Two influential Mohawk Indians, Mrs. Esther Phillips of the St. Francis Reservation, Caughnawaga, Canada, and Dr. Solomon Cook, Ph.D., of St. Regis Reservation, Hogansburg, N.Y., were unanimously chosen to be chairpersons of the newly formed Bicentennial Kateri Committee to commemorate the tricentennial of Ven. Kateri's Baptism in 1976.

The next meeting of the Committee will take place in the Kateri Memorial Mohawk Museum, Fonda, N.Y., April 18, 19, and 20, 1975.

At the first meeting last November an input of material - talks, slide-lectures, dramatic presentations - was made in view of formulating a program to be presented at the Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia, August 1 to 8, 1976. The same program is intended for other bicentennial celebrations throughout the country.

The April assembly will handle business matters along with the knitting together the valuable material into an hour to hour-and-half performance.

Father Walter Conway, Eucharistic Congress Chairman, has suggested that there be a liturgical celebration with an Indian theme. Part of this will involve the famous Mohawk Indian Choir from Caughnawaga.

The Committee has already pledged to work with the Catholic Bishops Committee for the Bicentennial. Kevin R. Farrell, Assistant Director of the Bishops Committee, has written: "We would hope that your committee would participate in this Church-wide program for the Bicentennial."

Absent from the initial meeting were Fr. Thomas Dominiak, pastor of the Catholic Shrine, Indian River, Michigan, and Fr. Francis Weiser, S.J., author of the latest biography of Ven. Kateri. Both plan to take part in the future work of the Kateri Committee.

Until further notice all business will be handled by the Office of the Vice Postulator in Clarence Center, New York.

Volunteers from the Philadelphia area will be needed to assist the League there during the Eucharistic Congress. New ideas and suggestions will be welcome and may be sent to the Office of the Vice Postulator.

Should There Be A Kateri Center?

Yes is the answer. And why should there be a Kateri Center? As every sacrament has an outward sign signifying a reality so should there be a visible identification of the Tekakwitha League's work. Every product has a symbol, Texaco has the star, Prudential the rock.

The need of a Center became more pressing after recently visiting the Blessed John Neumann Center in Philadelphia. The body of Blessed John is there. Rooms filled with his personal effects and mementoes display the concern and efforts going on for his cause. Add to this what the Mother Seton League has accomplished through its Center at Emmitsburg, Maryland.

The League Office has jumped from New York City to Auriesville to Syracuse to Clarence Center. Always, as it is now, the Center (?) is a gift-receiving, mail-answering depot. It is no place highlighting the life of Kateri and the work of the League.

A Kateri Museum exists at Auriesville but its contents are meager and of as much value as a dead

rooster. Fonda has a magnificent Museum known as the Kateri Memorial Museum but it is not the Center of the Tekakwitha League activities.

How does the League get a Center? It could build one but this would involve an appeal for funds. And who needs another hand on one's wallet these days?

The Vice Postulator has investigated possible locations in or near Auriesville where the Center should be. Nothing is presently available but the search continues. Father Schultz generously offered space at Fonda. If this were accepted, the other work, namely, that of the Apostleship of Prayer with which the Vice Postulator is associated, would have to be brought along. This seems totally unfair to add this operation to the excellent functioning of the Fonda Compound.

Can you help solve the problem? Without a lot of noise and troublesome begging for funds, perhaps a quiet response in the form of prayers and gifts can get underway. Having a Center indeed can hasten the day when Kateri will be the First of the "First Americans" to be beatified and sainted.

" Lily " Blossoms Over All

Indian children earned their names by doing something that indicated their character. Some say Tekakwitha means: "putting things in order," but the disorderly ways of her people left very little chance for that. Others would have it mean: "moving all before her," because she needed something to find her way with her weak eyes. It is not sure that she did; but she certainly moved before her all that stood in the way of her lifelong desire and determination to find God, and to avoid anything that would part her from Him. The name is not hard to pronounce, Te-gah-gwet-ha, h aspirate. Kateri, of course is Indian for Catherine.

Then, there is another name, "Good Catherine," because she was so good when on earth and is still in heaven doing so much good for those who invoke her aid. "Wonder Worker" is the name she won for the signal blessings she began to obtain for her people and others right after her death and still continues to obtain.

"Genevieve of New France" she was called after the Patroness of Paris, because, like Genevieve, she had saved her people and their settlement from invasion and destruction. It was the second Bishop of Quebec, Saint-Vallier, who had visited her tomb and thus styled her, eight years after her death.

"Iroquois Virgin" was the name given by her first biographer, who had also been her director. She is also known as the "Indian Maiden."

"Kaiatanoron", meaning "Lady of Quality," is the inscription on Kateri's tomb today, given by her people indicating how she appears to Almighty God.

Best expressing the charm of her greatest virtue, as Lily stands for purity, is "Lily of the Mohawks." This is the most popular and most expressive of all her names. It is a prayer in itself of praise, a vision of grace, elevating mind and heart to contemplate her and bless God for having made her so well known to us.

ANNUALLY a special day is set aside when the whole country is asked to pray for the beatification and canonization of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha. Sunday, April 29, 1975, has been designated as the National Kateri Prayer Day.

This year's event will coincide with the second meeting of the Bicentennial Kateri Committee at Fonda, N.Y. Committee Members will offer their Sunday Mass in petition for the goal of all League Members.

Ven. Kateri's Feast Day, April 17, the day Kateri died. Vice Postulator Father Joseph McBride will offer Mass on this day for all the deceased members of the Tekakwitha League. This custom began last year.

