Five Steps to a Native American Church

In an address to participants at the Tekakwitha Conference held at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, in August, Father John Hatcher, s.j., outlined five steps needed to overcome the missionary paternalism and distrust that keeps the Native American Catholic Church from developing.

The first step is to "trust the Holy Spirit... All have the same Spirit for the building up of the body of Christ."

◆ The second step is to promote adult education: "We must be convinced that anytime a non-native person does something a native person can be formed to do, the non-native person has done a serious injustice to the native Catholic Church."

◆ The third step is that missionaries must "drop our need to always be in control and to be in charge."

♦ The fourth step is to establish a screening process for missionary personnel, to assure that fourth step is to establish a screening process for missionary personnel, to assure that people are sent to the native communities who can work "in partnership with native people are sent to the native communities, who can work "in partnership with native leaders."

◆ The fifth step is to provide lay leadership and ordained leadership programs for Native Americans that offer "excellent theological formation" while allowing participants "to stay in touch with their cultural roots."

The Catholic Church firmly supports the report of the Royal Commission on Native People

The Catholic Church of Canada hopes that the report of the Royal Commission about Native People, now rendered public, will indicate in a precise manner the proceedings to check the processus of assimilation that the First Nations have known.

"We pledge to work in all solidarity with the Aborigenal People", said Father Douglas Crosby, secretary-general of the Conference of Catholic Bishops in Canada. This pledge takes root in the call of the Gospel in favor of justice and its implementation; it rests on a reflected knowledge of the European mentality belonging to the missionary activity of the colonial era."

The Catholic Church wishes above all that the Report will contribute to establish a climate of hope for the Natives of less than 25 years old, who make up for 54% of the Native population of Canada. It also wishes that the Report can help all the Canadian governments and all the Canadian society to conciliate our common history with the First Nations, so that we can enter the 3rd Millineum with a real desire to open new avenues. But to accomplish this, we must work together."

In the memoir introduced to the Royal Commission in 1993, the Canadian Bishops declared the following: "It is not enough to speak about equality, we need people to valorize the dignity of others. Finally, it does not suffice to talk about respect, we need people who are disposed to guarantee the rights of others while working every day in honesty."

CECC Communiqué

The Statue of Kateri, lost and found, is the recovery of a stolen statue of a Mohawk Indian a miracle or a remarkable coincidence?

The missing statue of a Mohawk Indian, the Blessed Kateri Tekakwi, who is one step away from sainthood, was recovered on the feast day created to commemorate her death. "When I first heard about it, it put goose bumps on my arms," said Sheriff's Investigator William Gilston.

A landlord cleaning out a former tenant's apartment in Johnstown found the statue that had been missing for about a year.

"It's like a miracle," Brother Kenneth Lucas said of the timing of the recovery.

Kateri, who lived in the 1600's, devoted her life to Christianity and became known as the Lily of the Mohawks. She faced scorn and threats because she did not choose to marry. At the time, marriage and having children was a sign of strength among the Mohawks.

Kateri fled from upstate New York to Canada where she died at the age of twenty-four. She was beatified in 1980 and is considered a candidate for sainthood if her devotes can prove she performed a miracle.

Her three-foot concrete statue will go back to its original location at the Tekakwitha spring. People pray and gather at the spring, some hoping it will cure their ills.

Sheriff Ron Emery said the landlord who discovered the missing statue requested anonymity. No arrests have been made yet but authorities say they have a suspect.

Hermanas Misioneras de la Bendita Kateri Tekakwitha

"Thave very good news. So often I write about the conditions I find myself in and how difficult it is working with very little. Sometimes I think the poverty detracts from what I am really here for and that is to show others the glory of our Lord by helping them realize that God touches all of our lives. and that we are so special to Him. If my work gives glory to our Lord, then I will have accomplished much more than anything else I could do in this life.

I came to Nicaragua nine months ago, with no ability to speak Spanish, but the faith that God wanted me to start a new religious community here in the village of Muy Muy. I came alone with no money or no large congregation to fund my stay. I write a newsletter that goes out about every six weeks that is published in Houston, Texas. It is about my journey here in Nicaragua and is a small way to earns a little to keep eating and helping others.

