## July 14th Event Marks Kateri Day

An international flavor will be given to Blessed Kateri's Feast Day celebration this year by the fact that one of the 1985 Tekakwitha Award recipients will be Mireille Moreu of Barcelona, Spain, and another will be Brother Servatius Hoff, F.M.M. of West Germany. In addition to these, there will be Lupe Espitia and her friends from Paramount, California, Sister Mary Catherine Rich, C.S.J. from Latham, New York, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Walker from Scotia, New York.

Festivities will begin with a concelebrated Mass at 12:30 P.M., Sunday, July 14, 1985, in the Martyrs Shrine Coliseum. The celebrant, Rev. John Brown, S.J., is a Blackfoot. Father Brown, a classmate of Rev. Joseph S. McBride, S.J., has worked with the Blackfoot Indians in the western part of the United States for many years.

Scheduled to give the homily is Rev. Joseph S. McBride, S.J.,

The St. Joseph's Church Choir from Broadalbin, New York, under the direction of Sally Mullin has been asked to prepare a musical program. #### **CANCER HALTED**



## Prof. James Preston Begins Research on Catholic Pilgrimage

Dr. James J. Preston is conducting research on Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. You may have seen him last summer at the Auriesville Shrine, Fonda, the Northeastern Tekakwitha Conference or on the pilgrimage to St. Regis and Caughnawaga. Dr.

Preston is Professor of Anthropology and Chairman of the Religous Studies program at SUNY Oneonta. He is the editor of two books: Community, Self and Identity (1978) and Mother Worship: Theme and Variations (1982). Dr. Preston is the author of Cult of the Goddess: Social and Religious Change in a Hindu Temple (1985) and has written numerous articles on various aspects of comparative religion. He was trained in the fields of anthropology and religion at the Hartford Seminary Foundation where he received his Ph. D. in 1974 after a year of field work on Hinduism in India.

Today Dr. Preston has changed his research interests from eastern religions to the religions of the west, particularly Roman Catholicism. He is interested in pilgrimage, the study of religious experience and the devotion to Catholic saints. More specifically he desires to deepen our understanding of Catholicism in the United States and Canada. For this reason he has elected to study American pilgrimage shrines. The largest pilgrimage in North America is Our Lady of

## LeMoyne College Hosts Tekakwitha Conference

The planning committee of the National Tekakwitha Conference met, February 9, 1985, at St. Lucy's Church, Syracuse, New York, to organize plans for the 1985 Conference to be held August 7-11 at Le Moyne College, Syracuse, New York.

Despite the stormy weather thirty people assembled with Father Gilbert Hemauer, O.F.M. Cap. acting as chairperson. Representatives came from Syracuse, Rochester, Amsterdam, and St. Regis, including Father Thomas Egan, S.J., pastor.

The theme of the conference is "Spiritual Journeying with Kateri and Walking in her Footsteps." When this year's site was discussed at the last annual Conference, great enthusiasm was displayed

to visit places sacred to Kateri's life. On Thursday of the Conference a convoy of buses will go in the morning to Fonda, Kateri's baptismal site, and in the afternoon to Auriesville, Kateri's birthplace. On Friday the contingent will continue their "spiritual journey" to Kahnawake, Canada, where Kateri's remains are in a marble sarcophagus in St. Francis Xavier Church. On returning the pilgrims will stop at the St. Regis-Mohawk reserve, Hogansburg, New York.

Guadalupe in Mexico City. Canada can be proud of three major pilgrimage shrines in the province of Quebec. In the United States, there are numerous shrines with over 30,000 pilgrims per year. These would include the Marian Shrine (W. Haverstraw, NY), Our Lady of Snows (Belleville, IL), The Blue Army Shrine (Washington, NJ), to name only a few. The largest pilgrimage in the United States is probably Our Lady of the Martyrs at Auriesville, New York.

