CARDINAL COOKE SENDS WORD OF ROME INQUIRY

His Eminence, Terence Cardinal Cooke, Archbishop of New York, during his recent visit to Rome for the canonization of Saint John Neumann inquired about the cause of Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha.

To Father McBride the Cardinal wrote: "I visited with Cardinal Bafile of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. His Eminence indicated his interest in her Cause and I emphasized to him the great devotion of so many people to Kateri Tekakwitha. How proud we are of the witness of faith and love given to us in her life! His Eminence told me that, when there is prayerful faithful devotion, the miracles do take place."

In closing his letter to Fr. McBride, Cardinal Cooke said that he joins the League in praying and working for the Kateri Cause.

In September His Eminence will discuss with the Bishops of New York State the possibility of submitting to the Holy Father another petition for Kateri's beatification by the United States hierarchy.


FILM RENTAL AVAILABLE

FROM NEW YORK STATE NORTH COUNTRY Bishop Stanislaus J. Brzana, bishop of Ogdensburg, will be the main celebrant of the Mohawk Indian Mass, Sept. 4, in the Martyrs' Shrine Coliseum, 12:30 P.M.

Bishop Brzana is over the American section of the St. Regis Reservation and has visited the St. Regis Church on many occasions, even using the Mohawk language in his introduction. He also presided at the Mohawk Mass during the Eucharistic Congress last year.

The National Kateri Center and a new outdoor Kateri statue will be blessed by Bishop Brzana after the concelebrated Mass in the Coliseum.

A friendship dating back almost thirty years the Bishop and Father Michael Jacobs have had when the Mohawk Jesuit assisted the Bishop in his apostolate with the Indians in south-western New York State.

MORE EVIDENCE ASKED IN FATHER ABBOTT'S CURE

"Rejected" is a bad word. Especially is it when newspapers herald it across the country in reference to the restoration of vision to Father Walter Abbott's left eye.

The cure has not been rejected but according to two medical doctors in Rome it cannot be presented to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints because it "is far from being complete". 75% vision has been regained after Father Abbott prayed to Ven. Kateri.

Fr. Paul Molinari, S.J., Postulator General in Rome, suggests that much more evidence on this case be collected and have it submitted to a number of well-known eye specialists in the United States for their opinions.

Father McBride has already contacted several specialists who are willing to render an opinion after studying the case. He has written Father Abbott to ask him to come to the United States in order to gather more substantiating documents.

Meanwhile the Biblical Expert enjoys what he lost through a fall, namely, vision brought back by Kateri's intercession.

Labor Day Meeting Called

Mr. Lazare lives with his wife and five beautiful children, all of school age. At Caughnawaga Albert shows himself very public-minded, active with the Indian Knights of Columbus, the Caughnawaga Boys and Girls' Club, and the local firemen.

For the second time from the St. Francis Mission, Rosebud Reservation, So. Dakota, comes an award winner. He is <u>Hubert McCloskey</u>, a Sioux Indian. He is very active in all of the Mission's activities and is involved in the Lay Deacon Program. His eloquence is often manifested especially in his talks on Kateri.

The Kateri Tekakwitha Award reads: "Kateri Tekakwitha Award is presented to for generous, fruitful, enduring dedication to the cause of the Lily of the Mohawks, 1977."

Featured was the Kateri's Song composed and sung by Frank Alcon who with his wife Dorothy were responsible for the program in Pueblo.

On Easter Sunday Mary-Eunice enacted her Kateri monologue after a Mass offered by Bishop Charles

Girl Scouts Win Kateri Awards In Two Dioceses

Not always a scout but always a model for young girls and young women is Kateri Tekakwitha. Catholic Girl Scouts work for the Tekakwitha Award in the Albany and Pittsburgh dioceses.

Over one hundred Junior Girl Scouts received the Kateri Award in the Pittsburgh Diocese. These girls worked approximately six months to earn this award. One of the requirements is to do something to further the cause of sainthood for Kateri. Several groups gave out prayer cards urging prayers for Kateri's beatification in order to qualify for the award.

With a score of 10 in the field of accomplishing its purpose the National Kateri Center is in its third year. In the picture at the right attention is attracted to the Center by the large sign above the windows exhibiting the two paintings by Sister Mary Felicitas, RSM.

The newest Kateri statue is seen at the right in the photo and will be blessed on September 4 by Bishop Stanislaus Brzana. It is a memorial to Marian A Wesselman of Cincinnati, Ohio, who died early this year. She devoted 25 years promoting the Kateri Cause. Her husband will attend the ceremony. Designed 30 years ago the statue is the work of Adrienne Bouvier of Brookline, Mass.

The interior of the Center is a 20' x 24' room where the work of telling the Kateri Story takes place. Either by the spoken word, by the written word, or via mechanical means the exciting story of Kateri's life is imparted to the many persons who visit the Shrine of the North American Martyrs in Auriesville, N.Y.

