

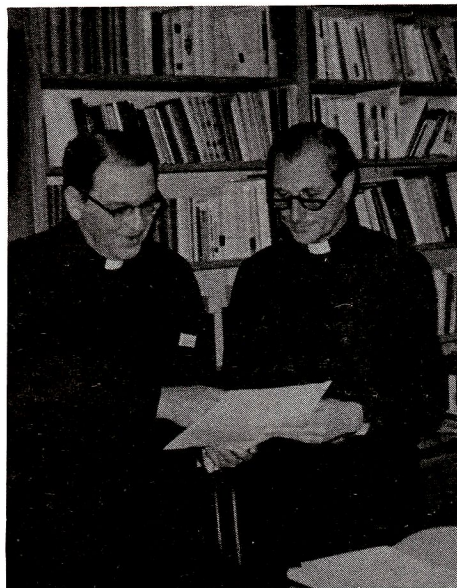

IN ROME Fr. McBride and Fr. Molinari look over a report on the Kateri Cause.

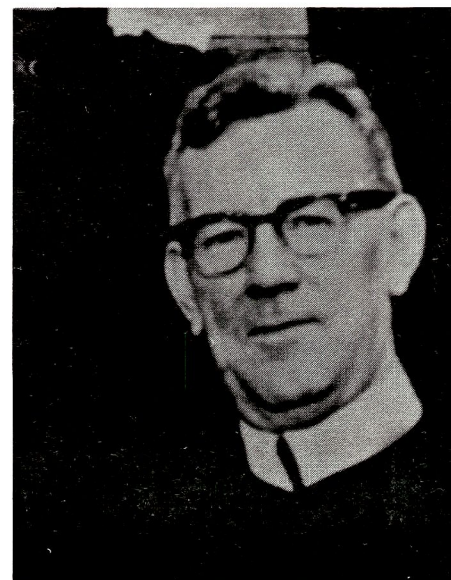
7 Causes Discussed At Meeting

Representatives of seven causes already introduced or are being formulated met for the first time, June 29, at the invitation of Rev. Charles McTague, administrator of St. Peter Claver Church, Montclair, N.J.

In calling the meeting Fr. McTague said: "We want to discuss each cause to see how we can best cooperate to advance them."

Two suggestions acted upon were: 1) to compose a prayer to the Lord asking for sainthood of the seven Americans in line for sainthood; and 2) to gather ideas for an exhibit to be erected at the bi-centennial celebration of the founding of the country in 1976.

A prayer was composed and sent to the Newark Archdiocesan Chancery for approval. The exhibit would depict the contributions which the seven saintly persons have made to the American way of life.

Father Molinari "Optimistic" Towards Cause

For the first time since Father McBride succeeded Fr. Schlaerth as vice postulator he met with Father Paul Molinari, S.J., who handles all Jesuit causes, in Rome to discuss the Kateri cause.

Fr. Molinari appeared "optimistic" over the status of Kateri's cause. He assured Fr. McBride that the Holy Father is well aware of what Americans want and that efforts being made to

advance the cause are being weighed by the Holy See.

The possibility of having a painting or a statue of Ven. Kateri somewhere in Rome was discussed. Fr. Molinari thought it best to wait for the beatification or canonization.

N.Y. State Bishops have petitioned the Holy Father to grant the beatification in 1976.

The assembly was chaired by Fr. Francis J. Litz, C.S.S.R., vice postulator of the causes for Blessed John Neumann and Mother Katherine Drexel.

Fr. Sylvester Taggart, C.M., represented the Bl. Elizabeth Seton cause, Rev. Msgr. Charles C. Demjanovich, the Sister Miriam Teresa cause, Fr. McTague and Mr. Arthur Sheehan, the Pierre Toussant cause. The Junipero Serra cause was not represented but word was received of interest in the meeting. Fr. McBride, not present, conferred earlier with Fr. McTague about the meeting.

League Paper Retains "Lily of the Mohawks"

There will be no new title of the League's publication. "Lily of the Mohawks" was fervently re-endorsed by the majority of votes sent in.

