
PRAYER for the Canonization of BLESSED KATERI TEKAKWITHA

 I bear glad tidings: Born this day, your savior and your God."



Only a Shadow




SERVICE OF THE TABLE

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TANTUM ERGO SACRAMENTUM



An explanation of Bishop Donald E. Pelotte's Coat of Arms:

The Coat of Arms is special to each Bishop, and has a long tradition in the Church. The Arms of Bishop Pelotte consist of a white shield, a symbol of peace, with a cross consisting of four black arrows interlaced, with the points and the feathers reversed.

The interlaced arrows summarize the motto: STRENGTHEN ONE ANOTHER (taken from St. Paul's letter to the Romans, Ch. 14:19.) The arrows honor Bishop Pelotte's Indian ancestry and heritage. The cross of arrows also recalls the words of the Prophet

Isaiah, Ch. 2:4, which calls the people to peace.

The chalice with the host has been adapted from the new insignia of the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament. It is an ancient custom to place the symbols of religious orders on the Arms of members who are raised to the episcopate. Behind the Arms is placed a gold processional cross. A pontifical hat, with its six tassels on each side, dates back to an old Church custom of showing signs of rank.

Bishop Pelotte worked with an artist to design the shield.
