"Good servant, you have been faithful in small things, I will put you in charge of my household, says the Lord: Share the joy of your Lord!"

What encouraging words! but how suprizing when we think that we must accomplish great actions to really serve the Lord well.

"If only I was placed in favorable circumstances, some will say, so I can perform better and do actions which would be more pleasing to the Lord... If only I had made a pilgrimage to Fatima or to Medjugorie! If only I had been called to serve in some difficult foreign mission... We must not forget how the Lord describes the general judgment: "When the Son of Man comes in his glory' escorted by all the angels, then he will make his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him... Then the King will say to those on his right hand: "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome, naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least these brothers of mine, you did it to me." (Mt: 25-31)

How an Indian got his Name

Indian names were a language unto themselves, laden with descriptive, allusive or even magical meaning. An Indian baby was named soon after birth usually by a medicine man or a paternal relation - and the entire village participated in the occasion.

The infant might be named for an animal, for a physical phenomenon such as thunder that occurred on the day of birth or even for a brave deed that once had been performed by the giver of the name. A woman generally kept the name she received at birth, but a man often replaced his original name with a new one that celebrated a personal act of valor, recalled an encounter with an

unusual animal or perhaps was inspired by a dream.

However, a man who had a handicap or some other distinguishing characteristic was forever known by an opposite nickname, such as Hump or Big Hand.

Because Indian names were almost always based on something objective, they could easily be rendered as pictographs-frequently with a line connecting visual representations of the name and a human head to signify ownership.

The Oblates ever present among the Natives

mmersed in Native land from the time of their arrival from France, the Oblates will never neglect this presence to the Natives, from coast to coast in Canada: religious practice, education, health, social services. The Oblate Brothers made themselves famous by their devotedness. This involvment is true in our times.

Nowadays there are hard reproaches made to the old missionaries (judging then by modern standards): while imposing their faith and culture imported from afar, they crushed ancestral the religions and the most authentic expressions of local culture. This reproach is at the same time true and false.



Christian Solidarity with First Nations

For example, who more than the Oblates have preserved in writing the language & culture of the Natives in numerous dictionaries, grammars and anthropological researches? The Amerindians and the Innuits are rediscovering now all its richness

It is true though that a vigourous shift had to be given. So the Oblates, still engaged in pastoral work among the Indians, are now more attentive to the values of their cultures: the Crees of James Bay, the Algonquins, the Attimateks of La Verendrye Park, the Montagnais of the North Shore and of Pointe Bleue, the Naskapis of the New-Quebec.

Since a few years also an

inevitable movement amongst the Oblates stimulated them to prepare rapidly all the actual Christian communities to take in their own hands their proper religious evolution and faith expression. A similar experience, now 25 vears old. amongst the Innuits of the Hudson Bay, has

confirmed the soundness of their orientations towards autonomy and responsibility, of a more serious future respectful of the authenticity of every nation.

Kateri never gave up

(Homily on the Feast of Blessed Kateri)

My dear sisters and brothers,

Native people know how important the Great Spirit is for all humankind... Native people address their prayers to the Creator and ask for the Great Spirit to guide them. There is also great joy in the Catholic Church throughout the world because she recognizes that one of the Mohawks, the Lilv of the Mohawks, Kateri, lived her life in an authentic and heroic Christian manner. Today a number of symbols come together: the Easter Lily is a sign of the Resurrection and new life; the Lily of the Mohawks is also a sign of the Resurrection and her new life of faith: the Creator offers us the gift of Spring; Jesus, the Christ, offers us renewal.