I came with a 30 days visa, because I had not negotiated my stay with my new Bishop. The major stumbling block was that I spoke no Spanish and he spoke no English. However, we accomplished the negotiations and I was given permission to gather a group together under the name of Missionary Sisters of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha on my 50th birthday. It might have taken longer, except that everyone in the village decided

to help me with my Spanish. I truly became an adopted daughter of Nicaragua, However, the Bishop could not sign the immigration paper until we finished our negotiations and I was 7 months past my visa by the time I appeared at immigration. I sat around immigration for two days before they decided to give me a visa as a religious. Since I am an undocumented Mohawk. this really did not bother me. I spent the time between interviews praying and this really confused the people who were doing the interviews.

I now have 37 candidates who wish to enter the convent. this is wonderful, except that I did not have a house for them. Yesterday, a woman came to me and literally gave me a large house that is in excellent shape for use as a convent for four years. (If I wish to have the convent there permanently, the purchase price is \$8,000 payable in the year 2002). I still have to pinch myself to realize that it is true.

A large foundation in the States is funding our children's and aged program of which I am administrator for Muy Muy. We have 348 children presently in the program with another 220 in the entry process. We have 68 aged people in the program. Each month they write to their sponsors and I translate all of their letters to English. They receive food, clothing, school supplies, medical and dental attention. I also get to visit with

the people to find out their needs and my pastoral instinct has been working overtime.

I am also opening a catholic pre-school...

My sisters will be teaching both in the school and as catechists in our fifteen missions. Many of them have little education, but they know how to sew. We will also be sewing school uniforms which every Our spiritual director, appointed by the Bishop, is worried because Nicaraguans have very little discipline. I told him that he should not worry as I have no problem with discipline, and they will learn from me. In other words, not everyone is a founder of a religious community. As limited as I feel sometimes, that is one gift that I have from my Jesus.



child in Nicaragua wears for school. At present we have to go to Managua to buy the uniforms for the children in our program. Hopefully, the critical need for major benefactors will be over in the next three years.

I am writing a formation program in Spanish. With the new house this job will be much easier. I will soon be able to pray with my sisters in our own Chapel. I will have one of the pictures that you gave me framed for our simple Chapel.

Two weeks ago I visited El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras. While in Honduras I visited with Bishop Geraldo Scarpone, OFM, who is originally from Boston, Mass. (address Apdo Postal No. 41, Camayagua 12101 Honduras) He prays the rosary in his

private chapel every morning and has included Kateri in his litany of saints. I am going to send him a copy of Kateri's brochure with my Christmas greetings.

Father Jacques, you have an open invitation to visit Muy Muy at anytime." ■

To have Indian blood is of little or no value unless you are proud of it.. To live for oneself is of no value. We must give of ourselves, try and try again, never giving up.

I firmly believe that we have a Creator... He made each of us and gave each some means by which he can help others of his own kind, also our animal brothers and sisters. We are a small but very important part of his plan.

Our values have been distorted, our various cultures have been suppressed and our relationship with the Creator has been sorely strained; but we should at all cost retain our reverence for Manitou, for our brothers and sisters and all of nature.

All our dreams and hopes depend on our young, for they will have to carry on after we are gone. We today, seem to have little time for them. We work and slave to make their life easier (so they will not have to suffer like we did). But are we really doing the right thing? Shouldn't they too have the experiences that we have had? Shouldn't they realize that life isn't one big bed of roses, with no pain, no effort, no discomfort, etc.

All my life, I've tried to help the Indian people. I've traveled thousands of miles, spent more money than I can remember, tried to unite Indian groups, taught the respect due their elders, installed the pride of having Indian blood, to revere their ancestors who lived, loved, suffered and died so that we

today could live. We owe them so much; much more than we can ever repay. It is our duty to carry on in the "Old Ways" to teach our children their heritage, the crafts, the Indian path and a true relationship between man and nature, of which we are all a part.

We are here today, let's make it count while we an, for someday we too shall be counted with our ancestors. Let's all work together, unite and do something for our brothers and sisters, let's care for and have compassion for Manitou's animal kingdom and all of nature.

Don't let others do the work that we should do. All of us must face life, for there is no way to avoid it, your dreams are my dreams, your suffering is my suffering, your moments of happiness are also mine.

