "Venerable Kateri"
Venerable at 24?
Why not?
The Book of Wisdom says:
"The understanding of a man is old age, and a spotless life is gray hairs."
Kateri is God's answer to the charity of the Jesuit Martyrs, of the first missionaries to New France, to New York.

She was a laywoman who achieved sanctity in the world a first convert, non-martyr whose virtues were declared heroic super-mansized! by Holy Mother Church.

She was not "white"; She helps us to lay our finger on the Christianity of those who call themselves Christian.

More and ever more this white flower of the Mohawks is becoming the inspiration of "underdog" peoples on both sides of the iron curtain, the bamboo curtain, the cactus curtain, the color barrier; — people are getting to know her as a marvel and a model.
