

FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends of Blessed Kateri,

The theme for the 70th Tekakwitha Conference was "With Kateri We Spread God's Word". It was a common bond that brought the 2009 participants together in Raleigh, North Carolina from July 1st through the 5th.

During this event Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha was the primary focus for prayer, keynote speakers and workshops. The on-going hope-filled atmosphere was that our patroness will SOON be raised as the First Native American Saint in the Universal Church. Much gratitude and appreciation is expressed to our presiders, prayer leaders, homilists, keynote speakers and workshop presenters who helped us draw greater attention to our model, our 'saint'.

For a few decades Kateri Tekakwitha has been known as the patroness of ecology to foster care for the earth, the environment. With the Tekakwitha Conference members and staff there is a conscious birthing of an ecospirituality. This can be native spirituality lived out in our daily lives. Bishop Pfeifer states in a pastoral letter in : "Human life and all life as we know it, is dependent on "Mother" Earth for survival. Similarly, as we are coming to realize more and more, Mother Earth is dependent on her inhabitants for survival. In God's design a delicate balance, a "web of life" and mysterious interconnectedness exist among all forms of life impacting the ecology and environment of the earth. ... a spiritual bond holds all things together. To strengthen and renew this bond and interconnectedness, there is a need for a spirituality of the earth, an ecospirituality." (quotes from ORIGINS)

As a staff we have joined many other organizations to do our part in caring for the earth and environment by 'going green'. mony on August 29, 2008, at the annual meeting of the Society of American Archivists at the Hilton Hotel in San Francisco.

Thiel's exhaustive work on the five-volume *Guide to Catholic-Related Records About Native Americans* in electronic format garnered the award, which recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the field of religious archives. Thiel collected the information for more than 25 years from over 1,000 repositories in 43 states and 15 foreign countries.

Avery Cardinal Dulles, SJ 1918-2008

Cardinal Dulles, who died on Dec. 12 at the age of 90, was the first American to become a cardinal without first becoming a bishop.




The interment followed directly afterward. In recognition of Cardinal Dulles' military service during World War II, the casket was escorted by a pair of Naval officers.