When it comes our time, we must stand in the presence of our maker. Will you stand tall or will you whimper and cringe? Will Manitou say:

"You have been heaping big smoke, but no fire." ■



Tailfeather Woman and the Ceremonial Drum

Tailfeather Woman was a Sioux Indian and she had lost four of her sons in a battle. Some say that battle was a battle with the white people who were first coming into the United States and others don't name who the struggle or the battle was between, but that Tailfeather Woman lost her sons. When she saw that she had lost her four sons and that her people were losing the battle, she ran away and hid in a lake under the lily pads.

The wind would lift the lily pads enough for her to breathe and cover her again, repeatedly the wind would lift the lily pads and let her breathe and cover her again. She was there for quite a few days. Some say four; some say eight or ten days. While she was there, Gitchi Manitou came to her in a vision and gave her instructions about making a ceremonial drum and taught her the songs and rituals that went with it. Gitchi Manitou said to Tailfeather Woman: "tell your people, if there are any left", even though he knew that there were others left; "tell your people to make the drum and to use it particularly when there is war or division. When those who are vour enemies see vou drumming and dancing and singing they will realize that you are not intent on war but on peace." So Tailfeather Woman did this. The next time that there were enemies coming, the people began drumming and singing when they heard them.

Even when the enemies came with their weapons ready, they continued to drum and sing and dance. When their enemies came they realized that the Sioux people were not interested in war, but in peace. And so the Sioux continued to drum and dance and sing and the enemies continued to watch. At one point in time, the Sioux offered the drum to the Ojibway people in the same kind of situation. There are several places, mostly in areas around Wisconsin and Northern Minnesota and North Western Ontario, where the Sioux specifically brought the drum to our people.

In the story of how the drum came, it is clear that the purpose of the drum is for peace. And when the Creator came to Tailfeather Woman it was considered as being a Sacred revelation even though those words were not used to describe it. In some stories the recounter of the story says that Tailfeather Woman was actually taken into the heavens to be taught these songs. The songs were already there in her when she came back to teach the people. She knew the songs. They had been given to her already. (It is much like Bessie said when she talked about the song singing in her head before she started joining in with the song).

When you give a carrot purée to your child, even though he would much prefer eat chocolate every day, isn't that we know that later on, he will be able but to eat carrot purée for a lack of teeth. So doesn't God see further than we, his children?

"Ask and you will receive; search and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you. For the one who asks received. The one who seeks finds. the one who knocks, enters. Would one of you hand his son a stone when he asks for a loaf, or a poisonous snake when he asks for a fish? If you with all your sins, know how to give your children what is good, how much more will your heavenly Father, give good things to anyone who asks Him?

To become impatient with God, is a lack of abandon in Him, a lack of confidence in our heaven? We must first be satisfied with what we have. So ask, seek, knock, all of this in abandonment, being happy. Then it will be given to you, you will find and we'll open to you.

Why Relics?



Kateri's
Shrine in
Kahnawake
attracts many
pilgrims:
groups,
individuals,
Canadians,
Americans,

Europeans, Asiatics.. Why this eagerness to come close to Kateri's relics? Kateri died in 1680 at Côte Saint Catherine. As the Natives right away proclaimed her a saint, her bones in no time were placed securely in a chapel, until 1720 when the mission moved to the actual site of Kahnawake. The relics were transfered in great pomp and placed in a vault.

What is a Relic?

A relic is some part of the body or some piece of cloth that has touched the body of a martyr or saint. We can find at least two good reasons why relics are respected in the Church, First, because thee bodies have been the living temples of the Holy Spirit and so are worthy of our veneration; because God uses these relics to bring about many blessings spiritual and temporal. Consider an analogy in the life of our Lord. With a little spittle, mixed with clay, Our Lord cured a man born blind. This mixture was applied to the eyes of the blind man. Yet, with all this ceremony, the eyes remained closed. They were not opened until the man

himself had played his part. He had to wash in the pool of Siloe. After this, his eyes were opened. The point to remember is this: the clay did not work the miracle, but God's power working through the clay – plus the man's own part. So, it is not the relic that works the miracle, but God's power working through the relic – plus our part.

Briefly, that is what a relic is. to understand its origin, we must return to the catacombs in Rome. They tell their own story – the story of the veneration of the early Christians for their fellow Saints and Martyrs.

The bodies of the early saints and martyrs were kept in large cemeteries outside the city of Rome. This preservation and subsequently, the veneration paid to these Christian heroes, was widespread.

Veneration of the Relic?

