

The Holy Jamily and Kateri

Over the main altar of the Holy Family Chapel in the Tuscarora Reservation, Lewiston, N.Y., hangs the painting of the Holy Family as you see on this LILY's front page. From Document X in the POSITIO, the compilation of data on Kateri's life submitted to Rome for the introduction of her cause, we obtain the reason why such a painting is prominent in an Indian Chapel and why we should print it in connection with Venerable Kateri.

Holy Family Influence

"Monseigneur de Laval, farst Bishop of Quebec, a prelate full of zeal for his flock, had already established the devotion of the Holy Family in his episcopal city as a very suitable means to sanctify it. It produced a great deal of good in effect among the families, and still does constantly, to the edification of the entire country. From Quebec this devotion spread to other parishes with the same results. From the French it came to the Indians, so that the Father in charge of the mission which is now at the Sault and which had its beginning at the Prairie de la Madeleine, deemed it proper to establish the Confraternity of the Holy Family there, as a good means of maintaining and increasing the fervor of that new church. It was decided, however, only to admit a few of the more fervent people of both sexes, so as to give a higher idea of it and to oblige the members who were honored by such a great grace to respond by the holiness of their lives. Im this they did not fail, because the Inclians, once they have given themselves to God, are capable of the greates t and the most whole-hearted devotion. The small number of chosen somuls upheld its new character by an exemplary piety, some were even so a listere that the rest of the village looked upon them with a sort of veneration, and to call a person a saint or a member of the Holy Family was to same one and

the same thing, so that they kept this name afterwards as a special sign in the mission. Katherine, who was still very young, and had only been at the Sault for approximately seven to eight months, was admitted to this small number, to which others were received only at an advanced age and after several years of probation."

Proves to be a Most Worthy Member

"But, as we have already pointed out, her virtue placed her above the rule for the ordinary people of the village, and they, moreover, far from being jealous, generally approved of her election. The members of the Holy Family especially showed their joy, looking upon Katherine as capable of sustaining of herself alone this saintly society by her good example. She was the only one who considered that she herself was unworthy, such humble ideas did she have of herself: but the more she thought of her unworthiness, the more she thought it a duty to work for her perfection, so as not to lower the fervor of the Confraternity, to which she gave a new re-nown by her own. What is certain is that the memory of her alone was sufficient to inspire for a long time, and continues to inspire the fervor of many others."

The Glory of the Indian Race

Today Kateri can also lead her people to God more than ever. "The Glory of the Indian Race" is the inscription on the bronze statue recently dedicated by the Sioux in South Dakota. While some lament our efforts to have her beatified and canonized, the more she is extolled the more of a moral force she becomes in imparting to her people the real meaning of life. Our Indian brothers and sisters can accomplish much on their own as long as they are inspired, sparked, and motivated by their chiefest boast - Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha.

PRAYER POWER EMPHASIZED AT BAPTISMAL SITE

"In assigning September 5 as a Kateri Day of Prayer," declared Bishop Edwin B. Broderick, Bishop of Albany, "I do so with a sense of pride and of necessity. With pride because in our own diocese was born the Lily of the Mohawks, one who led a very holy life amidst the most adverse circumstances. With a sense of necessity because we are looking for a saint for the seventies."

There was a sense of pride and of necessity in the group that filled St. Peter's Memorial Chapel, Fornia, N.Y., for the special holy hour from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. on this day.

All who were in the chapel felt pride because they were associated with the Kateri cause and because they felt the pride the bus load of Kateri's descendents from the St. Regis Reservation, Ho-



gansiburg, N.Y., displayed by their presence. (See picture above).

Necessity brought everyone to Kateri's baptismal site for everyone knew how necessary it is to exert the power of prayer in furthering the process leading to the beatification and canonization of Wanerable Kateri.

Leading the prayers were Fr. William Schlaerth, former vice postulator, Fr. Henri Bechard, vice postulator for Canada, Fr. Michael Jacobs from St. Regis, Fr. Thomas Egan, Martyrs' Shrine director, and Fr. Joseph McBride, vice postulator for the United States.

