Art, Films, Plays Observe the Kateri Era

Last year, 1976, opened the Kateri Era which will run until 1980. These years commemorate the 300th Anniversary of the prin-

ciple events in her life as a Christian. In 1676 she was baptized, in 1677 she received her First Holy Communion, in 1678 she was admitted into the Holy Family Confraternity, in 1679 she pronounced her Vow of Perpetual Virginity, and in 1680 she was born into Eternal Life.

Kateri's baptism scene was painted by Sister Mary Felicitas, RSM, appeared on the front page of the Spring '76 LILY, and now is on display in the large window of the National Kateri Center. Sister has completed a pencil sketch of Kateri's death, a preliminary to doing an oil painting which will also be

viewed in the Center a bit before 1980.

Anne Scheuerman of Rochester, N.Y., completed the 16mm film of Mary-Eunice's dialogue on Kateri's life. In addition to this a special Super 8 Film shown at the Eucharistic Congress of the three Shrines will soon be available.

Known for her inspiring monologues and for her writing of many plays on the lives of the saints, Mary-Eunice of Belford, N.J., has given a one act play "Maid of the

Mohawks", a Christmas playlet "A Christmas Star" and has added another brief play "The Baptismal Birthday of Tekakwitha." These

Unable to be mentioned are the innumerable newspaper articles that have appeared throughout the country and the many paintings that have been done by ardent de-

votees of Kateri. Five of these works now hang in the Kateri Center. The filmstrip on Kateri done by the Daughters of St. Paul ranks high as a memento of the Kateri Era.

PRAYER CELEBRATIONS DESIGNATED

Annually prayer events are designated for the Kateri cause. Only through prayer will the miracles needed for Kateri's beatification and canonization be obtained. Accordingly, since this is the 300th anniversary of the Lily's First Communion, both Holy Thursday and Christmas Day, the actual day of her First Communion, should be days of private prayer for all League Members.

Sunday, September 4, the Mohawk Indian Pilgrimage Day to Auriesville Martyrs Shrine, New York, is designated as the National Prayer Day for the Cause. League Members and friends are asked to say the Rosary and other prayers throughout the nation on this day.

April 17 a Mass is offered by Father McBride, League president, for deceased League Members.

PROJECT DISPLAY LAUNCHED

Invitations to twenty Indian Missions and Reservations have been sent to participate in Project Display. Articles of beadwork, basquetry, rug weaving, etc., typical of the tribe's handiwork, are requested and are to show the tribe's devotion to Ven. Kateri.

Each item will be marked with the tribe's name and will be displayed in the National Kateri Center, Auriesville, New York.

Often visitors ask what do other Indians think of Kateri? This project will answer this question for the articles are to represent the particular tribe's love for the Lily of the Mohawks.

Objects are to be forwarded to the National Center by April 1, so that the displays will be ready for the opening of the Shrine on May 1, 1977. Names of Indian tribes who would like to contribute are requested.

So I asked Kateri for her prayers and within a few days the baby had made miraculous progress. On June 26 we brought her home. We were told it probably wouldn't be until the middle of the summer.

baby's diaper and I found the plastic piece on top of it. I rushed her to the hospital. Tests were made and to everyone's amazement surgery was not needed. The intestines were in place and some how formed a support. What is very puzzling is the fact that this plastic piece because it was a support was outside the intestine. Therefore, they have no explanation as to how this piece supposedly passed through her intestine and out with her stool. SACRED MUSIC AMONG THE IROQUOIS by Francis X. Weiser, S.J.

(Continued from last LILY)

The missionaries, following the example of Saint Francis Xavier, utilized the Indians' love of singing in the task of religious instruction. They wrote a series of Iroquois hymns whose text closely followed the various parts of the Mass; thus the faithful could accompany the priest in their own language all through the Holy Sacrifice. In a similar way, the Fathers taught


them in the form of simple, attractive melodies, to sing the Sign of the Cross, the Our Father, Hail Mary, the Creed, the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary, the Act of Contrition, etc., also the Ten Commandments and other points of the Catechism. The catechumens, expecially children, eagerly memorized these texts and sang them with great enthusiasm, not only in church but also in their wigwams and at

their work in the fields.

We give here only a few of the many hundred examples mentioned by the missionaries in their reports: The Catholic Iroquois had the custom of singing the morning and evening prayers in their wigwams the whole family together. Three times every day, morning, noon and night, the church bell rang for private prayer. Everybody stopped working to recite or sing the Our Father, the Hail Mary and a prayer for the Holy Souls. Women and children used to sing the prayers at their daily chores while the men sang them on their hunting and fishing trips.

Father Cholenec, who was superior of the Jesuits during the years when Tekakwitha lived there (1677-1680) and who wrote her first biography, reports many details of her prayer-singing. "Every morning," he says, "she came to

Mass. At noon she attended the instruction of the faithful. In the evening she returned to the house of God for the common singing of the Rosary." - "On a walk through the woods or fields she always prayed the Rosary, not reciting but singing it as was custom among our Christian Iroquois." - "Going through the village to visit the sick she would hum the prayer songs or sing them in a low, sweet voice." -

"In her last sickness, a few weeks before her death, she was extremely weak, suffered painful headaches, and had to stay in bed all day long while the others worked in the fields. Being alone, she spent those hours singing the Rosary and other prayers with fervent devotion."

POPULAR RELIGIOUS HYMNS

The obvious delight of Huron and Iroquois converts over the singing of prayers and liturgical texts prompted the Jesuit missionaries to provide their Catholic Indians also with a number of hymns to be sung during festive seasons of the ecclesiastical year and in honor of saints, especially of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Thus originated many Iroquoian hymns of great beauty and charming simplicity; they spread like fire through all the missions and conquered the hearts of the faithful Indians.

