## KATERIGRAM

N THE LAST issue of Kateri, I invited the friends of the Mohawk Maiden to participate in the drive for Our Father's and Hail Mary's to hasten her canonization. With some hesitation, I drew attention to myself by mentioning my 50 years of religious life this coming September. For this occasion I asked to be remembered with a gift of 50,000 signed daily Prayer Pledges until the blessed day when we have our "St. Kateri." I also begged of you, on account of my vow of poverty, not to send me anything personally.

But why insist on 50,000 Our Father's and Hail Mary's each day? Our Lord Himself answers: "I say to you: Ask, and it will be given to you; search and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you" (Luke 11.10). If this is true about one person, how much more so it will be about 50,000! Perhaps we shan't get it in the twinkling of an eye, but then let's not bear a grudge. We must come to anchor in certainty, we must be convinced that this canonization will take place much sooner than we think, on condition that we solicit it with headstrong insistence and unshakable confidence.

Now and then someone will say, "I asked, but I did not receive." Of course, all requests must be in conformity with the glory of God and our salvation. But who shall say that the canonization of Blessed Kateri is not for the glory of God and for our salvation?

Will the Father in heaven, who is so good and powerful, refuse to grant the plea of 50,000 devotees of the Lily of the Mohawks, who conjure Him day after day to elevate Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha to the ranks of the Saints? He will necessarily grant their request.

Remember the man in the parable who knocks at the door of his friend in the middle of the night to ask him for bread to feed a visitor who has come unexpectedly. At first he is met with a distinct no, then, after some banging at the door, he receives the desired loaf of bread. The lesson is clear: pester your relatives your friends and acquaintainces to sign a promise of one Our Father and of one Hail Mary to be said daily for Kateri's canonization. It isn't very agreeable to be a source of harassment for one's friends, but isn't this what it often takes for the Heart of God to answer our prayers?



At the end of the last century, Fr. William Forbes, missionary at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier, future Archbishop of Ottawa, Ontario, expressed regret that the Iroquois village on the St. Lawrence was called Caughnawaga, the scarcely euphonious rendering in English of its original name. In March 1981, the Canadian Post sanctioned the use of the town's original name, Kahnawake: At-therapid (of Lachine, P.Q.). Roots: ohnawa, rapid; ke: locality, place.

## KATERI AT BARCELONA

From Barcelona, Spain, Miss Mireille Moreu, ardent devotee of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, writes: Here in Barcelona, we had a special Mass in honor of Blessed Kateri, on Saturday, April 17 at 7 p.m. The Reverend Sebastià Bartina, S.J., who officiated, told us he had been to Montreal for a science convention about four months after the beatification of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. On a free day at the end of the convention, he went to Kahnawake with a Jesuit confrère and prayed at the Beata's tomb. He then summed up her life for us. quoting the Pope at the moment of the Beatification, and expressed the wish that this first Mass at Barcelona would not be the last one, and that we would meet every year... There is an interesting link between the Lilv of the Mohawks and Barcelona: at the cathedral, the ornemental door of the baptistery carries an inscription that recalls the baptism of the first six Amerindians who came to Spain with Christopher Columbus in 1693.

## KATERI AT AURIESVILLE

On Sunday, May 2, at 4 p.m., Most Rev. Howard J. Hubbard, D.D., Bishop of Albany, celebrated

the Feast Day Mass in honor of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha in the Martyrs' Shrine Coliseum Fr. Edward C. Pratt. Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese of Albany gave the homily. In accepting the invitation, he wrote to Fr. Joseph McBride, Vice-Postulator for U.S.A., "I would want to do Kateri justice in presenting my personal thoughts and reflections upon this great personage and spirit-filled person who has blessed our land and our diocese." An excellent musical program for the Eucharist was prepared by the Rainbow Music Ministries. Earlier in the afternoon, at 2 p.m., the 15 Rainbow Clowns, aged 8 to 15, from North Troy, NY, displayed the 15 letters in Kateri Tekakwitha's name on large drawing cards and gave a short exhortation on each letter, which told something about the Lily of the Mohawks' life. It was followed by a procession to outdoor devotions before Blessed Kateri's statue. The entire program was arranged by the Mohawk Valley Blessed Kateri Associates under the leadership of Eloise Etzhorn, the group's chairperson.