A Mohawk word inscribed on

the new Kateri tomb, "Kaiatanoron," meaning "A Lady of Quality," was the suggested new heading.

Camp Fire Girls Spark May 5 National Event for Patroness

A rock as a stage, chirping and singing birds in the background, blossoming Spring flowers as the setting - these formed the perfect scene for Mary-Eunice's monologue on the life of Venerable Kateri at the National Prayer Day held in conjunction with the May Day Celebration of the Camp Fire Girls of the Washington Archdiocese, May 5, at the Franciscan Monastery.

Over 500 Camp Fire Girls and their friends attended the ceremonies honoring the Mother of God under the chairmanship of Mrs. Dolores Clay, chairman of the Catholic Committee on Camp Fire Girls, Washington Archdiocese.

In recognition of outstanding service rendered in promoting the Camp Fire Movement among Catholic Youth and for her presentation of Kateri's life, patroness of the Camp Fire Girls, a special Certificate of Appreciation was presented to Mary-Eunice by Father Thomas Gude, archdiocesan chaplain.

LILY OF THE MOHAWKS

In the absence of Most Rev. William Baum, archbishop of Washington, and Father Joseph McBride, vice postulator, messages were read from them by Mr. Joseph Spagnola who with his wife, Mary-Eunice, represented Father McBride while in Rome.

Archbishop Baum expressed regret at not being able to be present because of a previous engagement and promised support to the Kateri cause. Fr. McBride called for more prayer for Kateri's beatification and canonization.

Promoting the life story of Kateri Tekakwitha in art, film, and statuary has been a specialty of the Bouvier Family for years. For her skillful sculptoring of the Indian Girl Miss Adrienne Bouvier, of Brookline Mass., receives the Kateri Tekakwitha Award this year.

Afflicted with severe asthma after art school and high school Miss Bouvier had to stay home and her mother made sure she kept her hands busy. At this time she learned that Father John Wynne S.J., first vice postulator of the cause, wanted a statue of Kateri. She then decided to produce one herself.

Her first attempt was not acceptable by Father Wynne. "Too dramatic for a church," he said. He urged that she follow the Mother Neale's painting. Adrienne agreed. Her work has been set in various sizes and has sold all over the country. At the present, efforts are being made to reproduce it and make it available again.

Fr. Wynne praised the statue, stating "the simplicity and spiritual yearnings for heavenly things strike one as a characteristic of this worthy statue of Kateri."

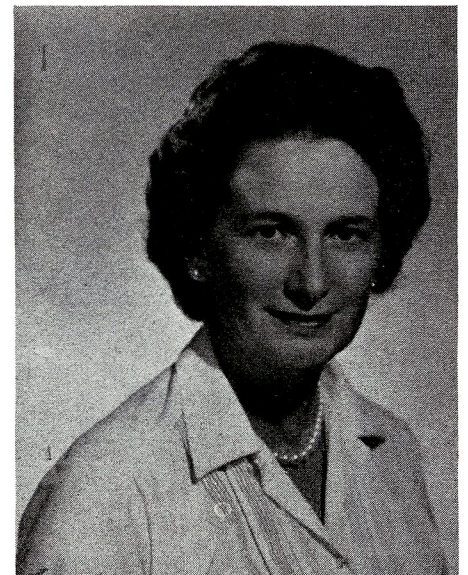
Kateri costume designer, Mrs. Florence Cunningham, of Fort Monmouth, N.J., merits the Certificate of Grateful Recognition.

Forty years of fostering the Kateri cause and of receiving many favors from her seems short to Mrs. O. J. Renier, of Duluth, Minn., who accepts the Kateri Tekakwitha Award 1974.

Prayers have brought many answers. Mrs. Renier's sister, Sister Generosa, O.S.B., has twice been brought back to good health. Ten years ago she suffered a stroke leaving her left side paralyzed. She recovered completely. Last May after severe knee surgery, her walking was left unimpaired.