The most beloved of these

hymns were songs to Mary and Christmas carols. In fact, the first American Christmas carol, *Jesous Ahatonhia*, was written as early as 1641 by the great pioneer of the Indian missions, Saint John de Brebeuf, S.J., who died a martyr's death in 1649. He set his poem to the tune of a popular French folk song. After the suppression of the Jesuits a copy of his text and tune was found in the papers of a Can-

adian Missionary in 1794. Brebeuf's carol has recently been reintroduced into the treasury of American Christmas carols ('T was in the moon winter o f time ...). Unfortunately, this modern version (a free rendition of prior French translation) lacks, despite its brilliant poetical formulation, the charming, childlike simplicity of Brebeuf's original text:

O, listen to the angel's word!

Do not refuse the joyful message Which you hear: Today has come of Mary pure The Child Divine. Let us adore. Jesus is born.

Of the other carols and religious songs no trace is left today. Due to the complete destruction of the Huron missions (1648-1650) and the almost total decline of the Iroquois missions after the supression of the Jesuits (end of the 18th century) all the church books and papers of the missionaries (except some official parish records in Canada) disappeared. We have, however, many reports in the Jesuit Relations describing the usage of popular religious songs among the Indians.

Well Known League Members Are Dead

Early this year Dr. Dietrich von Hildebrand of New Rochelle, N.Y., and Mrs. Marian A. Wesselman of Cincinnati, Ohio, died.

Dr. von Hildebrand served 18 years on the Fordham University Faculty, wrote 30 books, and 100 articles on philosophy and morality.

1952 began Marian Wesselman's dedication to the Kateri League. So prominent was her love of Kateri that over thirty friends have sent in donations in memory of her. Her obituary requested gifts to the League. A fitting memorial to her will be in the Kateri Center.

Jesuit Attributes Restoration Of Eyesight to Indian Maiden

The above heading met Father McBride's eyes as he opened the January 27th issue of the CATH-OLIC NEWS, The New York Archdiocesan Newspaper. Immediately he phoned Father Bechard in Canada who knows the Jesuit and his family.

Father Walter M. Abbott, S.J., an American Bible scholar, said he suddenly regained sight in his left eye after he and friends had prayed for the miracle for more than a year to Kateri Tekakwitha.

The 53-year-old priest, who works in Rome as Pope Paul's representative in all common Bible work, said that he had letters from two leading eye specialists who claim that the return of his sight was "medically impossible and beyond explanation." The letters are being turned over to the Sacred Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome.

Colorado Couple Tell Plans To Promote Kateri Cause

Ever since last September Frank and Dorothy Alcon visited the National Kateri Center, coming all the way from Pueblo, Colorado, they have worked on plans for special events to help the Kateri Cause.

They have conducted a spaghetti dinner and arranged for a Mass to be offered for Kateri's beatification, January 19.

A more elaborate program is scheduled for April 6 when Mary-Eunice will present dramatic sketches at the Pueblo Sangre De Christo Arts Center Theatre in Pueblo City.

Most Rev. Charles Buswell, bishop of Pueblo, in a letter to the Committee wrote that he is "keeping Kateri in prayer and in the celebration of Holy Mass."

MARLENE MCCAULEY and fiveday old Joseph Ignatius play Kateri's mother and Kateri as a baby at the Eucharistic Congress. Father Abbott, a native of Boston, lost sight in his eye when he fell down a marble staircase in his Rome residence on June 24, 1975. The priest fractured his skull and wrist and dislocated his jaw. Physicians said head damage caused a hemorrhage which eventually destroyed the optic nerve in the left eye.

Father Abbott began to pray to Kateri and with his Mother, sister and several others, visited the tomb of the Indian Girl in Caughnawaga.

"One morning in November, Father relates, "I opened my left eye and I saw the ceiling clearly. I looked around the room and I could see things. I stood up and found that I could see the bottom half of the room perfectly. It was a strange feeling."

The latest report is that 75% vision has been restored to Father Abbott's eye.

Father Abbott is the general editor of the universally popular book containing the Documents of Vatican II.

John Neuman, the fourth bishop of Philadelphia, Fr. Francis Litz, C.SS.R., is the promoter of the Neuman Cause and is to be congratulated on his sterling devotion to this holy bishop.

A VOICE IS LOST - Princess Esther Phillips was president of the Caughnawaga Mohawk Choir up to last October. She was most energetic despite an ailing knee in giving her time and talent to the League's Congress programs. She has retired from the Choir. A beautiful voice is silent but will resound for a long while in the Mohawk Valley. The League thanks her, Father McBride thanks her, the Kateri Cause thanks her!

STILL SWIMMING - Yes, the

League spent a good sum, even drawing from the savings account meant for beatification and canonization expenses, for the Congress programs. But we're still swimming thanks to extra donations sent in. To measure what the workers expended would be impossible, so we're due for olympic honors.

POSTSCRIPT - After the Mohawk Choir's performance at the Eucharistic Congress the bus to take them to the airport didn't show. Pooling the pecuniary resources present a limousine got the 32 member-choir to the airport to catch the plane to Montreal. What happened? No one knows.

A TREASURE - The National Kateri Center will feature this Shrine Season a copy of the painting of Kateri done by a missionary, Father Chauchtierre, who personally knew Kateri. Father Bechard brought the picture from Caughnawaga. It was photographed by Armour Landry of Montreal.
