St. Francis Indian Mission, South Dakota, will host the Kateri Prayer Event of 1971, on Sunday, June 20. Rev. Bernard Fagan, S.J. director of the Sioux Mission, has welcomed this occasion and has stated that the members of the Rosebud Educational Society are very much in favor of having this special day in

honor of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha and are ready to cooperate in every way to make it a success.

The Rosebud Reservation is in a central location of the United States and will symbolically serve to unite all sections of the country in prayer on June

Sioux Love Kateri

Last year a statue of Venerable Kateri was erected and blessed in a prominent position as one enters the heart of the Mission. This fulfilled a promise the Sioux Indians made to Kateri in 1957.

Under the supervision of Jesuit priests and scholastics and the Sisters of St. Francis of Penance and Christian Charity who are ably assisted by a core of 15 volunteer lay teachers and maintenance experts, the Mission provides an education for children who either are welfare cases or who live too far from a public school and need boarding school care.


Emphasis upon prayer is the purpose of the Kateri Prayer Day. All League Members and others interested in the cause of the wonderful Mohawk Indian Maiden make a concentrated prayer effort on this day to ask Almighty God to bring about the one more first class miracle needed for Kateri's beatification.

Two specific spiritual events will be the holy hour in front of the outdoor statue of Kateri and weather permitting a concelebrated Mass on this same site. Exact times for these ceremonies are being worked out by Father Fagan and the Rosebud Educational Society.

A Debt Is Being Paid

To relate the Kateri life story performances by Mary-Eunice of Mary Productions and slides with a talk by Fr. McBride, S.J., vice-postulator for the United States, will be given in the Mission Auditorium.

In welcoming the suggestion to have the Prayer Day at the St. Francis Mission Father Fagan declared "This is the least we can do for we are in

This year's itinerary is shorter than last year's. Since it covers almost the same areas as last year's, new billings in the same areas are desired. No specific fees are required although donations to advance the Kateri cause are willingly accepted.

Stop-overs in Upper Michigan and northern Wisconsin would be most acceptable. Indian Reservations in these districts would be ideal situations to impart knowledge about Venerable Kateri. And any assignments along routes from Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, and Pittsburgh, etc., would be given definite consideration.

Mr. Louis W. Ballard, a handsome Quapaw-Cherokee Indian, dean of the music department at the American Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, has always wanted to compose a musical work based on Kateri's life and spiritual aspirations.

Presently, having received a Ford Foundation grant for research, study and composition in the field of American Indian music education, Mr. Ballard is studying Kateri's life to obtain proper background. He plans to produce a Chamber Work with Chorus and/or vocalist for competition in Europe.

Last November, Mr. Ballard conceived the theme, designed and composed a highly effective score for an Amerindian classical ballet, "The Four Moons," which premiered in Tulsa as part of the celebration of Oklahoma's 60th anniversary of statehood.

Another work, "Koshare", the first ballet to be composed by an American Indian, was premiered by the Harkness Ballet in Spain at the famed Teatro Liceo of Barcelona.

Rew. William J. Schlaerth, S. J.
...fifty golden years

Fig. William Schlaerth, former Vice-postulator, will celebrate his Golden Jubilee in the Society of Jesus this year. He was Vice-postulator from 1965 to 1968.

A native of Buffalo, he entered the Jesuit Order in 1921 and was ordained June 23, 1934. He engaged in four years of historical study in Europe, obtaining his doctorate from the Gregorian Uniwersity of Rome in 1940. After posts in teaching history at Canisius College, Buffalo, and Fordham University, New York, he was named the first rector and president of Le Moyne College, Syraccuse, in 1947. He was responsible for the first buildings of this Jesuit College. He returned to Canissius in 1954 where he taught history until 1956 when he received his appointment as Rector at Aurriesville.

In 1962 he was given the directorship of the National Shrine of the Jesuit Martyrs and understook the construction of the new Dining Hall and cafeteria. As Vice-postulator he contracted to have the Kateri statue sculptored and erected in the Coliseum.

Today he serves as assistant director of the St. Ignatius Retreat House, Clarence Center, N. Y., after serving for several years as treasurer of the Buffalo Province. Many celebrations held later this year will honor this remarkable Jesuit priest, educator, and administrator.

Tekakwitha Suggested As College Name

A former Jesuit house of studies in Spokane, Wash., may become the first All-Indian-directed school in the nation if Father Armand N. Nigro, S.J., innovator of the dream can swing it.

When this news broke Fr. Joseph McBride, Vice-postulator, immediately sent in the suggestion that the college be called "Tekakwitha College." Fr. Nigro answered, "I like your suggestion for naming the school. I hope the Indians will buy the idea."

Fr. Nigro pointed out that the school would be a major development for Indians - staffed by Indians, and controlled by Indians - "the only school like it in the nation."

Three Stages Involved

Plans for the school call for setting up an institute for Indian studies and also a facility for Indians to live in while attending other professional schools and colleges in the area. Opening goal, Fr. Nigro said, is 100 freshmen students and a faculty of four Indian administrators and instructors. Eventually there would be 200 to 250 students.