The Mass ended with a shuffle dance by some women and girls round the altar and with the gift of a large picture of Kateri to all the mothers of the parish. The donors, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Constantino, from Amsterdam, NY, were present. Devoted parishioners had prepared a lavish meal for Kateri's devotees at the Beata's Hall in Hogansburg, NY. Fr. Michael Jacobs, S.J., despite his age and poor health, was able to come to the hall to greet the Katerians present.

The next day her own village of Kahnawake revered Blessed Kateri. Bishop Bernard Hubert of St. Jean-de-Québec presided at the Eucharist, accompanied by Fr. Bernard Carrière, Jesuit Provincial, by Fr. Léon Lajoie, Pastor of the Mission of St. Francis Xavier. and by Fr. Henri Béchard and his friends Frs. Thomas F. Egan. John M. Doolan and Robert L. Fleig. Meanwhile Frs. Paul-Emile Beaudoin, Leon Zipfeld and Laurent Lavallée. Assistants at the Mission, were occupied hearing confessions and later on in helping distribute Holy Communion. Bro. Marius Legault, F.E.C., the Bishop's secretary, was Master of Ceremonies. Approximately seventy-five Knights of Columbus of the Fourth Degree graced the ceremonies with their presence. Mr. Rene Perreault, Ex-Worthy Master of the district of Montreal, escorted Bishop Hubert to the presidential chair; Navigator Gerald Marion of the Bishop Wadham's Assembly from Plattsburgh, NY, accompanied to his prie-dieu in the sanctuary. His Honor Judge Maurice Perron. Supreme Director of the Knights of Columbus and honorary president of the festivities.

Bro. John Smith, F.E.C. was the Master of Ceremonies. Mr. Larry Taylor took care of the first reading, Mr. Peter Jacobs of the sec-

## KATERI IN THE AMAZONIAN JUNGLE

SINCE JANUARY 16, 1982, Kateri Tekakwitha has become the protectress of the little village of Yacapana in the Peruvian jungle of the Amazon. Her statue is honored on the altar of a school serving as a church.

This little pueblo is one of the sixty-two villages which were under the responsability of Franciscan Father Jacques Lefebvre, then missionary at Tamchyiacu, where he dwelt for nine months and a half. Since November 1981, he has been working at Tingo Maria in the Great Cordillera of the Andes.

As the inhabitants of Yacapana were unaware that St. Martin de Porres was the patron of the entire area, in June, they asked Father Lefebvre to suggest the name of a patron saint for their little village. Kateri Tekakwitha's immediately came to his mind for three reasons: she was an Indian like them, she had lived in the diocese where he was born, she had just been beatified at Rome. The suggestion was enthusiastically accepted. So he wrote to his parents at Longueuil, P.Q., asking if it were possible to procure a statue of Kateri and to send it on as well as plenty of information to help in preparing the enthronement ceremony.

Like a miracle, on the same day two ladies, complete strangers until then, Mmes. Marguerite Pelland and Fernande Milot, declared they had obtained many favors through Kateri, that they greatly relied on her and wanted to do something by way of acknowledgement. They had a splendid, twenty-seven-inch high statue made, which I, as Fr. Jacques' mother took to South America early last January. Thus after being wrapped up in a brand-new sleeping bag reserved for further use by Father, Kateri travelled for the first time in a suitcase. The plane flew from Montreal to Lima, capital of Peru, where Fr. Lefebvre was waiting for the beloved traveller, carrying the much longed for image, then on with it to Iquitos, capital of the jungle of the Amazon. From there, by boat on the Amazon, for there are no roads, under a pouring rain, we went to Tamchyiacu to spend the night. The next day, with the Pastor of the place, Fr. Clement Larose, C.S.V., we made it at last to Yacapana, with Fr. Lefebvre (Padre Diego) our leader, who was beaming with joy. All along the way, a few passengers who wanted to attend the gala event boarded our

boat. Every time that I see the Amazon, I am awed by its magnificence. At this time of year, the river was in full spate. In certain places, it was nearly as high as the shore, with the banks habitually measuring twenty feet in height. The current was so violent that it carried whole trees and pieces of land from the embankment and escarpments, even a sand bank, all of which continually change the riverbed. On the edge of the river one can be see immense trees called Capinori, Lopuna, and others, which are uprooted and will soon be victims of the current. Their foliage is unrivalled in beauty and one has the impression they don't want to die. At the sight of this splendor, one cannot help but believe in God.

