INITIATION CEREMONIES MARK KATERI'S FEAST DAY

Venerable Kateri's feast day, April 17, 1970, marked the initiation at Hogansburg, N.Y., of Father Joseph McBride S.J., vice-postulator, and Mary-Eunice Spagnola, actress and writer, as honorary members into the Mohawk Nation as a chief and as a princess.

"This honor or privilege of becoming honorary members of the Indian Tribe," commented Father Michael Jacobs S.J., Mohawk priest in charge of the initiation ceremonies, "is generally conferred upon people who have given outstanding contributions to the Indian cause or have worked constantly to spread the fame and

glory of one of their ancestors of the 17th Century."

The greatest name in the history of the Five Nations of the Iroquois is the Mohawk Maiden, Kateri Tekakwitha, known throughout the United States and Canada as the "Lily of the Mohawks." Kateri, a Mohawk, born in 1656, was the daughter of a Mohawk Chief and of an Algonquin Christian mother who was

captured near Three Rivers, Quebec.

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In this special plan of Divine Providence Kateri represents the two greatest nations of North America, the Algonquin Nation of Canada, and the Iroquois Nation of New York State. When she is beatified and canonized she will be the first native of North America to receive these honors of the Roman Catholic Church. Her cause is being vigorously advanced both in the United States and Canada. Kateri was declared a Venerable in 1943 by Pope Pius XII.

Kateri Tekakwitha Father Joseph McBride will be given the name of Chief Rakeni Karonhiio, Chief Father Beautiful Blue Skies, Mary-Eunice will receive the name of Princess Kateri Kasenniiostha, "she who makes the name of Kateri beautiful."

The initiation was conducted by Princess Esther Phillips, assisted by Chief Peter Gorrow and Chief Louic Sunday, Mrs. Annie LaHarbe, Mrs Mae Monteeur, and Mrs. Agatha Taylor-Foote.

Flanked by Chief Gorrow and Chief Sunday Father McBride was first tested as to his ability to assume the staunch role of a chief. After the pro-

clamation by Princess Esther he was led in a dance by the two chiefs, then was directed to do the dance alone. All this met the approval of the committee and Father was presented with the chief's head-dress, the Bear Tribe jacket, a belt and the peace pipe.

Mary-Eunice was cited for her acting roles in portraying Kateri's life and for her writing skits about Kateri, expecially for her one act play "Maid of the Mohawks." She, too, had to engage in a dance, then was presented with a beader necklace and head band.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed in St. Regis Church, Father Henri Bechard S.J., vice-postulator for Canada, was celebrant and the famed choir from Caughnawaga sang.

The final ceremonies took place at the Kateri Center in the village of Hogansburg. Father Bechard, Father McBride and Mary-Eunice spoke. The choir again sang. And prayers to Kateri in French, Mohawk and English were recited before the outdoor statue of Kateri on Route 37.

"You are wonderful people" Fr. McBride opened his remarks. Then he described how so many folks in the United States and Canada are attracted to Kateri because of the wonderful life she led. He mentioned how he has noticed the generosity, the willingness to do things, and the beauty of the

Mohawks in the members of the choir, in the young princesses who danced in the Auriesville Colisium last year, and in the grand people responsible for this memorable event today. "Is it any wonder that you are so wonderful? You are the reflections of the Lily of the Mohawks now in her glory in heaven!", Father concluded his talk.

A banquet in Kateri Hall climaxed the series of events which had started at three o'clock in the afternoon on the banks of the beautiful St. Lawrence River.

SIOUX ERECT KATERI STATUE

Thirteen years ago at the end of 1956 the much loved superior of St. Francis Mission, South Dakota, Fr. Joseph P. Zuercher S.J. was sick with terminal cancer. A novena in honor of Kateri Tekakwitha for his cure was made by everyone at St. Francis Mission School and by many Sioux throughout the Reservation from Christmas day 1956 to January 2, 1957.

At the time a shrine in honor of Kateri was promised. It was the thought of all at the Reservation that this shrine would be erected whether or not God chose to grant Fr. Zuercher's cure through Kateri's

intercession. It was God's will to call Fr. Zuercher and he died in April, 1957.

Hundreds witnessed this promise fulfilled on Sunday afternoon, May 10, 1970. An impressive program worked out by Fr. Bernard D. Fagan S.J., superior of the Mission, included the Celebration of the Liturgy, blessing of the Statue, a feast for the public, and a pow-wow.