Kateri's renewal of faith, hope and peace caused her to be scorned and laughed at. She was sarcastically called "The Christian" Finally she fled her native home and took refuge in this community of Kahnawake. She knew that here in this Chirstian -Catholic Community she would be supported in her quest to live out the Gospel which Jesus had presented to her. Kateri wanted to live a life of faith, hope and peace. She bore the Cross proudly and she proudly professed her faith in Jesus who gave meaning to her life. She had attempted to be baptized on a couple of occasions but to no avail. But Kateri never gave



up. When she was baptized she persisted all the more to witness to the faith, hope and peace she knew God offered her. Tekakwitha means she who stumbles, a nickname she received from those who knew of her difficulty to see as a result of having a severe case of measles. She may have tripped and stumbled when people placed objects in her path, but she never stumbled in her witness to Jesus and never tired of telling people of her faith. At twenty four years old she died and was buried; her remains are now

venerated in this Church and the universal church rejoices that one so fair and one so young would have such incredible love for the Cross and know how much Jesus loves us. Kateri knew and believed the message Jesus brought from the heart of the Creator, that God was our Father, and how the Creator wanted all people to live in faith, love and peace. We have the Spirit to witness to the messenger from the Creator, Jesus Christ.

...Today we celebrate the Feast of Blessed Kateri. Her life is an example for us. Her example invites us to live in profound Christian communion and she encourages us to follow her example and be proud to be Christian. Peace is a gift and it is also a mission. When Jesus says to his disciples: As the Father has

sent me so also I send you; he sends us to build peace into our lives and into the life of the community. Peace is to be found in our hearts, in our families and among nations.

We now turn to the table where Kateri found her strength to live her faith, hope and peace. It is a table of communion. At the Eucharistic table we promise to love one another and to love our enemies and pray for them. At the Eucharist we break bread and share the cup, the Body and Blood of Christ. On this day we take pride in Kateri's celebration of life. We celebrate her life when we become peace-makers. The Eucharist is our commitment to be peace-makers.

Hawaiians celebrate their native culture with more pride

For 2 decades now, a cultural renaissance has been building quietly at the grass root levels. It started with "King David Kalakua", the "merry monarch", of the islands, who revived interest in hula and Hawaiian music in the 17th Century. today in the hotels, you find the two Hawaiis: the Las Vegas style and the Hawaiian that the Hawaians are struggling to sustain.

There are more and more traditional products, like the vestments, food, instruments and hula competitions. Some children will study hula dancing for years, even though a young girl said: "When I grow up, I'd like to be a computer technician and a

professional dancer".

On the islands of Oshu, Hawaii and Maui, two different trends are at work: Hawaiians exploring and celebrating their native culture with more enthusiasm than they have since a century and the Hawaiian tourist industry is pouring new emphasis into replicating and advertizing the

most friendly elements of that culture, like the offering of a ley to every new visitor.

Members of the island's historical society meet with

interested guests for "talk-story" sessions.

At the half-dozen sites of Hawaiian Hotels & Resorts, an "essence of Hawaii" promotional campaign, devised last year, highlights historical aspects of each site.

On the two ships of American Hawaii Cruises, passengers now find that the crew includes a traditional Hawaiian storyteller.

Recently, on the big island of Hawaii, the Kona Village Resort threw a birthday party for Imgard Aluli, 83, one of the state's most prolific Hawaiian songwriters.

Meanwhile, Molokai, for decades one of the least tourism-

oriented of the islands, now sells itself to visitors as "the most Hawaiian island" of them all.

Everyone, it seems, is declaring his or her eageness to protect the flame of native Hawaiian tradition. But for every torch-bearer, there seems to be another set of presumptions and ambitions and another formula for feeding the



Meanwhile, in the background of the tourist landscape stand leaders of the rapidly advancing but many-headed



Hawaiian sovereignty movement.

For many of them, "being Hawaiian" means not only political empowerment but mistrust of past exploiters, including the tourism industry.

Though its leaders cannot agree on whether they want full independence, limited sovereignty under continued statehood, land, financial reparations or some combination of those, the movement has grown so powerful that last year it extracted from President Bill Clinton a formal apology to native Hawaiians, on behalf of the American people, for the behind-the-scenes American scheming that brought the fall of Queen Liliuokalani in 1893.

But what is a Hawaiian Native?

It's with the arrival of Captain Cook that the Hawaiians acquired mixed blood, In 1989, a study on the population of more

than one million Hawaiians revealed that 1% are pure Hawaians, and 18% just partial.