At our destination, the moderator of the village of Yacapana, Jorge Cabrera Mori, comes down to welcome us at the riverside, and we must then walk nearly a half a mile with the suitcase and its precious contents before arriving at the school-chapel. To receive "Kateri" the Indians had erected a niche, simple but very lovely. It was lined with woven banana leaves, and decorated with beautiful wild jungle flowers called "Citullis," all of which was supported by bamboo stalks. One of them had four holes punched in it for candles. It was first-rate! A simple table covered with a bedspread served as the altar for Frs. Clement Larose and Diego Lefebvre, who proceeded with the enthronement before a rather large group, made up of all the inhabitants of the village; a dog decided to join them as an extra guest.

When the time came to record the ceremony on cassette, Fr. Jacques Lefebvre addressed himself at first in French to Bishop Bernard Hubert, of the Diocese of St. John of Quebec, and then to Fr. Béchard, Vice-Postulator of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, to greet them and describe the place where the festivities were taking place.

Moderator Jorge Cabrena Mori and his wife, Jonita Llerena Siàs, as well as the godfather chosen for the circumstance, Rodofo Moreno and his wife, the godmother, Antonia Marin Pinché, occupied the places of honor. In this country, the custom is that a godfather and a godmother take part in the important events of daily life. The moderator unveiled the statue, accompanied by the godfather and the godmother. After Fr. Lefebvre read Bishop Hubert's letter, in French and then in Spanish, the statue was blessed and the Holy Sacrifice offered during which one and all, the children as well as the adults, sang the praises of the Lord in the languages they knew, that is to say Quechua and Spanish. The Epistle was read by the moderator, Jorge Cabrena Mori; Fr. Clement Larose, who was concelebrating, read the Gospel; in his homily Fr. Lefebvre gave an interesting resumé of Kateri's life.

The ceremony took place in an atmosphere of joy and recol-

lection. With a song in their hearts, all partook of a tasty dinner of roast bananas with yucca, manioc and rice, at the Moderator's home on stilts.

We had to leave quite soon, for travelling on the Amazon after sundown is very dangerous, and the trip back to Iquitos takes two hours and a half. We regretfully quit Yacapana after casting a last glance at Kateri, who had so well preserved us during the entire journey and who henceforth would be the protectress of this village.

## HE CAME FROM PARIS

N 1680, the year of Kateri Tekakwitha's death, Fr. Peter Remy, P.S.S., who had come to Canada in 1672, was appointed Pastor of Holy Angels' Parish at Lachine, which he would be responsible for until 1706. On all sides, people spoke of Kateri's holiness and of the many favors and miracles previously mentioned. At the little settlement on the

north bank of the St. Lawrence, practically facing the Indian mission, her devotees invoked her more and more and even went to pray at her tomb in the little church dedicated to St. Francis Xavier.

The Pastor, a native of Paris, frowned with displeasure. How could a young native, who was barely converted, have reached the perfection of a St. Genevieve or of a St. Louis so dear to the heart of France? The years tripped by and in 1696, Fr. Remy heard that Fr. Cholenec, Kateri's former director, was preparing a life of his spiritual daughter of yore. For eight or nine years, the good Pastor had been completely won over to the one who was known as "the miracle-worker of Canada," and in March 1696, he decided not to delay writing to the Jesuit. He considered himself in duty bound to report the favors the Iroquois "saint" had poured down upon his parish. Later on, as they took place, he would add others to the list, more than a hundred in all.

To begin with, the good priest was sceptical about Kateri. He was not at all impressed by his parishioners' accounts of the cures obtained for them through the Servant of God. But the day came when he considered it wise to implore Kateri to help him. How did this change of heart come about? Fr. de Charlevoix in his monumental **History of New France**, published in 1744, gives us a version already touched by legend. Each year, he wrote, it was customary in the

neighboring parishes to go to sing a Mass in honor of the Blessed Trinity at the mission church of the Jesuits.

