Novena of Masses Ends Great Kateri Year

OCTOBER 18, 1980 AURIESVILLE, N.Y. Usually the annual novena of Masses for the intentions of League Members was offered October 11-19. Because of the significance of 1980, the Great Kateri Year, Father Joseph McBride, league president, decided to conclude the year with the nine-day prayer event. The Masses will be offered by the vice postulator at Kateri's birthplace, Auriesville, N. Y., the last nine days of this year, December 23-31.

FROM THE BRINK OF DEATH -

On July 3 of this year my brother Timothy had an emergency operation at Duke University. Diagnosis: terminal cancer of the colon with a life expectancy of six months. Except for a few days at home he has been in the hospital since and is on the critical list. Last Thursday, Sept. 11, he started to expire. Doctors and nurses rushed to his bedside and all agreed after examination he was

really dying. This was about 4-4:30 P.M. Tim's surgeon told my sister Catherine and me: "This is it. This is the end. Your brother has kidney failure and uremia. We have done all we could. There is nothing more we can do." The doctor ordered all tubes removed except one so that he could be more comfortable.

All these doctors, nurses, and staff saw us kneeling at Tim's bedside and heard us praying. Well, today is Thursday a week later and Tim is still here, although still very ill. His doctors told us his kidneys are functioning, his blood pressure is normal, his temperature is normal. He takes some food by mouth.

Tim's return from the brink of death has amazed all the staff on this floor. I know that Blessed Kateri's intercession before the throne of God brought Tim back to us. I also firmly believe that it is possible that Tim could be cured and that this miracle could be the one needed for Blessed Kateri's canonization.

duction: research, producing, writing, directing, consulting, promotion and distribution of programs for clients in industrial. corporate, private, commercial and public television. Documentaries and special programs are an integral part of the company's production business.

The purpose of the documentary is to spread the Christian message of the life of Blessed Kateri through the medium of television, video and film. Kateri's life is an inspiration. Her world, like ours, the SJM president reflects, was an ever changing one in which the institutions of family, society and religion were under constant threat. Kateri's faith in God and in Jesus' message of love points the way for today's Christians and Indians.

The documentary will serve religious, educational and minority group interests, (i.e. women, Indians, etc.). By creating public awareness and promoting appreciation of Kateri through television, video and film, SJM Enterprises wants to make Kateri an accessible model for young people today who are often subjected to intense pressures that urge non-Christian values and immorality.

The half-hour film documentary will be done in 16mm color film, with sound, of professional, commercial quality. After the film is edited and ready for viewing it will be transferred to videotape in order

that it may be shown on network, cable, local and public television. Copies for distribution of the program will be made available on film or videocassette, at a reasonable cost, to be determined later.

Recap of Kateri Events During 1980

Early this year from League Headquarters a letter went out asking various groups to commemorate the 300th Aniversary of Kateri's Death. Some responded immediately, others later which enabled them to mark Kateri's beatification. Here is a general resume of what took place throughout our nation:

March 1 — For the George Wallace Family W. Curt Weldon had Kateri medals and Kateri promotional literature distributed as the Olympic Torch Relay Team passed through Marcus, Hook, Pa.

March 2 — Garfield Heights, Ohio, a Day of Recollection arranged by league member Mrs. Gloria Putka.

April 14 — Media wires carry the official announcement that Pope John Paul II will beatify Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha.

April 14-19 — Kateri week conducted by Bro. Richard Cote, O.M.I., for religion classes, Plattsburgh, N.Y. Filmstrip on Kateri was shown, bulletin board displays arranged, and prayer cards distributed.

April 17 — Dramatic presentations directed by Mary-Eunice at St. Mary's School, New Monmouth, N.J.

April 18 — Over 350 gathered for a liturgical — pow-wow at St. Lucy's, Syracuse, N.Y. Fr. James Carey gave the homily and hosted the repast afterwards in the auditorium.

April 20 — Little Peacock and Father McBride traveled to St. Andrew's, Kenmore, N.Y., for a commemorative Mass arrannged by Sr. Marcella O'Donnel. The first 1980 Tekakwitha Awards were presented to Sister and to her Marian Affiliates.


A contingent from the Auriesville Shrine were at the celebration at St. Regis Reservation where Sr. Kateri and her choral and dancer groups participated.

June 22 — His Holiness John Paul II beatified Kateri in St. Peter's Basilica, Vatican City. Fr. Egan, Fr. Fleig, and Fr. McBride attended. Last LILY carried a review of the days in Rome.