The Hawaiin Islands are full of natural and cultural richness. They present a great variety of sights: the wearing of hula shirts, of moumous, the culture of taro, coconuts and pineapple... Every island has its particular attractions. On Mauai Island, to get to the town of Hana, 80 km away, you have to drive for three hours. There the nature looks so primitive. The Oheo Pools in the Kaleakala National Park, which are water sources, are called the "Seven Sacred Sources" They are a becalming scene - a river drops by stages over black volcanic rocks into the sea. The original Hawaians are known to have had any particular beliefs or superstitions associated with the Pools, but this falling river suggested something mysterious.

Whatever may be, the Hawaiians are making an effort to gather all what is their own, so they can be themselves and stop commercialism from invading them shamelessly.

No matter where you are in contemporary Hawaii, there are certain circumstances on which you can rely. There will be sand, there will be the sea, and there will be an identity crisis.

The little Chapel on Mt. McKay

Asmall stone chapel stands atop Mt. McKay. It is this chapel that gives us a legend perhaps far more factual than all those of more ancient origin.

A flourishing encampment of Ojibway near Thunder Bay had learned something of agriculture. Small but bountiful wheat fields filled clearings which dotted the spruce and

birch forests. The tribe, jubilant at the prospects of a great harvest, found their joy short-lived one fall. A plague of black birds swooped from the sky and in spite of the men's arrows, soon devoured all the grain.

A plan for a greater hunting effort during the months that followed failed as heavy snows came. Those that ventured out in search

of food soon perished in the deep drifts of snow. Fishing through the ice was impossible as not even a morsel of food was left for bait. Starved, crazed men set upon one another and children cried pitifully from hunger. Just as it seemed the tribe would perish, a young princess, daughter of the Chief, took her father's hunting knife and cut strips of flesh from her legs. This she gave to the men to use as bait for fishing.

Soon, sufficient fish were caught and the tribe was saved from starvation. The heroic deed, however, was too much of a shock to the princess and slowly she wasted away. A visiting priest arrived just in time to bless her before her death. Hearing of her brave deed, he had the men build the small chapel in her memory and bade them give



thanks to God for their survival and pray for future crops. Each year at Thanksgiving, the Indians go to the chapel and it is more than a coincidence that since the first thanks offering, the crops of Thunder Bay have neither failed nor been destroyed by plague.


The Angel Craze

The current fascination with angels is a fine thing. Depending. Depending on what? Depending on whether or not angels are becoming a convenient replacement for belief in Jesus Christ.

In case you haven't noticed, a new book about angels seems to be published weekly. Personal testimonies of angelic intervention appear in Christian and

New Age magazines regularly. Angel Christmas ornaments are here, there and everywhere. Even the U.S. Postal Service was headlong into plans for replacing the Madonna and Child with victorianstyle angel in 1995 its lineup of Christmas



Belief in angels is certainly not contrary to Christian teaching.

Indeed the new "Catechism of the Catholic Church" reaffirms that "the existence of spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls 'angels' is a truth of faith."

The Church teaches that angels are messengers of God. The very word "angel" means "messenger," and refers, according to St. Augustine, more to what they do (deliver messages to humans)

than to what they are (invisible spirits). It was the Angel Gabriel who announced to Mary that she would bear a son. Angels appeared at the scene of Jesus' birth to pay Him

homage and to tell the shepherds of his arrival. An angel stood at the empty tomb on Easter morning and announced to Mary Magdalene that the Lord had risen from the dead.

In accordance with Scripture, the Church also teaches that angels praise God in the heavenly court and provide protection for human beings - a la guardian angels. Funeral liturgies end with the beautiful sung petition that the angels lead the soul of the deceased into paradise.

So if the Church is so positive about angels, why be concerned about the current devotion to them? Because some of that devotion seems more inclined toward idolatrous worship of the angels themselves, rather than

toward greater worship of God.