All members and friends of the League are asked to join in special prayers, reciting the rosary, for instance, and attending Mass for the advancement of the Kateri cause.

KATERI YOUTH AWARD

BEGINNING THIS YEAR the "Lily of the Mohawks Certificate of Grateful Appreciation" will be awarded to any youth who has been outstanding in promoting the Kateri Cause, recently announced Vice Postulator Father Joseph McBride, S.J.

In addition to the "Certificate" another award known as the

"Kateri Tekakwitha Award" was presented to adults meriting the honor. No recognition was ever made to the young people who express their love of the Indian Girl by working hard to spread her life story.

Any League Member may recommend possible candidates to receive the Certificate. Names with their qualifications are to be submitted as soon as possible to the Office of the Vice Postulator, Clarence Center, N.Y. Presentations are usually made at Auriesville, N.Y., during the Kateri Week End prior to Labor Day.

The text of the Certificate reads, "Lily of the Mohawks Certificate of Grateful Appreciation is presented to for enduring loyal and loving effort for the cause of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha." The document is handsomely printed with the recipient's name inscribed and framed for display.

"PRETZELS FOR GOD" HAS TEKAKWITHA AS PATRONESS

PFG - Pretzels For God - is a movement initiated at St. Francis Parish, Phoenix, Arizona, under the talented Mrs. Marlene McCauley, her husband Allan, and family -Francis, Mary, Anne, Thomas and



Peter.

The purpose of PFG is to bring about the revival of the true origin of the pretzel, which has a deep spiritual meaning for Lent. The pretzel was the ancient Christian Lenten bread as far back as the fourth century. In the old Roman Empire, the faithful kept a very strict fast all through Lent: no milk, no butter, no cheese, no eggs, no cream and no meat. They made small breads of water, flour and salt, to remind themselves that Lent was a time of prayer. They shaped these breads in the form of crossed arms for in those days they crossed their arms over the breast while

praying. Therefore they called the bread "little arms" (bracellae). From this Latin word the Germanic people later coined the term "pretzel."

The pretzel being symbolic of prayer and penance is a small but powerful instrument in bringing families to God. "Prayer and penance," Mrs. McCauley points out, "draws individuals near to God. When man loves God, he will become closely united with his family and God. The family is the root of society. When the family is strong in God's love, America is strong."

Patroness of PFG is Ven.



Kateri Tekakwitha. The McCauleys consider Kateri a beautiful example of true peace and brotherhood, showing the world that whatever be the race or color man must love and understand one another, since we

have but one Creator, the Father of us all.

The McCauleys also believe in Ven. Kateri's powerful intercession. After prayers to Ven. Kateri their son Peter's hearing was



restored. Peter was to undergo surgery but it was not necessary after Kateri intervened. Doctors' reports and other data concerning this cure are in Rome awaiting approval as a miracle in behalf of Kateri's beatification.

16MM Kateri Film Soon A Real Reality

A real reality? Yes, not just a talked-about reality will be a 16MM color sound film giving the life story of Venerable Kateri as presented by Mary-Eunice in a character sketch monologue.

Under the dynamic supervision of Mrs. Ann Scheuerman, Tekakwitha Award recipient last year, arrangements were made with the filming staff and with those in charge of a

suitable location.

The scene chosen not only for its beauty but its lighting effects was the chapel of Becket Hall, the Rochester, N.Y., Diocesan Seminary. Bishop Joseph Hogan granted permission to use the chapel and Father John J. Hempel, Rector of Becket Hall, co-operated with the crew in every way.

Happiness Is Mother Seton's Sainthood

Let us be grateful and joyful that Blessed Mother Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton will be canonized in September. Pope John XXIII beatified her in 1963.

Designated by Pope Paul VI to become the first canonized saint born in what is now the United States, Mother Seton was, in a life of 47 years, socialite, wife, mother, widow, convert, educator and founder of a religious community

of Sisters.

Caring for the sick and poor led her to found the Sisters of Charity. This is considered to be her most enduring contribution to society. Today the Sisters of Charity (with 6 branches) are a renowned and heroic religious order.

She was born in New York City on August 28, 1774.

KATERI TEKAKWITHA Exciting true story of authentic Christian witness given by one of the first Indian converts - 70 full-color frames, 22 minute cassette, by the Daughters of St. Paul, 50 St. Paul's Ave., Boston, Mass., 02130, \$15.95.

The field of Catechetics has something most valuable in this filmstrip. Both teen and adult groups will find in it a wealth of material for reflection and discussion. For all the life story of Ven. Kateri will prove to be an enjoyable and enthralling true story.


With the sharp color frames and clear cassette recording of narration and music there is a guide booklet containing pre-showing activities, a detailed study outline, and 12 suggested follow-up projects. The booklet alone is worth the price of the set.

The Daughters of St. Paul have skillfully adapted the life of the 17th Century Indian Girl to many of the key issues of today, e.g., poverty, peace, individual rights, war, suffering, as well as many important yet neglected values as faith, brotherly love, purity, fortitude.

Two distractions occur:

1) Use of wigwams. Mohawks lived in Longhouses. 2) Indian facial features missing. One of the Sisters answered these objections: "It was made in Italy. What do the Italians know about American Indians?"

Overall rating: X-tra fine, X-cellent. Masterfully produced.

The Scene: Kateri Sunday at Auriesville; Mr. Chet Adams surrounded with pilgrims viewing





According to an Indian legend the woodland animals wept on the day Christ died on the Cross, their tiny tears falling upon the earth and crystallizing into the tiny crosses.