June 22 — In the diocese of Greensburg beatification day ceremonies were held at the Shrine of the American Saints, by the Knights of Columbus Council Uniontown, Pa., in cooperation with Knights of Columbus Council 1275, and the Albert Gallatin General Assembly Fourth Degree of the nights of Columbus. Chaplain Father Henry J. Marcinek gave the homily.

August 4-7 — Denver, Colorado, over 700 assembled for the Tekakwitha Conference. His Eminence John Cardinal Krol of Philadelphia, was the celebrant of the Mass in honor of Blessed Kateri. Anne Scheuerman represented Father McBride. Sr. Genevieve Cuny received the Tekakwitha Award. N.Y. vice provincial Fr. Joseph Towle attended.

August 23 — A celebration to note Kateri's beatification was held in the Diocese of Honolulu by the Hawaii Council of American Indian Nations. Bishop John Scanlan of Honolulu was celebrant. Much of the inspiration for the Kateri Day came from Maggie Bunson, Executive Director of the Hawaii Catholic Conference.

August 30-31 — Mohawks come to Auriesville for annual Kateri weekend to commemorate Kateri's beatification. They view the League's stage presentation "Godspell with Kateri," Mary-Eunice's monologues, John White's songs, and Sr. Kateri's Indian boys and girls singers and dancers. Bishop Hubert Humbert of St. John's Diocese, Canada, offered the Mass on Sunday with retired Bishop Jean-Marie Codere as a concelebrant.

Sept. 28 — In Oswego, Illinois, Mary-Eunice presents the Tekakwitha Award to Father Clifford Brier, pastor of St. Ann's Church, for his deep interest in the Kateri Cause.

Sept. 28 — Chet Adams presented the 1980 Tekakwitha Award (see picture) to the Kateri Tekakwitha Circle No. 924, Daughters of Isabella, Detroit, Michigan, after a pontifical Mass offered by Bishop Walter J. Schoenherr, auxiliary bishop of Detroit.

October 5 — In Sacred Heart Cathedral, Rochester, N.Y., a special liturgy with Bishop Mathew Clark as celebrant and homilist. Bishop Clark starts applause for Mary-Eunice upon the end of her Kateri monologue. Everyone was innvited to dinner at the Native American Cultural Center. Jeanne Sweeney and Anne Scheuerman saw weeks of preparation successfuly crowned. The St. Regis Akwesasne Mohawk Choir sang. Native Americans from Syracuse and Rochester joined the crowded cathedral.

October 18 — Then came the civic-liturgical celebration arranged by the Albany Diocese in conjunction with the Tekakwitha League. Though the many months of planning were dampened by intermittent showers the event remains memorable for many moons. At 2:30 P.M. the St. Peter's at St. Patrick's Youth Band started the program at the Shrine Gate and would proceed to 3 other stations to pause to play after which Fr. Robert Fleig of the Shrine Staff gave a short historical account of the spot. At 3:50 the grand procession

News Center 6 of Schenectady showed a brief view of the beatification ceremonies in Rome and several minutes of people and scenes at Ossernenon with an interview with Fr. Ronald Sams of Buffalo, N.Y. who substituted for Fr. McBride and who masterfully handled the media's inquiries about the honors being given the Lily of the Mohawks by the Catholic Church and the significance it will have upon Auriesville and the Mohawk Valley. Eloise Etzkorn efficiently managed the entire day from the Shrine Office.

entered the Coliseum while a Brass Instrumental under direction of Fr. Richard Fragomeni of the Liturgical Commission provided the spirited entrance music. The Knights of Columbus, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, representatives from the Catholic Daughters and from the Christ Child Society, preceded fourteen priests who concelebrated with Bishop Howard Hubbard of Albany, the main celebrant, and with Bishop Frank Harrison of Syracuse. N.Y., Bishop William Connare of Greensburg, Pa., and Bishop Joseph Pernicone, retired auxiliary bishop of New York.

After the greeting by Bishop Hubbard

Father McBride read Pope John Paul's words proclaiming Kateri a Blessed. The congregation about two thousand in number sang jubilantly "All Creatures of Our God and King." Introduced were the reactors: Sister Kateri Mitchell, principal of the Cornwall Elementary Indian Day School, who told what Kateri's beatification meant to the Indian People; Mr. Joseph T. O'Brien, a successful business man from Cleveland, Ohio, and a generous benefactor of the Cause, related how Kateri can influence the business world; and Mr. Thomas Constantino as an outstanding civic leader of the Mohawk Valley testified

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Thank you, Alan Hudson of Pearl River, N.Y. for these words: "I want you to know that you, and Kateri, and all your staff and colleagues provided a most delightfully joyous day for those of us who had the good fortune of being with you on October 18th. The liturgical celebration was magnificent. In 'Godspell' we saw miracles of lighting and

stage effects in the refectory, to say nothing of the obvious talents of the Adirondack Players and the equally obvious fervor of Matthew Cinquanti."