Interestingly, at the same time that so many people are trying to explain away all possible supernatural elements regarding the conception, birth, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ, they are unabashedly willing to believe that angels are flying hither and yon performing feats of wonder at every turn.

A virgin birth? Couldn't be! It's out of the question!

You saw a fleet of angels lift a car out of the path of an oncoming truck? Wow! That must have been a remarkable experience.

The advantage of seeking spiritual fulfillment in angels, rather than in Jesus Christ, is that no angel ever said, "Take up your cross and follow me." Angel tales, at least most of those making their way into the current genre, are conspicuously devoid of any mention of the moral and social responsibilities that flow from Christian belief. They are, for the most part, simply nice stories of

nice angels who come to rescue nice people, although some testimonies are clearly examples of New Age polytheism. New Age angels are more like ancient prebiblical gods than servants and messengers of the one God. And, it must be admitted that some of the interest in angels is purely commercial. Angels sell. Of course, commercial trends fade fast. Last year it was cows.

The interest in angels is primarily a good thing, because it shows that there is a renewed interest in spirituality and a renewed willingness to believe that some things that happen can be explained only by the existence of beings other than ourselves. But an angel is no substitute for a Savior. And only an angel that leads to greater faith in the Savior is an angel worth its weight in feathers.

Jesuit pans Times review

examined very attentively the review, by Ray Beauchemin, of Kaia'tanó: ron Kateri Tekakwitha, in the Catholic Times of March 1995. Here are the main observations I could easily verify:

The reference to Beautiful Losers by Leonard Cohen (1966) is unfortunate. Cohen is certainly one of the best Anglo-Canadian novelists. But the book which presents itself as a biographical novel of Kateri Tekakwitha, amongst others, is written by an author who hardly knows about Christianity, and much less about the Mohawks. It is then regrettable that Ray Beauchemin associates this work with that of Fr. Béchard, which is so much more serious.

The second paragraph of the review is also depreciated by the comparison between the title of the first part of Fr. Béchard's work, entitled "(1634-1677)," and the title of the first section of Cohen's book, entitled "The History of Them All."

The fourth paragraph already proves that the reviewer ignores the historical sources that he quotes, the Jesuit Relations, the accounts of Cholence and Chauchetière. If he knew them, he would'nt write that "when Béchard strays from documentation, his biography lapses into supposition and fiction."

What precedes is abundantly proven by the following paragraph about Fr. Béchard's chapter 13, where the reviewer employs the only precise and explicit quotation (Béchard, pp. 99 to 103 in the English version, pp. 99 to 102 in the French version). After quoting Fr. Béchard in connection with Kateri's way of life while on hunting expeditions and after referring to her nostalgia of the

Church, Beauchemin speaks ironically about the lack of proof. Now all this is found, at times literally, with more details, in the work of Fr. Cholence, Vie de Catherine Tegakoüita, première Vierge Irokoise (1696), pp. 20-23.

If the reviewer had known the sources which exist, he could not have concluded that the proof of the sanctity of Kateri is to be searched for only in her apparitions after her death. If one knows about the process of canonization, he is aware that the first step is to prove the practice of the heroic virtues by the saint-to-be, thus during his/her life.

In Beauchemin's last paragraph, it is inaccurate to say that the spelling of the world Tekakwitha on the cover - where it is spelled "Tekahkwitha" - is a mistake. It is the way that Fr. Cholenec writes her name in the text published in Lettres édifiantes et curieuses écrites des missions étrangères, Lyon, 1819, p. 26. It is the way it is taught today in the immersion Mohawk classes, in Kahnawake.


I believe that these explanations restore the facts. No author nor reviewer can interpret an Indian spiritual life of the 17th century with the perspectives and prejudices of the 20th century.

Therefore, the title itself of the review, which hints at the excesses of Fr. Béchard's book, seems to me, at times, exaggerated and unjustified in view of what we believe is a strong cause for canonization. In addition, the canonization of Kateri would be favorable to the promotion of reconciliation between Mohawks and other Canadians.