"On being informed by his parishioners of this custom, he replied that he deemed it a duty not to sanction by his presence a public cultus not yet permitted by the Church. Most, on hearing him speak thus, could not refrain from saying that he would soon be punished for his refusal, and in fact he fell dangerously ill the same day. He at once understood the cause of this unexpected attack. He bound himself by a vow to follow the example of his predecessors, and was instantly cured."

Now as I have said before, Fr. Remy was named pastor of the parish of the Holy Angels in the very year of Kateri Tekakwitha's death. Consequently, none of his predecessors could ever have conformed to a custom which did not exist. Let us follow instead the worthy priest's own account of his "conversion" to the Lily of the Mohawks. It appears that at first he had no objections to the private cultus being rendered to her, but soon became bitterly opposed to it.

In 1687 or 1688, the pastor was afflicted witth a sore right ear, which prevented him from hearing confessions on that side. For three months he tried several remedies unsuccessfully; on the advice of his confessor, he even tried Holy Water, but in vain; then one of his flock, Jeanne Merrin, wife of René Moreau du Portail, came to ask him to offer the Holy Sacrifice in thanksgiving for the cure she had

obtained after praying to the saintly native girl.

Fr. Remy, who was about to put on his chasuble, felt strongly inspired to have recourse to this extraordinary Iroquois. Wouldn't she help him recover his hearing? He immediately vowed to say three masses: one in honor of St. Aurel, another in honor of St. Owen, whom a good and devout soldier had often spoken to him about, and who apparently had never existed, and the last one in honor of Kateri Tekakwitha. After receiving communion, he suddenly felt better and at the end of the Eucharistic Celebration he discovered that he was no longer deaf. Faithful to his vow, the good priest hastened to offer the three masses. Henceforth he would never hesitate to appeal to Kateri in all his spiritual and temporal needs.

The Lachine pastor relates that he obtained another favor through her intercession, a spiritual favor he promised to give us the details about "in a special paper." If it ever was written, it has not come down to us. "For the heavenly aid,"he wrote, "I have so often received from her in my need, and which I hope to receive until the end of my days, I am more indebted to the servant of God than for all the other help which I have received from God through her intercession, whether temporal or corporal, for myself and for many of my

In 1690 or 1692, during the excessive heat of June or July, an attack of siatica tied him to his bed. Three days later, feeling he would be definitively bedridden and unable to fulfill his pastoral obligations, he vowed, if Kateri restored his health, to offer several masses in her honor; to go to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier to celebrate the Holy Sacrifice, and to make a novena, partaking each day of her ashes and earth of her grave diluted in water.

The next morning, he awoke alert and nimble, without any pain in his thigh, and immediately went to ring the Angelus. He then lost no time in offering a mass of thanksgiving to Kateri and in ac-

complishing the rest of his vow.

These blessings, as one may well imagine, transformed Fr. Remy into an enthusiastic worker for the girl whom he had previously judged unworthy of serving as a canal for divine favors.

## **Children First**

The first ones he noted in the report he prepared for Fr. Cholenec were about children. For them as well as for adults, he generally proceeded in the same way. He offered the ailing ashes from Kateri's clothing or earth from her tomb mixed with water or again added to medication, to pasties of the clergy or to salve that Bishop de Laval had given him. At the same time he advised them to make a novena of nine Hail Mary's and promised to recommend them to Our Lord through the intercession of the Iroquois Maiden each morning at Holy Mass.

As early as 1681, Kateri favored a fine family of Holy Angels' Parish with a singular blessing. Our Congregation for the Cult of Saints, as well as the Congregation of Rites at that time, would not have accepted it as a miracle for the canonization of Kateri Tekakwitha. But what did the mother of three-month-old Rene Fortin think?