Top on Mrs. Renier's list of favors granted is her son's safe return after critical injuries afflicted when his jeep struck a mine in the Battle of the Bulge. Her father, 76 years old, incurred serious injuries in an auto-train accident. At the age of 87 he was as active as a young man. "Kateri has come to my aid many times.", sums up her experience.

During the World War she and her husband purchased war bonds, sending the money to various media promoting the Kateri cause.

A BOOK REVIEW

SAINTS, Their Place in the Church by Paul Molinari, S.J., Sheed & Ward, 1965, New York, \$5.50.

In Rome Father Molinari is called a "Maker of Saints." Why? Because he is the postulator for the causes the Society of Jesus espouses and because he is a peritus attached to the Theological Commission of the Vatican Council II and was secretary to the subcommission responsible for Chapter VII of the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church.

Extreme tendencies in either direction in the Cult of the Saints is expertly handled in this book. The author gives the firm theological teaching for devotion to the Saints, based on the doctrine of the Mystical Body of Christ and our incorporation into Christ.

The Saints are the preeminent members of the Body of Christ. The Church in Council was specifically concerned with the union between the Pilgrim Church and the Church in heaven. This book is more than a commentary on this question, thereby giving the reader a proper understanding of the Saints in the Church.

League Members would find this work most rewarding. Book should be obtained at local libraries. It is not for sale by the League Office.



St. Bonaventure Presents Scholarship To Advance Seneca Nation's Ed Plans

St. Bonaventure University, Allegany, N.Y., presented a scholarship to the Seneca Indian Education Foundation on Ven. Kateri's Feast Day, April 17. Miss Carolyn Harris, a member of the Foundation's Board of Directors, accepted the award.

Father Thomas Quinn, O.F.M., in charge of the program, invited Father McBride to speak on the occasion. In his talk the Vice Postulator pointed out the incredible lack of professional men among the American Indians, citing as an example that there is only one Indian dentist in the country.

"What a great tribute to St. Bonaventure's," Father McBride continued, "that it should take this step in order to afford a Seneca an opportunity to use his talents to become a professional man!"

Present at the ceremony was Shirley Vanatta, a Seneca Indian confined to a wheel chair, who had on display her paintings. One of Ven. Kateri was given to Father Quinn for his interest and concern for the education of the Seneca Nation.

Danner wrote: "I like 'Lily of the Mohawks' very much better than that jaw-breaker which few could know how to pronounce, much less spell. May I suggest that the jaw-breaker be used in some other capacity. It is a nice idea, but for publication - NO!"

The Sisters of the Precious Blood, Rome City, Ind., commented: "We would plead with you to keep the title 'Lily of the Mohawks'; the minute that title is said everyone knows whom it refers to. It is so expressive of Kateri's life and living. The substitute name would be difficult to pronounce and impossible to remember its spelling."

In favor of a change wrote Mrs. Eldora Scott, Holcomb, N.Y.: "Here's three votes for the title change to 'Kaiatanoron.' Inasmuch as Kateri is Indian, it would make sense to have an Indian name for the publication."

Fr. Bechard Canada's V. Postulator 25 Years

Father Henri Bechard S.J., vice postulator for the Kateri cause in Canada, has been working consistently for it for the past 25 years.

Soon after his appointment Father began writing, editing, and publishing a quarterly magazine called "Kateri." This publication has now a world-wide English and French circulation of 11,000 and last June produced its 100th issue.

Three years ago Father Bechard launched a Prayer Pledge Campaign and thus far 10,000 Kateri devotees have signed pledges to recite a daily Hail Mary. The Kaddish is suggested for Kateri's Jewish friends.

Close friends claim Father is like the St. Lawrence River, which keeps on flowing. Father Henri won't rest until the Vatican recognizes Kateri as North America's native-born saint.

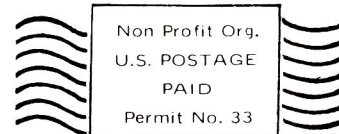