Aside from this more general interest in Catholic pilgrimages, Dr. Preston is focusing his research efforts on a study of the devotion to Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. He has been working with both Vice-Postulator's for her cause, Rev. Henri Bechard (Canada) and Rev. Joseph McBride (United States). The study of the "making of a saint" in our contemporary world involves fascinating questions about the changing definition of "miracles," peoples from every race and religion who identify with Blessed Kateri, the history of Jesuit-Indian relations, and the emerging sense of pride among Native Americans about this devout Mohawk maiden who

withstood enumerable hardships to uphold her great faith. Dr. Preston has attended many events associated with Kateri's growing devotion. He is presently interviewing devotees from various backgrounds. This coming summer he plans to spend some time in Canada and St. Regis, New York to broaden his understanding of the devotion to Blessed Kateri.

This research project will take several years to complete. It is a complex phenomenon involving shrines and numerous groups who actively support Kateri's cause. The process of canonization alone involves a most complex and intricate set of procedures. Dr. Preston will not publish anything until he has checked all sources as thoroughly as possible. He is grateful for the cooperation of priests, shrine directors, and devotees who have already assisted by granting many interviews. Hopefully, these years of research will result in several publications on different aspects of American Catholicism. Dr. Preston is discovering how vibrant the Catholic religion remains despite increasing pressures for secularization in the modern world.







## The Spirit of the Achiote and Ecu

Within a number of Native American spiritual practices and religious rituals, particular plants have factored as significant. For example, tobacco has had wide ritual use in various northeast woodlands ceremonials. The button of the cactus Lophophora Williamsii (peyote) has found veneration and use in the attainment of visions by a range of southwest peoples. For the Colorado Indians of western

Ecuador, it is the achiote plant that symbolizes the heart of the community.

The Colorados (the name is Spanish for "colored"; their name is rendered "Cocanigua" in Tzafiqui, their native language) are an amiable and open people. They live at the start of the coastal jungles of Ecuador in South America, a heavily vegetated region that spans out from the foothills of the Andes mountains to the Pacific coast. Eight Colorado "comunas" (communities) are located in the environs of the town of Santo Domingo de los Colorados, the only city of any import in that general vicinity. Ecuador has a great number of Indian peoples within its population, located principally

in the Amazon-basin jungles of "El Oriente" (eastern Ecuador) and scattered about "La Sierra" (the Andean range). The Colorados, however, living on the occidental side of the towering Andes, have developed external and internal characteristics that have made them quite unique.

The Colorado male shaves his head, except for a ring of hair on top, leaving the bangs longish. He then dyes his hair a brilliant red from a dye extracted from the achiote plant. Finally, the Colorado rubs in a vaseline paste that makes his hair hard, until it appears as if he is wearing a red plastic bowl on his head. (I believe that the paste in their hair has served a practical purpose as well as customary — the process provides a "waterproofing" for the hair, useful in this region of frequent torrential rains). Some will use the achiote to paint their face and body, as well. (The name "Colorado" refers to this use of achiote paint). Traditional dress for the male includes a loose mantle around the shoulders and a multi-colored skirt. Women traditionally have gone bare-chested, also wearing bright, banded

It is because of the Colorado's esteem for the achiote that the men rub it in their hair and on their body. The Colorados conceive that life is like the bud of the achiote plant, inside of which the seeds symbolize the people of the community. The seeds are arranged in orderly rows within the cluster of five flowers. When the bud opens, the seeds fly out and find root. This has come to symbolize the search of each member of the community for meaning and for favorable relationships. Thus, according to married couples, the fruit of the achiote guards the relationships and social conformity of the Colorado community. The achiote, thus, is a symbol of a unity experienced by individuals dwelling together.