The child was seized with panic fears which made him cry out day and night without stopping. His face was black and blue and a sight to behold. The mother in tears saw nothing better to do than to take her little one to the pastor, who read over his head the first chapter of the Gospel of St. John. In 1535, Jacques Cartier had done so for the agohanna or chief of Hochelaga, who was completely crippled with rheumatism. The child's panic worsened. Wouldn't he succumb to these strange alarms? Fr. Remy then advised the mother to dedicate Rene to Kateri Tekakwitha and to make a novena or have one made at her grave. She immediately gave her consent to the suggestion, and, as if by magic, the tears and the cries subsided.

In 1684. Kateri affectionately took care of Lambert Cuillierier. who was only two years old. The simple faith of Rene, his father, and Marie Lucault, his mother, arouse her compassion. According to the pastor, the little one was suffering from consumption. He was just about unable to take any nourishment and was reduced to skin and bone. His final hour was not far away. What could be done? On the other side of the river, at the junction of the little Suzanne River and the St. Lawrence, in the church of St. Francis Xavier, were buried the relics of Kateri Tekakwitha: there his parents carried Lambert, set

him down upon her grave, had the Holy Sacrifice offered and a novena begun to obtain from the good Lord the recovery of their son through the intercession of His servant. Immediately afterwards, he was much better and twelve years later, Fr. Remy wrote that the youth was in perfect health.

In 1690, a serious illness once again tried the Cullierier family. Joseph, aged twelve, suffered from a fever and consumption which led him to the last extremity. His father turned to Kateri who had helped his son Lambert. He obtained from the Fathers of the Indian mission ashes from Kateri's clothing, dissolved some in water, which he had the sick boy drink. He recovered his health.

Barbara Brunet, daughter of Francis known as Le Bourbonnais, and of Barbara Beauvais, was thirteen years old in 1688. During two months, she suffered from a tertian fever¹ which degenerated into a double tertian fever. She looked like a skeleton and could take neither medication nor nourishment and felt as if she were about to die. Someone, nobody knows who, inspired her to have recourse to Kateri Tekakwitha. It was a last hope. She promised everything that Fr. Remy generally recommended to those who were ill, and two days later the fever disappeared. It goes without saying that she kept her

The next one on the pastor's list was Francis Joseph Le Noir Rolland. In 1689 he was three years old. Paralyzed from the hips down, he was unable to stand up. His mother dedicated him to "the Iroquois Saint," crossed the river, went to her grave, had a mass offered and asked one of the Indian women of the Mission, probably a member of Kateri's band, to make a novena for her son Joseph. Nine days later, Francis Joseph could walk for the first time.

At Lachine, Kateri was also the providence of the family of Peter Cardinal and of Marie Matour. Since the birth of their son Daniel, the mother, who was twenty-four years old in 1692, had been suffering unbearable that she sought for relief on all sides, but to no avail. As a last resort she prayed to "the good Indian." If she cured her, the woman would go to the church of St. Francis Xavier to have a mass offered in thanksgiving. Shortly afterwards, without recourse to any remedy, she no longer felt any pain. At the Indian Mission, a Jesuit offered the mass she had promised and Fr. Remy did as much for her husband who also had obtained from the Lily of the Mohawks a cure from a serious illness.

In 1694, their daughter Marie was helped by Kateri Tekakwitha. She was only five years old and suffered from scrofula, a tuberculer inflamation of the lymphatic glands of the neck. In Montreal she had undergone a lengthy treatment but to no purpose. Finally, the poor

mother remembered the past favors Kateri had granted her and proceeded as she had done before: a visit to the Mission, a mass offered, and a novena begun. When her devotions were completed, little Marie no longer suffered from scrofula, "an incurable disease in this country," noted Fr. Remy.

To cap it all for that year, Marie Matour had a cow which was swelling up before her eyes and was in danger of dying. Very simply and with complete trust, she promised to have a mass said by her pastor for this intention. The poor beast's swelling immediately went down, and the Cardinal family was saved from a considerable loss.

The first favor Kateri conferred on the Cardinals in 1696 was not important enough to overthrow the walls of Jericho. It did, however, come in the nick of time. In February, John, aged five. had swallowed a blade of wheat or straw which was choking him. It was impossible to budge it. To the mother's immense relief, a few gulps of water with ashes from Kateri's dress dislodged the blade of wheat.