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Give this some thought if you are collecting signatures for Kateri's canonization: they don't mean a thing in Rome. What can be done is to have people sign, then give them a prayer — the signature means that they will recite the prayer. Please don't send the lists to this office or to Rome. You may tell us about your prayer campaign and how many are saying the prayer.

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President Carter was asked to send a statement of congratulations. etc., for the October 18 celebration. A call from the White House explained why he couldn't oblige you know, separation of Church and state! A smile as big as the Potomac flooded my countenance because in my hand was a statement from President Herbert Hoover to Fr. Wynne when the martyrs were canonized. No separation, then. Two nights after the call I saw Jimmy in a pulpit of a Baptist church. No separation, then. Oughtn't there be a senate probe into such duplicity?

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New York State lover Governor Hugh Carey was also invited to attend or send a representative. He issued a proclamation making June 22 Kateri Tekakwitha Day. He'd be a natural to have present. But the runaround began. No answer in writing saying he couldn't come, five telephone calls to his scheduling office

still have me waiting. Does Governor Hugh really love New York?

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While our political leaders could not figure out what the honor of beatification meant to the United States and to NY State, the country was awakened to the reasons for celebrations by two of many fine articles: David Bunbar wrote "Lily of the Mohawks" in the September issue of the Catholic Digest and Mary Pujolis with same title in the October MESSENGER of the Sacred Heart. Try to get copies of these and keep them. They are super!

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To the National Kateri Center came visitors from Italy, Germany, Australia, Marshall Islands, and India. Kateri is international!

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In August I sent a Coffey pam and prayer card to A. T. Uchiyama, Soka, Japan. A month later he wrote: "As you kindly recommended, I, at the start, have decided to translate the pamphlet into Japanese and publish it on my own account, reciting daily the prayer for the canonization of Blessed Kateri, and will send a copy of Japanese version to you as soon as it has come into being."

to the contributions made to the world steming from the early Mohawk Indians and the missionaries who lived in the Mohawk Valley.

The liturgy followed, the readings done by Matt Cinquanti, Margaret Kane, and Fr. Egan. Bishop Hubbard gave a homily that will inspire forever.

Mr. and Mrs. Thombs provided the choral parts of the liturgy. Sister Helen Gertrude signed the Mass for the Deaf. Channel 8, a closed circuit TV channel from Amsterdam, N.Y., taped the entire ninety minute service to be shown around Thanksgiving in the Mohawk Valley area.

Immediately after the service in the Coliseum a banquet was held in the Shrine Cafeteria, packed to capacity.

Princess Pale Moon, a Cherokee-Ojibwa entertaining artist, opened the dinner singing the National Anthem and signing it in the Cherokee sign language; she would also close the evening with "God Bless America."

During the course of the agape Fr. Kopp, Bishop Harrison's secretary, Mrs. Gertrude O'Brien, Fr. Edward Pratt, secretary to Bishop Hubbard, Fr. James Shanahan, former provincial, Fr. Joseph Towle, vice provincial, Will Rose, Princess' husband, and Fr. Tom Egan, were introduced.

The banquet's peak moment was the presentation of the 1980 Kateri Tekakwitha Award presented to Bishop Hubbard by Anne Scheuerman, chairperson of the League's Special Activities.

Finally, the fifth staging of "Godspell With Kateri" at Auriesville this season revealed youthful enthusiasm in portraying St. Mathew's Gospel as Kateri listened as she did 300 years ago to it being explained by the missionaries. The play culminates in a moving tableaux of Blessed Kateri now in glory.

Sacrament of the Eucharist, a modest edifice in her name seems a fitting memorial to the Lily of the Mohawks, according to Father Joseph McBride, vice postulator.

Public veneration is now allowed although a church may not be named for a blessed. Special permission would have to be obtained to have the chapel named the Blessed Kateri Chapel.

Two pledges for one thousand dollars each have been made after revealing the plan in a conversation with the McCauley family of Phoenix, Arizona, and the Smith Family of St. Louis, Missouri.

Mental sketches have been drawn showing the chapel of a longhouse design, the interior of which would be simple, highlighting every opportunity to pray and meditate before the Bread of Life.