Attending were Bishop Harold J. Dinmerling, bishop of Rapid City, South Dakota, Fr. Michael Jacobs S.J., a Mohawk Indian of the same tribe as Kateri, Fr. Joseph McBride S.J., vice - postulator of the cause of Kateri in the United States, Fr. Henri Bechard S.J., vice - postulator in Canada, and the people who made the shrine possible.

With the help of local people a fund was begun

Fr. Joseph Karol S.J. took a special interest in the project and contacted F. Bechard of Canada who assured him that it was possible to get an exact replica of the statue of Kateri at the national shrine in Canada. The well-known sculptor of the original, Mr. Emile Brunet, still had the mold and agreed to do the new statue.

Some very generous benefactors interested in the Sioux people, Mrs DeMaris Birmingham and Miss Barbara Birmingham of O'Neill, Nebraska, offered to donate the considerable sum needed. Two more friends, Mr. James Stengel and Mr. Jack Stengel who operate the Dakota Quarry at Milbank, S.D., offered to give and have inscribed a beautiful granite pedestal. Brother Joseph Schwart S.J. with his Indian staff agreed to do the erection of the statue. The statue was done in Paris, France.

Fr. Fagan pointed out that the erection and blessing of the Kateri Statue culminates the highpoints in the history of the St. Francis Mission. In recalling the Mission's history Father stated that not long after the Brule (Sicangu) Tribe of the Sioux Nation was settled in the area of the present Rosebud Reservation in south central South Dakota, its chiefs led by Spotted Tail frequently requested that Black Robes (Sina Sapa) come to teach their children. The Sioux had never forgotten the earlier visits of Fr. DeSmet as far back as 1839. They sent delegations both to Washington and to Bishop Martin Marty of the Dakota Territory. In 1885 a building was begun on land donated by the Tribe. This building was made possible by the generosity of Katherine Drexel, later the foundress of the Blessed Sacrament Sisters. Bishop Marty entrusted the new mission to the Jesuit Fathers and Franciscan Sisters. Father John Jutz S.J. took charge of the mission on January 1, 1886, and Mother Kostka, O.S.F., came with the Franciscan Sisters in March of the same vear.

The eighty four years since that time have been a steady growth of Christ's Kingdom among the Rosebud Sioux. Today the school has an attendance of 475 students. The small group approach is made possible by a large faculty of Indian Aids, Lay Volunteers, Franciscans and Jesuits. In recent years the mission chapels, once 30 in number and visited only once a month or several times a year, have been consolidated to make it possible for each of the main communities to have Holy Mass every Sunday. An Indian Lay Advisory Board helps determine the direction of the apostolate. Serious thought is being given to a program for Sioux who may be called to serve the Lord as catechists, deacons, and priests.

- * CURRENTLY THE FIRST FRIDAY MASSES for League Members is being offered by Fr. William Rively S.J., a missionary stationed on Lukunor of the Caroline Islands. This is to memorialize the fact that Kateri was helped to become a Christian through the Black Robes who came from France to plant the Faith in North America. We in turn now help a missionary bring the Faith to others thousands of miles from the United States.
- * ON MARCH 20 WE SAID GOODBY to Fr. Ronald Sams S.J. who founded the Jesuit Bureau and now takes up a new assignment on Guam. Fr. Sams was my landlord. The Jesuit Bureau is the supply organ for missionaries of the New York Province. Through his many suggestions about promotion and printing Father Sams contributed much to the progress of the League. Therefore, the League extends its thanks to him and wishes him many blessings as he succeeds Bishop Neylon in training prospects for the religious life. We are assured that the name of Kateri will be well publicized in the Trust Territory of the Pacific and that a shrine to Kateri will be erected on Guam, an island of 90,000 inhabitants.
- * A SCRIPT FOR A MOVIE ON THE LIFE of Kateri and authored by Mary Eunice of Mary Productions is now ready. Film companies will be contacted to produce the film. If you know of any producer interested please write to me immediately.
- * FR. RONALD GRAY, O. CARM., director of the Conference A Month Club, Teaneck, N.J., took upon himself the extra work of including a copy of the last LILY in his January mailing.

The Savings Account primarily is to finance any investigations into cures and the beatification process. This present burden forbids expenditure on needed repairs and desirable improvements.