The Jesuit's dream has three stages: college, boarding school, and a facility that would serve as a national convention center for Indian meetings. Juniors and seniors would have the opportunity to work on research projects for various national Indian organizations and receive credit for their efforts.

Financing, he admitted, "is probably the biggest problem to overcome," but he believes it can be done. "I am very proud of what the Indians have done for their people in the last 10 years."

Towards Efficient Office Procedure

Some Of Kateri's Answers

INFECTION INHIBITED - Enclosed is a check in thanksgiving to Kateri for two favors received. (1) A friend's husband had a very rare infection. They were afraid it would go to the lungs. Thank God, he is home from the hospital, doing very well. (2) I had a bad fall. Thank God, I had no bones fractured.- Cohoes, N. Y.

MURDER PREVENTED - I have no miracles to record from Kateri, but only a constant series of

remarkable answers to prayer for help.

As there are no roads in these forested mountains, my rounds of the villages take three months at a time. As I camp out in the Patamona or Macusi villages (Two tribes of Amerindians live in these mountains.) I often remind Kateri that these people are her people, from the same ancestors...living in ways most remarkably similar to those of her time (Bar the ferocity, for they are very gentle.) I ask help in the drawing of the people, especially the children, to the sacraments. In these cases, there always takes place a noticeable jump in the numbers and in the devotion. I came across a poor young mother, living far in the forest, who was going blind if her eyes were not treated. Remembering Kateri's own eye trouble, I asked her to help the poor girl. By the unexpected removal of some communication problems she was able to get out by light plane to a hospital and is now back again and well.

I mentioned that they are gentle. One day I found myself with an exception. A terrific row blazed up between two men. It was in a very lonely village. I got in between them; but they punched each other over my head and around me...at last there seemed sure that there would be murder and I promised to write to you if no murder took place. One man broke away just then, ran far into the forest and slept off his anger. The other said he was sorry and went back home. - Guyana, South America.

BABY AND MOTHER WELL - Enclosed is a check for \$5.00 for a favor granted by Tekakwitha, and to further her cause. I have a niece that had a seven months premature baby (her fifth child) that weighed 3 lbs., 8 ozs. The doctors told her that the chances for the baby to live were very slim. So immediately I started praying to Tekakwitha to let the baby be born alive and that my niece would be well. Again she has granted me a favor. My niece is well and the baby now out of the incubator, weighs 4 lbs., 9 ozs., and should be home in a week or so. Kateri has also granted me other favors. I am really grateful to her and have so much faith in her. - Lafayette, Louisiana.

HOUSE SOLD - Enclosed find check to help expenses for the cause of Kateri Tekakwitha. My daughter and I have received many favors through her intercession and have just received another favor as we have been praying for my daughter to sell her house. This has been granted and we are

very grateful to our dear Lord and his blessed saints and Kateri's intercession. I have been a league member for many years and hope to live to see Kateri canonized. - Pompano Beach, Florida.

VARIOUS FAVORS - We are grateful indeed to Venerable Kateri for granting these favors to us: (1) While we were preparing some activities in honor of the feast of our patron, it rained heavily and there was a sign of a storm. Our teachers and students were downhearted. I inwoked Ven, Kateri Tekakwitha and the day of its celebration the rain ceased and the weather became favorable. Everybody was happy and contented for the celebration was successful.(2) There was something growing in my throat. I consulted the doctor and after the examination he told me it is a goiter. He advised me to be operated. I prayed hard thru the intercession of Ven. Kateri. On the day of the operation it disappeared and the doctor told me that the operation is not needed anymore. (3) One of our schools in the Philippines was celebrating its Golden Jubilee of its foundation. The Sister Principal invited many schools to participate in the Academic Contest. For our school we sent five contestants. Looking at the opponents our own contestants were much younger and smaller. I was quite discouraged but I remembered to invoke Ven. Kateri Tekakwitha to help them. After the contest we were very contented to hear the result that we got five medals: 2 first prizes, 2 second prizes and 1 third prize. Thanks to the intercession of Ven. Kateri. (4) Last June I was confined in Singian Hospital. According to the findings of my X-Ray I have enlargement of the heart, slight enlargement of the liver and numerous calculi in my gall bladder. From the time | was hospitalized I suffered from the rapid palpitation of the heart. indigestion and gastric hyeracidity. I never ceased invoking Ven. Kateri to help me bear this sickness patiently and if possible for my cure. In the September Novena of Masses held there in New York and up to the present I feel much better and with this I attributed it thru the prayers and good works of the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha League.

There are also these small favors received after invoking Ven. Kateri: lost things were found, raising of funds for the improvement of our newly founded schools, conversion of sanners and for the safety of travels. I hope these favors we are sending to your office will be of great help for the beatification and canonization of Ven. Kateri Tekakwitha. - San Juan, Rizal. Philippines.