To venerate a relic is to show by a sign like a kiss, the respect that is fitting for such a sacred object; by the same sign, the priest shows his respect for the altar with its relics, and for the sacred book of the Gospels. To apply a relic is to bless a person with it, to gain perhaps some spiritual or temporal favour; just as Our Lord applied clay to the eyes of the man born blind, and he regained his sight.

Is Christ Present in the Tabernacle?

Our church is preparing . for renovations. The Sister in charge of the liturgical office said it was liturgically incorrect to place the tabernacle in the center of the altar. She stated that the tabernacle wasn't part of worship, and that praying before it was more of a devotion, like a devotion to a saint. She also said that the tabernacle should be removed completely and put in a small side chapel. Isn't Christ continually present in the tabernacle? Aren't we to worship Christ present in the tabernacle?

A. Christ is indeed continually present in the reserved sacrament of the altar.

Pope Paul VI described the tabernacle and the sacramental Christ it contains as "the living heart of each of our churches" (Creed of the People of God).

An echo of this teaching is found in the 1983 Code of Canon Law: "The tabernacle in which the blessed eucharist is reserved should be sited in a distinguished place in the church or oratory. a place which is conspicuous, suitably adorned and conducive to prayer" (Canon 938.2).

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), published in the late '60s, advocates the reservation of the eucharistic Christ "in a chapel suitable for private adoration and prayer. If this is impossible because of the structure of the church or local custom, it should be kept on an

altar or other place in the church that is prominent and properly decorated" (#276).

In 1980, the Congregation for the Sacraments and Divin. Worship noted that "the tabernacle in which the eucharist is kept can be located on an altar, or away from it, in a place in the church which is very prominent, truly noble and duly decorated, or in a chapel suitable for private prayer and for the adoration of the faithful" (Inaestimabile Donum, #24).

An evolution is apparent in the instructions of the Holy See. To some extent, *Inaestimabile Donum* modifies the tenor of the GIRM in the question of a separate eucharistic chapel.

Why?

We can only speculate. But it appears that the Holy See, responding to the concern of bishops about the decline in eucharistic devotion, was encouraging a pastoral response, especially in new churches or in the renovation of older ones. It also appears that canon 932.2 reflects the direction of Inaestimabile Donum.

In the light of his canon, it seems clear that a "Blessed Sacrament Chapel" can't be required in every church though there are churches whose special situations do suggest that there be one _ in some large cathedrals, major basilicas and the like. St. Peter's in Rome is one.

Is Christ Present in the Tabernacle? (con't)

It is permissible for a tabernacle to be placed to the side of a church's front in a suitably decorated and noble state. In fact, it's desirable to have the tabernacle "in view" of the whole congregation because it will encourage devotion to the eucharistic Christ.

When the blessed sacrament is removed from the body of the church and people are no longer required to genuflect, they eventually quit even bowing to the altar.

Consciousness of the real presence of Christ in the eucharistic reservation begins to evaporate – something that seems to be going on all over, if statistical reports of the faith level of the Catholic people are to be believed. Pastors are also well-aware that devotion to the eucharistic Christ diminishes when the tabernacle isn't in plain view.

Ignoring Church regulations (Environment and Art in Catholic Worship, #80), some argue that a tabernacle can't be placed on an altar. But the Church's teaching and legislation favors the retention of a connection between the altar and the sacramental presence of Christ.

In view of this, a parish church could situate the tabernacle behind the altar in a central location; it could create an altar in a eucharistic chapel, if the parish has one; it could reserve the eucharistic Christ on a "side altar"; or it could place the tabernacle on a "eucharistic

tower" in a visible space in plain view of the congreation. All of these sites will foster awareness of Christ's presence among us.

Much fuss is made in some liturgical circles about the different "presences" of Christ. Members of the circles point to the supposed difference between his "dynamic" presence in the action of the Mass and his "static" presence in the reserved eucharist.

Fascinated by this distinction, they have become ardent advocates of the removal of the blessed sacrament from plain view during Mass. They opt for a diminished location in the church, with a "separate chapel" being an option.

The sense of the faithful and many of their pastors, however, sees no apparent conflict between these two "presences". They see only the one Lord Jesus Christ, who becomes present again for our salvation at the consecration of the Mass and who remains present in the reserved sacrament in the tabernacle.

This tabernacle and the reserved sacrament have been and must remain, as Pope Paul VI taught years ago, "the living hearts of each of our churches."
