Kateri's Death Noted By Special Events

Marking the 300th anniversary of Kateri's entrance into eternal life is gaining momentum throughout the country.

First to respond with a program was Mary-Eunice of Mary Productions, Belford, N.J., involving the seventh graders of St. Mary's school, New Monmouth, N.J. Kelly Jones will portray "Life After Death"; Anne Campbell will do "Kateri's First Holy Communion"; Rene Bruce will play "The Early Years of Kateri"; and Alison Bifulco will enact "The Baptism and Escape to Land of the Praying Indians." All presentations will be given before the student body on April 30.

Later on in the year Mary-Eunice will perform herself at St. Anne's Church, Oswego, Ill., and officially present the 1980 Tekakwitha Award to Rev. Clifford Brier, pastor of St. Anne's, longtime a promoter of the Kateri Cause.

Next to check in was the McCauley Family of Phoenix, Arizona. A prayer meeting was held at the McCauley home on Feb. 17 and a Mass in St. Francis Xavier Church on Sunday LILY OF THE MOHAWKS

April 20. Bishop James Rausch will be the celebrant and Fr. Edmund Smyth, S.J. will be the homilist. A new statue just sculptored by Ted DeGrazia will be unveiled and blessed. The Bishop will present the sculptor with the Tekakwitha Award. Various Indian Tribes form a procession for the occasion. A reception follows the event.

In the New York Archdiocese Terence Cardinal Cooke designated Fr. Timothy A. McDonnell, Director of the Propagation of the Faith, to arrange a program. Father has reserved St. Patrick's Cathedral for 10 AM, October 19, and currently is working on further ideas for the archdiocesan celebration.

From St. Mary Mission, Tohatchi, N. Mexico, Father Gormac Antram, OFM, writes: "Every week since Jan. 20 we have been telling our radio audience about the 300th anniversary. Then we tell in English and Navajo a little about Kateri's life. This continues from week to week. Finally we offer a free booklet of Kateri's life to all who write in. The response has been good. Our program, "The Padre's Hour," is broadcast over 3 stations and is heard

in N. Mexico, Arizona, Utah, and Colorado."

As an advisor Chet Adams, of Northville, Michigan, is directing the Tekakwitha Circle 924 of the Daughters of Isabella in Detroit in forming their celebration. Chet will present the 1980 Tekakwitha Award to the Circle, the first group to receive one. Mrs. Antoinette Babinski. Head

SUPPORT FOR S. 2222 IS NEEDED

April 1, 1980 could be a deadly April Fool's Day! It is the deadline for suits to be filed by the Bureau of Indian Affairs for Native American tribes and individuals seeking payments of money for their loss of land, trespass, misuse of land and resources such as minerals, timber, water, etc. prior to 1966, as provided in Volume 28 of the United States Code 2415.

After that date recourse can be had only through court actions which will be expensive and beyond the means of most individuals and many tribes.

S. 2222, if it is passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives and then signed into law by President Carter, extends the deadline until December 30, 1984.

Support for S. 2222 is needed! Write to Congress, senators and representatives. Simply say: "I want you to vote for S. 2222. That vote is important for my friends, the Native Americans!"