During this same year, Marie Matour again appealed to "good Kateri," and her prayer was once again heard. Charles, born during the previous year, was covered with an eruption. The mother sent for ointment to rub on him. The surgeon had one of the empirical remedies of the time, composed of guicksilver, delivered to her. She was to rub only the knees and wrists of the child. Without bothering about these instructions, she smeared her son's entire body with it. It sent the little one into frightful convulsions. Summoned on the spot, Fr. Remy hastened to her home to recite the prayers of the Roman Ritual for the dangerously ill. Afterwards, with the mother, he dedicated the child to God through the mediation of Kateri Tekakwitha, Marie Matour immediately began a novena of nine Hail Mary's a day, and the priest promised to offer the little fellow to Our Lord each morning at Holy Mass. Thereupon they had baby Charles take some orvietan2 mixed with ashes from the clothes and the tomb of "the good Indian." To the great joy of his mother, Charles Cardinal was instantly cured of the eruption! This woman was an excellent Christian, and thanks to her celestial friend, received from God whatever she asked for.

Peter and Mary Cardinal and their children were not the only ones to benefit by Kateri Tekakwitha's blessings. In 1694, Francis Roy, a youth of seventeen years, strugged vainly against a bad fever despite the treatment of the best doctors of the country. Convinced that his end was near, he called for his pastor, who invited him to put his trust in "good Kateri" and to make use of all the means he suggested to his ailing parishioners. The priest and Francis fervently prayed to her during nine days, after which the fever faded away.

Then during the same year, there was the case of James Paré. This child of seven years could neither eat nor drink for evelen days. Fr. Remy finally administered him the sacrament of Extreme Unction. It was the feast of the Apostles Simon and Jude, October 28, and his condition was extremely critical. The parents along with the pastor dedicated James to Kateri Tekakwitha and practised the usual devotions. Furthermore his father pledged, if his son recovered his health, to go each year on the same day to the little Indian church to have a mass of thanksgiving said close by the remains of the young "saint." The following night, James asked for Indian corn to eat. Henceforth his health would be excellent. The child was intelligent, and the priest took the trouble to teach him to read. Later on his parents would send him to his uncle in Angers, pastor of the parish of Plessis, to have him educated in case he had a priestly vocation.

The months that followed passed by very quickly in Indian file until 1695. This time a baby of three years was the beneficiary of Kateri's loivng-kindness, powerful as she was on the heart of God. Louis Nepveu, like Charles Cardinal, was covered with an eruption, and even worse, his mother had no milk to feed him, only blood came from her breasts. She took upon herself to dedicate her son to Kateri and, on April 17, anniversary of the death of the saintly girl, carried him to her grave, and had a mass said during which she offered a loaf to be blessed. Before returning home, she requested the Fathers to begin a novena for her son. As soon as it was over the mother could nourish her little one, who was marvelously delivered of all traces of the eruption.

In the month of November, deeply grieved, Francis Dubois, one of the parishioners of Holy Angels', knocked at the door of the presbytery. His son, aged thirteen months, named Francis like himself, was dying. For a week, he had been vomiting all the food that had been given him and had been in the throes of continual convulsions. The surgeon who was treating him gave him up, and his mother was inconsolable.

The sympathetic pastor told the father that he counted on seeing the little boy cured, if his parents put their trust in Kateri Tekakwitha. Francis Dubois agreed and accompanied the priests to the foot of the altar of the Blessed Sacrament and consecrated the infant to Our Lord, with His servant, "the good Iroquois," as go-between. On returning to the presbytery, Fr. Remy wrote a few words of encouragement to the distressed mother and recommended that she make use of the same devotional practises as the other members of his flock who were ill. Each day during mass he would pray for Francis. The following night, the child ate heartily without any bad effects, and was never again troubled with convulsions. The pastor concluded, "As I myself have seen, he has been very well ever since."

As mine accepted, the Lord said: 'Do you not see that it is barbed by thorns, and that they will prick you!' All this was the more to prod my love, and only after entering into the confines of the Divine Heart, did it discover the thorns were roses.

"... I was made to understand that the riches of this Heart had not been offered to me for myself alone to enjoy, but that through me others might benefit by them."

This is the book for all who wish to renew or to revive their devotion to the Sacred Heart.