Below at the right is one display case with the precious items. An invitation was extended to these tribes at the beginning of the



HOW DO YOU PRONOUNCE, TEKAKWITHA?

The index to the 74 volumes which comprise the "Jesuit Relations" (the 17th Century reports of the priests in the Canadian missions to their superiors) contains the following entry: Tegawita (Tega-Kouita, Tegakouita, Tekakawitha), Catherine, the Iroquois saint.

With so many variant spellings, how should her name sound? Fr. Bechard, Canadian Vice Postulator, says her name should be pronounced "Cather-ee Tek-ac-wee-tah." The "ac-wee," he advises, is a Mohawk guttural which has no English equivalent. "Cather-ee" or "Kater-ee" are both acceptable.

having a strong devotion to her or both. The response was like an avalanche. "Now," said Father McBride, "we have something to show the visitors who ask what the other Indians think of Kateri."

Always a special attraction is the painting done in 1693 by Father Chauchetierre who personally knew Kateri. The Center obtained a photo of the original through the kindness of Anne Scheuerman of Rochester, N.Y. The copy hangs with five other paintings depicting the Indian Maiden, all showing the universal love for her by gifted artists.

Souvenirs imprinted to remind the guests to pray for Kateri's beatification are distributed. A modest looking donations box appeals for funds which have helped finance maintenance of the Kateri Center.



REMEMBER

CHRISTMAS DAY is the second Prayer Day for the Kateri Cause. This marks the 300th Anniversary of Kateri's First Holy Communion.

Suggested: Kateri Clubs receive Holy Communion together; League Members offer Holy Communion for the miracles needed; meditate on Kateri's reverence for the Eucharist; personally imitate Kateri's love for the Body of Christ.

SACRED MUSIC by F.X. Weiser, S.J. [Concluded]

Saint John de Brebeuf, for instance, wrote in 1642 that the faithful who lived more than two days' journey from the mission church gathered in their village on Christmas Day to pray before the shrine of the crib and "to sing hymns in honor of the new-born Christ." - About the year 1675 the Catholic Mohawks in Caughnawaga, having begged the Fathers with great sincerity and insistence, received permission from the Superior of the Missions to continue singing their beloved Christmas carols (outside the church) right up to Passion Sunday. It would be impossible to record all the examples from the letters of the missionaries describing the singing of popular religious songs at various solemnities of the year.

CONCLUSION

Of the once so flourishing churches among the great confederation of the "Five Nations" (Iroquois), only a tiny fragment is left today: the Catholic Reservations of the Mohawks in Canada. The other tribes (Oneidas, Onondagas, Cayugas and Senecas) lost their beloved blackrobes towards the end of the 18th century, and Protestant ministers replaced the priests. Gradually, new generations grew up who had no knowledge of the faith of their ancestors; and even the fact that thousands of their people had once been Catholic, was forgotten. Only among the Mohawks at Caughnawaga (and later also at St.

Regis) the Catholic Faith survived without interruption; their mission, founded about the middle of the 17th century and dedicated to St. Francis Xavier, is still gloriously alive and active. The Indians now-unlike their ancestors - are enjoying the blessings of a solid modern education. They sing in their church choir not only the ancient native chants but also Latin and English compositions of modern liturgical art.

Caughnawaga can humbly and gratefully boast of two great privileges: It has the famous choir of Iroquois Indians; and it harbors in its church the tomb of Kateri

KATERI MEDALS MARK FIRST HOLY COMMUNION DAY


For everyone First Holy Communion Day is a big event. This year in Dayton, Ohio, there was something extra for one thousand, one hundred forty-four First Communicants. Each received the attractive blue Kateri Medal in Memory of Ven. Kateri's First Holy Communion three hundred years ago this Christmas Day.

This ambitious project was undertaken by '75 Tekakwitha Award Winner Anna Rose Balsamo. She personally contacted the churches to obtain the number who would receive Holy Communion for the first time, then sent the medals. This gesture is added to Anna's other two projects, mailing out Intro Packs and making third class Kateri relics.

Tekakwitha, the Venerable Servant of God, daughter of the Mohawk Nation. Looking forward in prayerful hope to the days of her beatification and canonization, we feel certain that St. Peter's Cathedral in Rome will witness the presence of her own brothers and sisters - the members of the Iroquois choir in their splendid native attire - and their singing in the language of her beloved Mohawk people.

As a short summary let us now give the answers to the questions we asked at the beginning of this article:

- 1) The sacred music of the Catholic Iroquois has never (and should never) used musical instruments, except the Church organ and human voices.
- 2) Also, the use of drums, rattles, stumping and dances is foreign to the *liturgical* celebrations of Catholic worship among the Iroquois.
- 3) The Catholic Iroquois never made use of ritual elements of their non-Christian ancestors (masquerades, incantations, extending of arms, etc.).
- 4) On solemn occasions the members of their choir always wore the traditional festive dress and the magnificent, graceful decorations of their nation.