Singing for the occasion was supplied by the voices of the Sisters of the Resurrection (See picture at bottom) from Mt. Loretto in Amsterdam, N. M. One of the foremost organists in the country was with them, Sister Theresia, C.R. The entire group ended the prayer event with a hymn in homor of Kateri, "The Lily of the Mohawks" by Rev. J.B. Crowe.

The core of the holy hour was the Scriptural Rosary before the exposed Blessed Sacrament. After each mystery a section of the poem by Marilyn Eynon Scott was read and meditated upon. The poem was mailed to all League Members on August 10.

Catholic newspapers all over the country carried the invitation of Bishop Broderick to join in prayer to ask Almighty God to bring about the one first class miracle needed for Kateri's beatification.

Father Thomas Grassmann, OFM Conv., curator of the Mohawk Caughnawaga Museum and of the St. Peter's Chapel at Fonda, along with his new assistant, Father Manus McGettigan, welcomed the pilgrims to the hour of prayer.

A concelebrated Mass in the Coliseum at Auriesville, N.Y., followed at four o'clock, the birthplace of the Lily of the Mohawks.



Proud Moments Associated With Chief's Regalia

Chief Rakeni Karonhiio or Chief Blue Skies, otherwise known as Father McBride, the vice postulator, received another valuable part of his regalia after the performance in the Martyr's Shrine Coliseum, Sept 5.

A genuine cow-hide skin jacket given to Father McBride was made by the women of the St. Francis Xavier Reservation, Caughnawaga, Canada. On the back are the emblems in skillfully designed bead-work of the three clans of the Mohawks, the Bear, the Turtle, and the Wolf. The honorary chief belongs to the Turtle Clan because this is the one to which Kateri belonged.

Often Father is asked why "Blue Skies"? According to Father Michael Jacobs, of the St. Regis Reservation, one who preaches must have his listeners turn their eyes upwards to heaven, and for the Indians heaven was the blue skies.

In the talks Father McBride gives on Kateri he points out that he accepted this honor in order to feel he was more of an Indian and in order to sense his belonging to the people who are the descendants of Venerable Kateri. His pride in "belonging" urges an increase of effort to work for all the American Indians in whatever way he can to see that justice is meted out to them as the Indians are asserting themselves to regain what was taken



KATERI STORY TOLD AT 17 PERFORMANCES

To promote the Kateri cause was the objective of the 17 performances staged by Mary-Eunice and Joe Spagnola and Father McBride from May 21 to June 17, 1970. Many new friends were made and many new possibilities for advancing the cause were open.

The audiences ranged from school children to senior citizens, from infirmaries to club meetings. With one or two exceptions the program included monologues by Mary-Eunice entitled "Death of Kateri", "Newly-Weds", and "Kateri As She Speaks From Heaven", followed by slide lecture by Father McBride.

Amsterdam Beginning

The first performance took place at Mt. Loretto Resz Home in Amsterdam, N.Y., which is under the supervision of the Sisters of the Resurrection. On this occasion Father Thomas Egan, director of the Martyrs' Shrine in Auriesville, commented on the slides shown.

The next stop was at Hamburg, N.Y., where the show was staged for the Sisters of the Good Shepherd and their friends. Sister Gemma and Sister Cortona outdid themselves in making posters describing the work of the League. Later these posters appeared in the Kateri Museum at Auriesville.


Turning Point at Heights

When just a small child, she lost her parents...... she suffered from smallpox, which hurt her eyes and left her face marked......but she was happy, because in her heart she carried the love of God.

People hurt her......they said she was trying to be good.......she would not commit sin with them......to save her soul she fled many miles in a canoe......she went to a place where she could live and love God......this was the most important thing in her life.

