

THE VENERABLE AND HER CAUSE

Ossernenon, near Auriesville, N. Y., where Saint Isaac Jogues and companions were martyred, 1642-46. Her mother, captive Christian Algonquin, and pagan father died when she was a child unbaptized

She grew up innocent, industrious, chaste. When eighteen a missionary came to her people. Baptized Easter, 1676, she was persecuted by wicked Indians. She escaped to La Prairie, Canada, autumn, 1677. She was a model of prayer, love of the Holy Eucharist and of the Blessed Virgin. She received First Communion at Christmas, resisted a second attempt to have her marry, and made the vow of virginity, first of her people, feast of the Annunciation, 1679.

She died April 17, 1680. Remarkable cures have been effected by using objects applied to her relics. She is called wonder-worker for the many favors obtained by invoking her aid. The Cause for her beatification is progressing rapidly in Rome.

"A spectacle for men and Angels."-Pius XI.

May 9, 1939, the Cardinals of the Congregation of Rites recommended the Introduction of the Cause for her Beatification and their decision was sanctioned by our Holy Father, Pius XII, May 19.

June 12, 1942, His Holiness approved the decision of the Congregation that Tekakwitha's virtues were heroic. To proclaim this he authorized the Decree in which she is styled—

VENERABLE.

All who lived with Tekakwitha considered her so holy that when she died they began to invoke her to obtain heavenly favors. They believed their prayers were answered. This belief has increased with the years.

EXAMPLES OF FAVORS REPORTED DAILY:

"A conversion, marriage righted, position, return to the Church."

"Given up, a physician recovered from a virulent pneumonia."

"Cured of tuberculosis considered incurable, I was re-employed by the company with whom I was before illness."

A pastor reports: "A parish financial favor."

Another: "She has helped build our new church."

A third: "An almost impassable obstacle mastered."

Still another: "Remarkable financial progress without any special appeals."

On behalf of his Bishop, a Vicar General reports payment of one-eighth of a crushing debt within a year.

For a hospital the sisters invoked her to help collect \$17,000 due. They received \$23,000.

Three successive years a venerable foundress of a religious congregation has reported sufficient additional vocations.

Sisters of Pingtichuan, China, after thanking Kateri for their protection, report the recovery of a young girl from typhus and another hopelessly ill. A missionary there accounts for the foundation and support of a large body of Chinese Sisters.

A lady, 61 years old, was paralyzed, passing several weeks in coma; her doctor and two assistants gave up hope. The relic of Tekakwitha was applied, and the next day, arousing from coma, she said. "Jesus, mercy." The doctor, a Protestant, wrote his opinion: "This cannot be accounted for medically.—S. S., M.D." Still living after seven years.

Two apparent miracles are actually under investigation by Apostolic Process and, should they be proved miraculous, Tekakwitha will be declared Blessed. Pray this may happen soon.



OUR FATHER

Kateri Tekakwitha was born in 1656 at Auriesville in the eastern part of New York State. It was here that St. Isaac Jogues and Companions were martyred in 1642-46.

Kateri grew up innocent, industrious, chaste. When she was eighteen, a Jesuit missionary came to her Indian village which is now called Fonda, five miles west of her birthplace. She studied her Faith with such diligence that she received baptism on Easter Sunday in 1676. Persecuted by her people because of her Faith, she escaped to Canada in the autumn of 1677. She was a model of prayer, a lover of the Holy Eucharist and of the Blessed Virgin. Kateri resisted two attempts to have her marry. On the Feast of the Annunciation in 1679, she was the first of her people to make the vow of virginity.

It was on April 17, 1680, that Kateri died near Montreal, Canada. Six days after her death she appeared to Fr. Chauchetiere, one of the Jesuit missionaries, with her face radiant and her eyes raised heavenward as in an ecstacy. Twice again she appeared to him refulgent with a heavenly beauty and asked him to write her life story, which he did. The fame of Kateri's holiness spread far and wide. Wonders were wrought at her tomb. People came on pilgrimage to acknowledge the benefits of her intercession and to ask for new favors.