However, the spirit of the

achiote is threatened! I had occasion to visit the Colorado "comuna" this past February in the course of a trip through Ecuador. There, I met Nicanor Colazacon, the "governor" and chief of the Colorados. Nicanor is a delightful young man, collegeeducated and well-travelled. Yet, he tenaciously clings to his traditional Cocanigual culture. He is an elected chief, although his selection is influenced by his relation to the former chief, his uncle, Abraham Colazacon. He also has civil authority as the local representative in the provincial assembly of the province of Pichincha.

Speaking in excellent Spanish, Nicanor described his people to me. He noted their great reputation for pacifism and honesty. He extoled the traditional importance of the family and community. With pride, he told me how he had led the contingent of Colorados that had met the Pope during John Paul's recent visit to

Ecuador. With a progressive farsightedness, he talked about his plans to participate in the upcoming, second Ecuadorian Pan-Indian conference. But then he became sad.

Nicanor related to me that less and less of the young people are following traditional Colorado styles of living. American and European styles were replacing traditional dress. (My visit to one of the schools in the comuna bore this observation out — only two boys in a class of thirty wore the painted hair and the shaved head). Fewer were involved in hunting, fishing and farming, but were seeking work in Santo Domingo. Many were intermarrying outside of the tribe, and leaving the comunas for other parts of Ecuador. Few women were to be seen bare-breasted. He went on to explain that it was more than the external traits that were being threatened. He saw a loss of the interior values characteristic of the Cocanagua: pacifism, honesty and community-orientation. In other words, Nicanor has witnessed a direct correlation between the loss of the external signs of the culture and the loss of interior values. He fears that Colorado culture as it has been known is in danger.

Is the drifting away from tradi-

tional ways and values a cause of problems or a symptom? As Ecuador attempts to keep pace culturally, diplomatically and economically with the other modern American states, will the Colorados continue to change along with the country? And what of Christian evangelization? Protestant missionaries have translated the Bible into Tzafiqui. but the Catholic Church, of which eighty per cent of the Colorados are members, continues to conduct evangelization almost exclusively in Spanish. According to Brother Eduardo Munoz, F.S.C., postulator of the canonization cause for Francisco Febres-Cordero (Hermano Miguel) and the rector of a Catholic academy in Quito, no serious evangelization effort would be attempted unless it was coupled with a campaign for social integration.

Many questions remain as to the fate of Colorado culture with or without outside influences. In finding its culture in a precarious position, the Colorados share a preoccupation that many native Americans experience. Hopefully, the corporate fate of these amiable red-topped Indians will have a happy ending. Otherwise, the spirit of the achiote will be broken, and with it, the spirit of a

people.

1975 Tekakwitha Award Winner, Anna Rose Balsamo, a retired Dayton, Ohio, businesswoman, needs our prayers. She recently completed 42 years of service in support of the canonization of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. Monthly she has a Mass offered in her parish church for Kateri's canonization and has mailed countless pamphlets and holy cards to thousands of Catholics throughout the country. 

## The Day Kateri Was Baptized

### An Editorial

Easter Sunday, 1676, at Fonda, New York, Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha was washed with the waters of Baptism and became a new person, a new child of God. Not the ordinary custom was it to have one so young to be baptized, but because of Kateri's great desire to belong to Christ's Mystical Body, the chaplain, Father James de Lamberville, granted permission for the ceremony to take place.

Kateri's tribes-people gathered in the small chapel to witness the simple but meaningful baptismal ceremony. The spring from which the water was taken still flows today on the grounds of the Tekakwitha Friary where Kateri's village has been marked out by professional anthropologists.

The effects of Kateri's baptism were soon evidenced in her young life by all who knew her. She

reflected the knowledge that she was now a member of the community, Christ's Church. She had really been renewed in spirit and strengthened by the Sacrament of Baptism. She portrayed to those around her what many Renew programs are inspiring the family of God to do today. She never hid the new Light burning within her under a bushel. She went out among her people, teaching the children, helping the sick, proclaiming her love of the Cross, displaying an inspirational devotion to the Rosary and the Mother of God, and always manifesting an exceptional love of the Holy Eucharist.