They told her she should marry......many braves tried to make her give into them......but she gave her life to God......she made a vow of chastity......and she lived it out......When life was so hard she was sad......she went into the woods and found there a quiet place, a place where she could talk to God and listen to his voice......Her body wore out early in her life......her soul was strong with the love of God. As the winds sigh through the woods, the birds sing, the sun shines on our pines and prairies, we hear the hoofbeats of the horses of our famous chiefs and warriors, we hear the pounding of the buffalo hooves across the meadows, we see the smoke from the campfires rise from the tipi flaps......before us the faces of Crazy Horse, Sitting Bull, Hollow Horn Bear......all the great chiefs of the Sioux......we see Tecumseh, Cochise, Old Joseph......great chiefs of other Indian nations - we see the faces of men who were great in Indian history - great because they fought for their people......and we see the face of Kateri - great because she taught her people how to live, how to love God, how to walk the path of life.

We hail you, Kateri......we honor you......we, your brothers and sisters, thank you for showing us the Indian way of life, of eternal life......we ask you to bless us, to protect us, to speak to God for us - we your Indian brothers and sisters.

The City of Detroit and the state of Michigan now has an official representative of the Kateri Tekakwitha League in the person of Chet Adams, 19901 Woodbine, Detroit, Michigan, 48219. Chet was umanimously elected to the Board of Directors at a recent meeting.

Mr. Adams is presently working with Father Thomas M. Dominiak, director of the Catholic Shrine in upper Michigan, to formulate plans for a dedication ceremony of a Kateri statue next year. The Indian River shrine will one day be known as the Shaine of the Lily of the Mohawks.

During the recent Kateri tour Chet arranged for the program at St. Isaac Jogues Chruch and through his daughter, Marilyn, at St. Michael's elementary school.

The Detroit agent is a man of dynamic energy and scintillating ideas. He holds a responsible position with a real estate company. This alone consumes hours of his day, yet he writes, contacts newspapers, pastors, and clubs im order to popularize the Kateri cause. He is working on a concise, descriptive leaflet giving details of Kateri's life and the work of the league.

He resides with his wife Cecile, daughter and son. His married daughter, Marilyn, is an elementary school teacher.

Some Of Kateri's Answers

ASSESSMENT LOWER - Early this year I prayed to Kateri that the tax assessment on an unfinished house we own would not be excessive. Our prayer was answered and the assessment is even lower than we had hoped. Now we pray that we can sell this same property. I also prayed that a friend of mine would be able to sell her home as she is ill with Arthritis. She did sell it and received the amount that she wanted for it. All thanks to God and to wonderful Kateri who intercedes for us. — Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin.

ESOPHAGUS CLEARED - For two or more years I have been seeking a cure for a stricture in the lower part of the esophagus. After making a novena and praying to Kateri Tekakwitha I located a doctor who has almost completely cured me. It is a rare occasion when I have any difficulty swallowing. I wanted you to know this cure which I attribute to the intercession of Kateri. I have another intention I wish you to pray for. My brother-in-law has been afflicted with a heart attack and partial stroke. If it is God's will I ask to have him restored to health. - Portland, Oregon. NORMAL LIFE NOW - Father, I have written reports and thanksgivings to your office at different times for what amounted to miracles in my humble opinion. The last one dated 1/15/70 was an overnight improvement in the critical condition of my niece, Eileen. I would like to tell you now that her improvement continued. She spent a few weeks in a private hospital and continued under a psychiatrist's care until he discharged her. During this period she returned to business and was leading a normal life. She was happily married on May 16, 1970. - Philadelphia, Pa.

HEMMORHOIDS DISAPPEARED - Recently I had been suffering terribly with swollen hemmorhoids for which I tried several forms of medication, but without success. I was sure that surgery would be the only solution because the discomfort was becoming unbearable. But, as usual, I sought spiritual help, and remembering that Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha had granted a favor to my mother some years ago (also pertaining to relief of a physical infection), I prayed to Kateri Tekakwitha to intercede to Our Lord for me that I may be healed without surgery. I was astonished several days ago when I realized that the swollen tissue had shrunk and healed beautifully. I am positive that it was the result of her intercession on my behalf. I also wish to mention that when I told my mother about this, she then told me that she had also been praying every day to Kateri Tekakwitha for me.

Ours is a very religious family and I feel it is my obligation to bring this matter to your attention in hopes that it will strengthen the qualifications of Kateri to be beatified as soon as possible. — Long Island City, New York.


